

YACKANDANDAH LETTER FOUND?

Experts are analysing a letter recently found in a disused cellar in a Yackandandah shop.


"I really didn't know there was a cellar" said the finder, who prefers not to be named in this article, "it was only that the floorboards had become a bit creaky, so I decided to take a look". What was uncovered may shed light on a previously unaccounted period in the life of the infamous folk hero, Ned Kelly, whose whereabouts over a three week period in 1879 have baffled scholars now for over 140 years.

Those "creaky floorboards" proved to be a trapdoor which led down into a small cellar via a rusty, but otherwise sound ladder. "It took a while before I was able to explore it properly," the finder explained. "I really wasn't sure about that ladder and, of course, there were no lights, I doubt anyone had been down there since power came through. Also, there were spiders!"





After moving to Yackandandah, Carmel took on the treasurer role at the Yackandandah footy club in 1984 - their centenary year. While the club had a ladies committee responsible for running the canteen, she was the first female on the football club committee eventually becoming the insurance officer. As her children became older she took on a range of roles (treasurer, president, vice-president of the netball / night netball committees). Many years later she returned to the football committee for another stint as treasurer.

While her involvement with the football/netball club committees continued, Carmel also setup an under 3's weekly playgroup which operated at the Church of England in Church Street involving about 10 families, providing an opportunity for the preschool kids to play and socialize and their parents to have a support group. By the end of the year, the playgroup had raised enough funds to purchase an instant gas hot water service for the Church updating the need to boil a kettle for all hot water needs.

Carmel's volunteering ran parallel with her kids' activities. After the playgroup she took on the treasurer role at the kindergarten for several years, then she moved on to minute secretary for the primary school then school council president. Her term as school council president was memorable as she was responsible for handing out graduation certificates to the year six students, including her eldest. Carmel also spent time on the Scout committee in addition to taking a lead organising the 7-8 Debutante balls in Yack-between 2002 and 2013.

Carmel recalls that the idea for the Yack Christmas Lunch started with a conversation among friends over New Year drinks in 2016. Discussions centred on what Christmas might look like as they aged with children living away. Carmel's mother had said that if all her kids were too busy on Christmas Day that she "would just stay at home and have a ham sandwich". Carmel decided that should she be in that situation she would prefer to spend Christmas Day serving lunch to others. A number of the ladies present said they'd love to be involved in something like that and a seed was planted for a Community Christmas lunch.

Carmel had worked with Rafferty's Catering and his workers over many years through the football club and organising the local Debutante Ball, so she approached John Thurgood to gauge his availability, and cost, to provide the main meal. She mentioned the idea to his workers, Sam & Jono,

who immediately offered their time and services.

It is Carmel's experience that once you have a band of willing workers it's not too difficult to make things happen. She got in touch with Indigo Shire to find out about grants available to fund the lunch. They connected her with Anna Mackinlay (Beechworth Health Service) who provided invaluable information and support, as well as assisting with funding. Carmel recalls Anna's words of encouragement "If you only serve one person on Christmas Day that's one person who isn't home alone". That was the purpose - to have people feel they could share some time and a meal with other people on what can be a very long and lonely day for some.

It was unknown how many would attend the inaugural Yackandandah Community Christmas lunch in 2016 so Carmel and her team catered for 100 people. That first year 48 people attended so they not only got a hot lunch but were provided another meal to take away. The first year was a learning experience from which much was learned, and changes made in subsequent years. Sadly, Carmel's mother passed away in the September prior to the first Christmas lunch. She would have approved.

In 2017, 80 people came to the lunch followed by 62 in 2018 then almost capacity in 2019 with 92 attendees. Then COVID hit in 2020 and it looked like the lunch might not be able to proceed or proceed with limited numbers. Following a RSVP process 37 people attended a very relaxed event. Insisting on an RSVP worked well, and it was decided to do the same in 2021 when 65 attendees were able to be accommodated when COVID restrictions were eased at the 11th hour. There are some locals who have attended every year. Others come every 2nd year which is what you intend to expect with young families alternating between both sets of parents.

Every year the team of volunteers Sam & Jono (Rafferty's), Denise & Wayne Maybury, Jenny Anthony, Fiona Greiner, Jack Kelley – have turned up and made this event happen. Each year others have joined in to help either set-up, serve on the day, or clean-up. It's heart-warming to see people just pitch in and do whatever is needed, no questions asked. Carmel is extremely grateful for all the volunteers who have committed to providing this ongoing annual event. She feels blessed that her family have supported her need to put their Christmas on hold to make this day possible for others.

Over the six years since 2016 Carmel has received amazing support from individuals and local businesses and cautious about naming entities in case some are overlooked, she would like to acknowledge just a few in Rafferty's Catering, Yack Lions Club, Yack Primary School, YCDCo, Yack Holiday Park. WAW Bank have sponsored the lunch twice and Shire grants have supplemented when funds were dwindling. There are others not named that have all been wonderful. The continued support from all these sources ensures that the community Christmas lunch will be able to be run the following year.

