

## AGENCY OF SCULPTURE IN BIG AWARD SCOOP

### BEN GILBERT AND TEAM TAKE OUT MAJOR AILA 2022 AWARD

Ben's business, Agency of Sculpture in collaboration with Outlines Landscape Architecture, recently won the 2022 Australian Institute of Landscape Architects Play Spaces state award with their dragon playground project for Arcadia Estate, Flanagan Avenue, Officer on the outskirts of Melbourne. It is now in the running for a national award.

This glorious creature was made in the huge Yack workshop during Covid – with Ryan Turner, Tom Rochow, Jake Henderson, Chris Henderson, Jack Opperman, Jake Mitcheson & Ben Gilbert all working on it.

Ben designed the dragon and play elements, and his team built and installed it. The dragon is 50 metres long, and was made with stainless steel and red gum. All work was undertaken in-house.

Landscape design was coordinated with Outlines Landscape Architecture, and Glenn Romanis undertook the wonderful timber carvings. It is open to the public.

The project overview describes it as an exciting and magical playground drawing on the 'arcadia' theme the new residential estate is named after. The Dragon Park draws visitors from far and wide, even attracting its own Facebook group. Children of different ages are drawn into the mouth of a giant dragon's head, sliding down the other side and encountering another world – a charred log forest, escaping bush creatures, and swings hung from a dragon's tail. Australian animal sculptures inhabit the playground adding to the theme of the fantastical creature that has crash landed into the familiar park landscape.


Congratulations to the Agency of Sculpture, and lucky Arcadia Estate, having such a beautiful piece of sculpture to fire the imagination of its children.

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## IT'S ALL ABOUT THE TEAM

Yackandandah firefighter Ruth Yule well remembers just how powerless she felt when the Black Saturday fires of 2009 "came very close" to her and husband's property at Bruarong.

At the time her husband Denis Brown, a life-long CFA volunteer, was fighting the fire on neighbouring properties together with other members of the Yackandandah Fire Brigade, and Ruth was at home.

As Ruth says: "It was that feeling of being powerless which was one of my motivations for joining the Brigade; the other being that my friend, Margrit Beemster, said she was thinking of joining the Brigade and why didn't we do it together, I thought, yep, I'd give it a go. We also had a good role model in Jennie McKern who was a Lieutenant at the time.

"I did the initial training expecting I was never going to feel confident getting on the back of the truck but by the end of the training