Carmel feels extremely humbled, and honoured, to have received the Yackandandah Citizen of the Year 2022 Award. She gets tremendous satisfaction from seeing the gratitude on the faces of those attending the Christmas lunch, plus everyone has fun on the

The Yackandandah community has benefitted greatly from Carmel's service over the years and deserves recognition for her dedication and drive to assist where needed and improve the lives of others where she can.

Thank you Carmel.



YACKANDANDAH CFA

MR. FIXIT

Like so many other members, the Brigade's 5th Lieutenant, Glenn "Salty" Mailey, has brought his own set of skills and knowledge to the Brigade. As Salty, a fitter and turner, says one of the reasons he joined the CFA in 2015 was that he thought he had a lot of "technical know-how of equipment" that could be handy for the Brigade. As indeed it has been. As well as his role as 5th Lieutenant, Salty is also the Brigade's asset maintenance officer; our "Mr. Fixit Man."

Other reasons why he joined the Brigade was to be part of a community group and to meet more people. "When I first moved to Yack in 2002, I joined the local footy club as a way of getting to know the locals," says Salty. "I did that for two years, in the reserves for one year, and then as a trainer for another year. But the only local people I really knew were through football."

Salty has been impressed with the Brigade's esprit de corps, or camaraderie as well as the time that many members, including former captains, put into the Brigade and their commitment. "Being in

the Brigade has given me more confidence in talking to people in the community because you know them," says Salty. "Also, when you are wearing the uniform, people look to you for

advice and help, to start the process of what needs to be done."

Incidents that "stick in his mind" included instances where first aid has had to be administered (such as motor vehicle accidents) and the Buffalo Valley fires in 2020. "With the Buffalo Valley fires we were out at night, and it was very interesting to see how it all works," says Salty who is in his first term as a lieutenant. As for his ambitions within the Brigade and the CFA, it's "to be there to help others and to learn."

Salty, who is 57, grew up in Wantirna South in south-east Melbourne which, back then was still very "country" with apple orchards and the like. As a kid he had a range of part-time jobs including selling chico rolls at VFL Park (now Waverley Park) at Mulgrave when he was 12 years old. His secondary schooling was through Knox Technical College, followed by an apprentice ship with Repco (PB Industrial) as a fitter and turner. In 1985 he joined the army as a fitter and armourer and in his 11 years with the defence force had postings in Hobart, Brisbane (with the 6th Battalion) and from there got posted to Cambodia with the United Nations in 1993. From there he went to Darwin and then got discharged out of Melbourne. He worked for a short time back in Wantirna South but "got sick of suburbia" and moved to North East Victoria in 2001, initially to Wodonga before moving to a 2.2ha block just on the outskirts of Yackandandah.

For close to 20 years Salty has worked as a fitter and turner for a defence contractor (initially Tenix

but now Ventia). He has two daughters, Nancy, 16, and Tess, 14... plus a golden retriever "Sally" and a three month old whippet "Slappy."

And as to how he earned the nick-name Salty, that harks back to his army days "when my sergeant thought I looked like Salty the Pirate in the old whiskey posters as I always had a beanie on and a dirty face on bush exercises."

Burning off safely

With the lifting of the Fire Danger Period restrictions, people may be wanting to burn off piles of garden waste or branches/leaves before winter sets in. However, every year we do get called out to burn-offs that have got out of control. To help ensure this doesn't happen:

- check the Council's Local Laws to ensure you are allowed to burn off and if so, whether permits are required
- check the weather forecasts for the day of your burn-off and a few days afterwards. If it is too windy, better to postpone
- make sure you have enough water to extinguish a possible outbreak
- clear a three-metre firebreak around your burn pile i.e. by mowing or removing flammable material
- register your burn off by calling 1800 668 **511, on-line or by email** so that we're not called out unnecessarily
- let your neighbours know that you are planning a burn
- make sure there are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish your burn off
- make sure it is 100% out before you leave it

Time to check/clean your chimney or flue

CHECK AND CLEAN CHIMNEYS AND FLUES

Still have wood heating? Starting to think about or have begun collecting/ ordering firewood for winter? Now is also a good time to check and clean your chimneys and

flues. Each year CFA firefighters responded to some 150 chimney fires; fires which can quickly turn into

Have chimneys professionally cleaned annually to avoid the build-up of creosote – a highly flammable black tar-like residue – that can clog chimneys. Creosote is not only caused by general use, but can also build up quicker if you are using incorrect fuels, such as green wood or treated timbers. Check for creosote build-up or obstructions by shining a torch up the chimney/flue if possible.

END OF DAYLIGHT SAVING AND SMOKE ALARMS

The end of daylight saving (Sunday, April 3) serves as a reminder to check you have a working smoke

alarm. Check the battery and if the unit is more than 10 years old. If it is the unit should be replaced.

Tips:

- Smoke alarms should be installed in bedrooms and all living areas, where most fatal fires start.
- Each month, test smoke alarms by pressing the test button.
- Each year, vacuum all smoke alarms to clean the vents, and change batteries in any 9 volt battery-operated alarms.
- After 10 years, replace smoke alarms regardless of the type.
- Get a smoke alarm powered by a 10-year lithium battery so you don't need to change the battery every year.
- Consider installing interconnected smoke alarms, so that when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound.

Yackandandah On Show February 25, 2022

What happens when you assemble a group of people from very diverse backgrounds who have different skill sets, to help organise a community event? I would imagine you'd get something along the lines of Yackandandah on Show - a free Community Comeback get together, funded entirely by Government Grants for bushfire recovery in communities like ours throughout the state, administered by Indigo Shire Council.

The working group for this event went through several phases over its time with Council staff members and some committee members tasked with overseeing its implementation changing several times. Finally, after much debate, it was decided we would hold an event in Yackandandah

which would be accessible to everyone, would involve local community groups and sporting clubs and include children's activities as well. Whilst Chloe Powell, Indigo Shire's newest Events Coordinator would have overall control, she made it clear as did her predecessors, that it was up to the community-based committee members to decide the format and design the event from the ground up.

Several locations were considered, with the same site as the Lions Club Sunday Market being the preferred choice for its proximity to the centre of town and ease of access for stall holders. Members approached people in local organisations to see if they wanted to be part of the festivities as we wanted the evening to have a party atmosphere, where those new to town could find out what local organisations were available that may be of interest to

them in Yackandandah as well as serving to remind others of their existence. Stall holders were encouraged to decorate their street sites in colourful and interesting ways. Children's entertainers, The Ladybirds, were engaged to provide entertainment for the younger locals, along with face painting and fishing games. Stefan from Scoop 21 proved very popular given the rather humid evening, doling out his delectable ice cream and the hard-working volunteers from Yackandandah Primary School, were kept very busy feeding the assembled multitude with delicious food throughout the evening. Those seeking a nice cuppa and something sweet to munch on were also well catered for by the good folk from Yack Senior Citizens. Beechworth Bakery kindly donated bread and rolls for the food, North East Water provided their water fountain trailer and free reusable water bottles, Kiewa Milk

donated a heap of flavoured and plain milk for the tea, coffee and scone making and Billson's Brewery donated cordial for mixing with the water.

ISC Councillor, Diane Shepheard, delivered the Welcome to Country and officially opened the event. Live music was also provided in the rotunda at the Memorial Park by an all-local line up of musicians featuring Geraldine Hall, Forgotten Land and the Indigo Creek Band, which kept everyone tapping their feet and saw some very enthusiastic dancing from some young ladies from the audience. Things concluded around 9pm with loads of positive feedback being received by committee members. Thank you to everyone who took part for helping to make Yackandandah on Show the success it was.

Some great news for Yackandandah! TRY is set to partner yet again with Mondo on a nationally relevant solar and battery offer. Yet another little 'tile' in the cool mosaic of energy transition taking place in Yackandandah.

The launch will introduce

Yack residents and businesses to the opportunity to participate in a 'virtual power plant trial'

- Project EDGE. And actually, there are already 43 homes with batteries in Yackandandah participating in an initial phase of the trial. A virtual power plant (VPP) is a collection of properties with renewable energy generation, storage and smart energy control. When done well, VPPs can bring great results for the battery owner, the electricity network operator and the function of the electricity market.

A broader goal of Project EDGE is the effort to build a two-way and dynamic

energy system that can absorb progressively larger volumes of renewable energy into the National Energy Market.

Project EDGE times in nicely for Yackandandah as we set to implement the findings from the recently completed 100% feasibility study and as we set forward on the goal of 100% renewable energy. The clear learnings resulting from the study are that solar panels, batteries and smart controllers are the most powerful platform to achieve a 100% power supply.

EDGE trials are set to occur from August 2022 to March 2023 and support will include an increased subsidy for homes eligible for a Solar Victoria battery rebate as well as purchase discounts and payment for participation in the trial. Equally businesses will be eligible for subsidies and participation payments.

Homes and businesses with batteries have the potential to dramatically increase the proportion of renewable energy they use each day by charging the battery during the day and then using that power on

site each evening. At the same time, batteries provide a back-up supply in readiness for outages and emergencies. And crucially, all this helps reduce carbon emissions to help avoid the worst effects of climate change.

YACK AND AND AH CEMETERY TRUST

Energy for Life - Recharging the Cemetery Long After Your Battery Goes Flat

The Cemetery Trust is thrilled to be a recipient of the Indigo Shire Council's 2021-2022 Community Sustainability Grants Program. The \$8,000 funding allocation will contribute towards the Cemetery Trust's 'Energy for Life' Project. The project scope includes the installation of a 5kw Solar photovoltaic and battery storage system on the cemetery grounds maintenance shed to charge battery operated grounds maintenance equipment and power tools.

Many within the community would be aware that the Yackandandah Cemetery has no supplied or generated electricity on site, and relies solely on fossil fuels to power all of its maintenance equipment and generators. Trust Member Paul Anderson said "It's been an ambition of the Cemetery Trust is to support the shift toward a

more mindful relationship with energy, building climate change resilience and joining others within the community to help mitigate our climate emergency".

Guided by Totally Renewable Yackandandah, the project will reduce greenhouse gas emissions and enable more energy efficient maintenance equipment to be procured and used by Trust members, volunteers, and contracted maintenance staff. "The new equipment will be lighter, quieter, safer, and more efficient. The Trust is really excited that this transition can now commence". Mr Anderson said.

The Trust has also recently completed a number of other significant maintenance tasks on the cemetery grounds. Parts of the storm water draining system has been placed underground, particularly in areas most susceptible to overland stormwater erosion. And more work is planned to help mitigate

the damaging impact that severe weather has on the cemetery grounds. Trust Member David Lerch said "the works recently completed also make a significant impact on the safety of the site by removing erosion hazards". The Trust is extremely grateful for the work that Graham Britton from GSB Constructions has done installing the underground drainage system.

A number of large tree stumps have also been removed curtesy of Maurice Dunstan from Albury Tree and Stump Removal. The stumps had presented a hazard for some time and were an unnecessary obstacle for grounds maintenance equipment. Trust Member Ian Jenkins said "the equipment used by Maurice was magnificent to see in operation. The stump grinder was very time efficient, and it certainly was an impressive solution for our problematic stumps".

YACKANDANDAH'S HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT FOR UKRAINE

The world has watched on with disbelief and horror over the last four weeks as the scale and cruelty of Russia's invasion of Ukraine seems to be plumbing new depths with each passing day. During a time when there is no shortage of bad news stories, between COVID and flooding in Queensland and NSW, it has been incredibly heartwarming to see members of the Yackandandah community raise over \$4,500 in humanitarian aid for some of the worst affected cities across central and eastern Ukraine. With cities such as Mariupol completely cut off in a medieval style siege, where there is no longer access to water or electricity and very limited supplies of food, the Russians forces went as far as to shell a maternity hospital in the city – which seems unthinkably barbaric, but that kind of inhumane terror is becoming a mainstay of the Russian tactics in the war as they are stalling militarily.

While aid organisations such as the Red Cross have largely been forced to retreat to the relative safety of Lviv in the west, community volunteer groups in all the major cities are working tirelessly to get food and medical supplies to displaced civilians who've lost their homes and their families due to the indiscriminate destruction that the Russian forces are throwing down on Ukraine. It's these groups that generous donations from the Yackandandah community have been supporting, in Dnipro, Kharkiv, Sumy and Mariupol.

I remember the first time I encountered Ukrainians, studying in a university in eastern Germany, with strong ties to Ukraine and Russia, about 30% of all the students were from Poland, Russia or Ukraine. It was 2015, shortly after the Euromaidan revolution, and Putin's annexation of Crimea and the 'little green men' who stoked the seeds of discontent and armed resistance in Donetsk and Luhansk in the Donbas region. Geopolitically confusing and incomplete or onesided explanations from various media outlets as to what the cause of all this trouble was, I asked one of my first Ukrainian friends - Olga from Dnipro - what it all meant. She had participated in the Euromaidan revolution in 2014, donating most of her \$200 monthly salary to support the protesters, and going to Kyiv whenever she could to take part in person. She didn't get much further than "Russia doesn't want us to exist" before breaking down in tears, and explaining through sobs that Ukrainians are kind, generous and peaceful people, and all they want is to live safely in their own country and to be able to determine their own future.

Though that was seven years ago now, and this sentiment I think is as poignant as ever and has been eloquently expressed by the Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, in his many televised addresses to his nation. While it has been inspiring to watch the spirit of defiance among the citizen of Ukraine, as well as the willingness of Poland and other European nations to support them both in refugee intake and military and humanitarian aid, a lot of the work on the ground is still being done by volunteer groups. These guys are literally risking their own lives and saving others by getting food and medicine to where it needs to

be, and they still need support – donations to them have no bureaucratic overheads, 100% of the funds are used for direct action, not salaries or renting offices etc. If anyone would like to donate to these groups, I would be happy to provide the details, or as I have been doing, to collect AUD donations and then send them over to Ukraine.

Finally, thank you to all the people who've donated money. In the words of one of my Ukrainian friends who helped to get money to one of the community groups in Dnipro "it's impossible to describe in words how grateful each of us is to all of you, your friends, your parents, everyone who is fighting for us from thousands of kilometres away... please be sure to convey to all your people who help us that we thank them endlessly for every action you take to help us here."



RECIPE OF THE SEASON

Maggie Beer's Boston Baked Beans

INGREDIENTS

250g dried cannellini beans

1 teaspoon mustard powder

2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

2 tablespoons treacle

1 x 400g tin peeled whole tomatoes (chopped)

75g pork speck (chopped)

1/2 large onion stuck with 3 cloves (chopped) bay leaf

1 1/2 teaspoon chopped mint salt and pepper

Speck is a pork product made from a boned ham that is moderately salted and seasoned, coldsmoked and then well aged according to local practices and traditions.

Pork Speck

Soak the beans overnight. Discard the water and rinse. I

n a large heavy base saucepan, sauté the chopped onion with the cloves, the bacon and bay leaf.

In a bowl combine the mustard powder and a small amount of red wine vinegar to make a paste, then add treacle.

Add the chopped tin of tomatoes to the sautéed

onions and bacon.

Add the mustard and treacle mix and combine. Add salt and pepper.

Add the beans (that have been soaked overnight). Place a tight fitting lid on the saucepan - or baking paper and then foil and bake at 140C for 2 1/2 - 3 hours (stirring occasionally). Remove the lid half an hour before "doneness' and add the last tablespoon red wine vinegar. When beans are ready, add chopped mint and

Adjust with seasoning if needed. If beans are too sweet add some more red wine vinegar, and serve.



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Yackandandah Community Centre

The launch of its new Strategic Plan heralds a new direction for the Yackandandah Community Centre.

Growth and change have been a feature of the Yackandandah community; the new YCC Strategic Plan reflects those changes and defines its purpose with the

statement – YCC is Where Our Community Connects and Grows Together.

YCC chair, Bill Dee said the Strategic Plan was a blueprint for how the centre connects with and communicates to the community. "I'm thrilled with the new Strategic Plan as it helps to guide YCC in a direction which best meets community needs," Mr Dee said. "It outlines our key strategic pillars which

include, being an organisation people want to work with, strengthening our organisational capacity, developing a strong and positive profile across the community and connecting people with opportunities.

"We gained some valuable insights with a community survey last year. It showed that we need to do more in terms of communicating with the Yack community. We are also keen to build partnerships with other groups and develop collaborative projects to meet community needs and identify areas where YCC can add value to the community."

YCC vice chair, Karen Keegan said the new plan aimed at connecting with the community. "This really is a confirmation of what YCC does," she said. "It is really going to strengthen our commitment to the community and demonstrate that we are community focussed, and we want to help our community grow together."

Manager, David Thorpe said YCC had evolved through the years, the new plan would initiate a different focus for the organisation. YCC has initiated and conducted a broad range of projects and programs for the community since its establishment in 1992. "In its early days YCC was really the only organisation in town which offered courses and programs, there has been a wonderful array of learning opportunities that have been a huge part of YCC's success,"

Mr Thorpe said. "We will still offer those learning opportunities however, there are now several other organisations in town which provide a wide range of activities and courses.



"And with the advent of the internet you can learn just about anything with a Google or YouTube search. So rather than compete with those other streams of learning opportunities the committee has decided to focus more on a broader approach to community development. One of the ways we will do that is through collaboration with other organisations. For instance, YCC auspiced the Yackandandah Women's Shed last year

and worked with them to get the group up and going. They have had a fantastic start and are now doing some terrific things."

Mr Dee said other successful collaborations in the past couple of years included the establishment of the Yackandandah Community Initiative (YCI) and teaming up with Indigo FM to create Yack Chat during the early stages of the COVID pandemic. YCI brought the town's service organisations together to discuss working collaboratively to provide for community need. Yack Chat initiated live-to-air talkback capability at the Indigo FM Yackandandah Studio.

"Working with YCI, the Yack Lions Club helped provide free or low-cost hand sanitiser to the community when it was otherwise unavailable or very expensive," Mr Dee said. "YCI also developed and distributed a business listing of those businesses which were still able to operate during shutdowns to promote buying local. And Yack Chat brought live-to-air talkback radio to Indigo FM for the first time, aimed at providing another avenue of communication, especially for those people with limited access to technology, during a time that most of us were confined to our homes. The new strategic plan will build on these initiatives and create pathways of connection and communication to benefit our vibrant, creative community."

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YACK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Museum has experienced a wonderful number of visitors over the past few months, in January alone we had 549 walk through the door, their delight is reflected in the comments left:




Our Internet Radio Station airs the shows of the Yack PS kids from 10am-12noon each Sunday.



A SHORT HISTORY OF THE YACK TO OSBORNES FLAT CYCLE TRAIL

With the completion of the cycle trail from Yackandandah to Osbornes Flat I thought it was appropriate to record the history of the origins of this trail and the various contributions made by many community members over the past 14 years.

In July 2008, Noelene Young convened a meeting in collaboration with DELWP (owners of the land adjacent to Yackandandah Creek) with a view to forming a track or tracks from Yackandandah to Rowdy Flat and on to Osbornes Flat suitable for walkers, cyclists and horse riders. This meeting led to the *Rowdy Flat Track Association Inc* being formed.

Since then, long term committee members have included Gary Britton, a licence holder of land adjacent to the creek, Patricia Nuck who was the initial Treasurer and a Yackatoon resident, and Lyn Dahlenburg who has been a long serving Vice President and remembers a track existing from Osbornes Flat in her childhood. Also, Jill Whitford, lan Jackson and James Lacey have all been long term committee members fulfilling various roles. Carolyn Martin-Jenkins was a member for some years representing the interests of horse riders. It was generally accepted the horses would need a separate trail adjacent to the cycle/walking track.

Noelene had to resign from her role as President in 2013 due to severe health issues and subsequently, sadly, she died in 2019 just failing to see the completion of the new trail to Osbornes Flat.

A Development Plan was produced by the Shire in 2009 with a view to determining the desired route and an estimated cost. Several Council officers and councillors were walked over the route to Mongan's Lane. Councillors Peter Croucher and Diane Shepheard have both keen supporters of the track. In 2010 we obtained over 400 signatures on a petition supporting the construction of a shared walking/bicycle track and an adjacent horse trail

from Church Street to Osbornes Flat which was presented to Council and covered by an article in the Border Mail. In 2011 various funding sources were investigated including approaching our local member, Bill Tilley.

Early tasks organised by Noelene, was the clearing of pine trees from the area below Britton Lane opposite Church Street that was done by inmates from the Beechworth Prison and the cleaning up the area on the opposite side of the creek at the end of Church Street.

Also, in 2011, the Indigo Shire was part of a submission to Regional Development Australia to fund a link between the Murray to Mountains Trail with the High Country Trail with a cycle trail from Beechworth to Huon.

Meanwhile, Gary and Graeme Britton ensured the route through their licence area was cleared and maintained. However, the route around the

Sewage Farm was blocked by the need to cross Back Creek. Ian Jackson took this on as a project and gained DELWP permission to install a large culvert generously donated by Julie and Russell Klose. Therese Davis from DELWP and Natalie Dando from the NECMA were both

particularly helpful in helping with this process. The actual installation was carried out by Ian, Gary, Graeme and David McIntosh who also provided and operated his crane for this task.

Mark Burbidge with the assistance of John Fullerton and Chris Lello, over a three year period, sprayed blackberries between Mongan Lane and the Sewerage Farm. Gary and Graeme Britton carried out blackberry spraying between the Sewerage Farm

and Britton Lane as did Ian Jackson and a crew from the High Country Rail Trail Committee. In all these cases the labour was voluntary, and herbicide paid for by the association or supplied by DELWP.

Over the years regular correspondence occurred with the Shire including updating three new CEOs on the importance of this track. First it needed to be surveyed and the Shire take over the management of the land from DEWLP. This proved to be a very slow process. Meanwhile Ray Henderson was employed by the Shire to plan a cycle route from Beechworth to Huon and he developed the route from Mongans Lane to Osbornes Flat School. In the end it was announced in 2016 that the RDA submission had been successful and initially a Stage 1 of the Beechworth to Huon Cycle Trail would be funded ending in Yackandandah. No mention of Osbornes Flat. The Rowdy Flat Association immediately put the case to Council that Stage 1 should include the route to Osbornes Flat and subsequently this was included. Note there is still to be a Stage 2 which will complete the link to Huon via Tangambalanga. This will make it possible to ride from Wodonga to Wangaratta and Bright on cycle trails making it a unique community asset that has great potential for high value low impact multiday cycle tourism.

When the trail came to be built, the proposed route in Yackandandah

was down Church Street as it was not thought possible for the route to go along the creek either through the Yackandandah Caravan Park or on the south side opposite. A feasible route was subsequently found to exist; however, it went

through Helen and Hamish MacCalman's property as their title extended across the creek. Fortunately, the MacCalmans generously gave up some of their property and privacy to allow the route to go through, creating an outstanding section of the trail that will be enjoyed by numerous residents. Also, we were fortunate the Council was able to source some additional funds to complete this section of trail as it provided additional challenges with some steep drop-offs to the creek and an old mineshaft.

Jill Whitford's involvement with the Yackandandah Garden Club led to them making a \$1,000

donation towards materials for the construction of seats beside the trail. Ben Gilbert came up with a design and installed the first seat and sourced the timber and stone used to construct another five seats. These

Gary Britton. It is intended the seat near the bridge closest to Mongan Lane will have a small plaque acknowledging the contribution of Noelene Young.

Since the completion of the track, Jo Miller and Gabby Bridge have been working with Landcare to gain funding for weed control and, with Chris Horton, organised two tree planting days along the route. Hopefully, in the future more weed control can be carried out and some additional creekside areas can be developed for picnics and contemplation.

Finally, although external funding for the rail trail is heavily dependent on tourist income to the local community, I believe the Yackandandah to Osbornes Flat section will have a very high local resident use. This, in conjunction with the track out to the Yack Creek Distillery, gives the community a unique asset in terms of a trail along an extended length of creek frontage for the enjoyment of all residents.

To complete the picture all we need is a bridge across Yackandandah Creek opposite Church Street which would link in walking and cycle access to Yackatoon, Butson Park and Racecourse Road.

Feel free to lobby council to make this happen if you believe this is a great idea.



From 'The Kirby Report' to 'The Firth Report', NELLEN turns 20!

NELLEN celebrated their 20th Anniversary on 15 March 2022 with morning tea at their new Southside Terrace location.

NELLEN welcomed past Board members, employees, and members of the community to discuss the changing landscape of youth education and employment in North-East Victoria over the past two decades. Acting CEO of Wodonga TAFE, Graham Hart, joined current NELLEN Board Chair and La Trobe University Lecturer, Virginia Mansel Lees, to lead the celebrations. Ms Mansell Lees and Mr Hart spoke about the work of the LLEN over the years, and how the current work of NELLEN is centered on the changes to the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning, brought on by the Firth Review.

NELLEN CEO Bev Hoffmann said: "It's reassuring to see that the LLENs are as relevant today as they were 20 years ago. We have achieved so much in supporting young people as they leave secondary education and find their first job, but there's still more to do and we're excited about that challenge."

NELLEN was incorporated on 15 March 2002 during the second implementation phase of 'The Ministerial Review of Post Compulsory Education and Training Pathways in Victoria,' referred to as the Kirby Report. The current work of the LLENs is influenced by the Firth Review, the first major change to the Victorian Certificate of Education since the introduction of the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning in 2002.

About NELLEN

The North East Local Learning and Employment Network (NELLEN) is one of 31 Victorian Local Learning and Employment Networks (LLENs). NELLEN's core objective is to improve education and employment participation, engagement, attainment, and transition for all young people aged 10 to 19 years within the geographical boundaries of four local government areas – Alpine, Indigo and Towong shires and the City of Wodonga.

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Going to Town... on Learning

Thanks to the fundraising efforts of a group of Murray volunteers, local women will benefit from up-to-date breastfeeding knowledge. Local Yackandandah health professional and Australian breastfeeding counsellor, Louise Thornton our group leader, was instrumental in creating a program which 18 health professionals were sponsored to attend online and face to face learning. It was a great experience for everyone.

The Murray group of the Australian Breastfeeding Association (ABA) sponsored eighteen rural and regional health workers to attend in person, the 2022 Annual Health Professionals Seminar Series "Breastfeeding: A Thirst for Knowledge" on 11th March 2022 in Melbourne. An online version was provided for those who could not attend.

Being a health professional means lifelong learning. Knowledge needs to be kept up to date, especially healthcare environments.

The ABA wrote to health providers across the Murray region, including the large catchment area of Albury Wodonga Health, North East Health and Alpine Health. The successful nurses and breastfeeding counselors were asked to return to their communities and share knowledge from the seminar, providing professional development to their peers.

Tracy Birchall, an ABA counsellor and health professional from Shepparton said "This is a really exciting time emerging from COVID19 restrictions, to be able to attend a conference in Melbourne for face to face learning again."

This is the largest group of health professionals the ABA Murray group has ever sponsored to attend the seminars. The ABA Murray group is active throughout the border region of New South Wales and Victoria, taking in Corryong, Albury, Wodonga, Wangaratta, Mansfield, Shepparton, Echuca, Deniliquin, Swan Hill, and Sunraysia.

Australian Breastfeeding Association also offers 24 hour helpline assistance on the National Breastfeeding Helpline. The National Breastfeeding Helpline is supported by funding from the Australian Government. For breastfeeding support, anyone can call 1800 mum2mum or 1800 686 268, 24 hours a day, every day of the year. The trained volunteers offer a listening ear, reassurance and suggestions.

the 2009 fires. Huge dead mountain ash trunks tower over the rejuvenating forest like silent sentinels, remind all of the havoc this area has seen.



Did you know?

That only about 1% of new cars sold in Australia are electric. This is way behind the global average of 4%, or 75% in Norway.

This is going to change! With fuel prices going through the roof and EV charging infrastructure rolling out across the country, governments are predicting that 50% of new cars sold will be electric by 2030 (and I personally think it will be much higher!). Already Queensland is looking at making the ownership of EVs cheaper for its residents, and it's likely that other states will follow suit.

Recently, I drove down to Melbourne in my diesel ute and on the way home filled up about 2/3rds of a tank (50 litres) and it cost me \$106! I audibly gasped when I saw the fuel pump. The week before I drove an EV home from Melbourne and the same

trip cost me about \$6.

There are a few reasons electric vehicles are much cheaper to run than conventional cars that a lot of people don't consider or think about.

1. Most of the time you can charge them from home and if you have solar, hopefully

- you can get home from work early enough (especially in summer) to catch some sun and charge them for free.
- 2. They don't need their yearly service! Also, their engines have far less parts and needs than conventional petrol cars, so they don't need oil, water in the radiator etc.

Over the next few years we are going to see a huge rollout of fast chargers across the country and this is going to make travelling longer distances easier and faster.

Share the fruit, not the flies

Share the overflow of fruit and vegetables from your garden with neighbours in jams or sauces this autumn and reduce the risk of spreading Queensland fruit fly (QFF).

Agriculture Victoria Statewide Fruit Fly Coordinator Cathy Mansfield said homegrown fruit and vegetables can look great on the outside but still be infested with maggots inside. "Instead of sharing your backyard bounty fresh, cut it up and use it to make preserves or pastes as this will go a long way to stopping the spread of QFF around your neighbourhood," Ms Mansfield said. "Cutting open fruit and vegetables is one of the best ways to check for QFF, so whether you're part of a big family sauce day or working solo in the kitchen keep an eye out for creamy coloured maggots inside your plums, peaches, quinces or tomatoes," Ms Mansfield said.

To stop maggots from developing into adults, any infested fruit and vegetables should be sealed inside a plastic bag and placed in a freezer for two days or microwaved or boiled to kill any maggots. Alternatively, double-seal fruit or vegetables inside two plastic bags and place in the sun for at least 14 days, then discard in your rubbish bin (not the green waste bin or your compost).

Queensland fruit fly can remain active in autumn, with some surviving over winter by sheltering in trees. Keeping your garden free from unwanted fallen fruit and rotten fruit will stop QFF from breeding in your backyard.

Agriculture Victoria has <u>provided a wide range of resources on its website to support home</u> <u>gardeners</u> control QFF, including tips on monitoring, garden hygiene, netting, baiting, insecticides and trapping.

Home gardeners can also seek advice and purchase QFF traps, exclusion netting, baits and insecticides from nurseries, home garden stores and online retailers.

'LET'S LOVE LOUDER' - A FLOOD RELIEF CONCERT

In February 2019, the Yackandandah Public Hall saw over 350 people flow through its doors in support of the local bushfire crisis throughout North East Victoria. 'Let's Love Loud' was an event curated by local singer/songwriter, Candice McLeod and raised over \$13,000.

On Friday, April 1st- just two years later- the Yackandandah community will come together yet again, to raise much needed funds for the flood-affected communities of New South Wales. This time, the event urges folks to 'Love Louder', with natural disasters sadly becoming more frequent and devastating the world over.

Curator, Candice McLeod, local songwriter and founder of 'Two Little Troubadours' boutique event company, shares her passion for the event and explains why it is so important to support community near **and** far.

"On the evening that Lismore, NSW literally submerged underwater, I was receiving social media notifications from multiple friends up north, in a widespread call for help. The following day, it became very clear that sufficient on-the-ground help wasn't coming for those in immediate need. Friends of mine were stranded without homes, clothes, food or any way of physically getting these basic necessities to them. Disaster management literally landed in the hands of nearby communities, who personally deployed volunteers in a desperate attempt to secure safety to those in emergent situations.

"Northern Rivers musician and influencer, Ziggy Alberts, made a personal call-out for financial donations, quickly followed by a team of pilots making on-the-ground airdrops containing medical and food supplies to stranded local communities. Other individual friends of mine set up crowd-funding campaigns and personally transported supplies to the few communities they could access by car. On the night they lost their home, Local Lismore duo and dear friends of mine, 'The Hussy Hicks', shared a real-time video to the public of their dangerous roof-top kayak escape. If this wasn't enough, one half of the duo, Julz Parker, also made a boat rescue to their elderly neighbour — also stranded on his roof whilst the waters rose, with no SES help available until daylight. Unfortunately, this is not just a one-off story.

"These horrific accounts of friends in need keep flowing in, alongside the lack of support where it is needed most. There just weren't, and still aren't, enough hands and hearts behind these suffering communities, desperately trying to rebuild their lives after the floods. It is my hope, that 'Let's Love Louder' connects us all on a human level, sparking change and support through intimate songwriting and story telling. These continuing natural disasters are real for all of us, whether you're directly affected, or otherwise. We're all in this together, with a deep responsibility to take care of each other, and the planet we call home" said Candice.

The 'Let's Love Louder' Relief Concerts kicks off at 7pm, featuring This Way North; Benny Williams; Yours, Georgina; Julian James; & Candice McLeod.



YACK GARDEN CLUB

UNDER THE ARBOUR - A chat with club member, Teresa Ellison

You made a big transition from your two-acre



property, where you once conducted a nursery business, to a house block. What resources did you use to plan and develop your new garden?

I was lucky, during COVID I had plenty of time to sit and watch videos, and I watched heaps of them. I concentrated on container gardening and gardening in small spaces. They were inspirational in helping me see how productive small gardens can be.

You have terraced your ornamental garden, was this always in the plan?

Yes, the cut of the site lent itself to terracing. I imagined the rock retainer wall and the terracing followed. I was very grateful for the expert advice given by Jim from 'Mossy Jim's Rocks'. Having expert help did make the job easier.

What about your vegetable garden, you have something special, can

I experimented with a lot of different styles of container gardens, finally settling on two systems. I have two beds constructed using the Hügelkultur system (you can google this). It involves filling most of the bed with logs and bark chips to conserve moisture and this also saves on the amount of potting mix needed. The

you tell us about it?

second system I am using are wicking beds, made from large garbage bins, connected by an automatic float. I am lucky, my husband made these for me after watching a video. You can't go past getting the right help.

What are you growing in your edible garden?

I have planted lots of fruiting trees: fig, pomegranate, olive, mandarin, orange, lime & lemon.

In the ground I have: rhubarb, rosemary and chives. In individual raised beds I have six blueberry bushes. They needed specialised soil as they won't grow in our clay soil. In the container beds I have: strawberries, tomatoes, eggplants, zucchini, cucumber, pumpkin, potatoes, carrots, celery & herbs.

You are not going to starve! Have you finished your plan or is there something else you would like to do – is there room?

I don't think a true gardener is ever finished planning. I would like to put in another bed & experiment with growing corn. I'm planning three

> more fruit trees to plant this winter; apple, cherry and maybe a stone fruit. Where I have some gaps in the ornamental garden, I am going to incorporate as much food crops without spoiling the overall ambiance. This is where my new trees will go.

Have you got one last tip for those who have a small space to grow a garden?

Your soil health is the most important requirement for a healthy garden, especially for your vegetables in raised beds.

My compost heap and worm farm are my two most valuable assets.

A GARDEN TIP - Planting bulbs

Prepare now for winter and spring-flowering bulbs ... you too can wander lonely as a cloud amongst your daffodils, freesias and jonguils; plant them (pointy end up) in late March and April, and select the best. Group at least six together to get a great display. Plant in full sun and in well-drained soil. Generally, dig your hole two to three times deeper than the bulb (there are exceptions so read up if you are not sure.) Mix compost into your planting holes, they love organic matter. Water in well to encourage roots becoming established. Bulbs are generally frost tolerant, but you can help them along by covering up once they start to poke up above the soil in early spring. Use a frost blanket (inexpensive and readily available at garden shops.)
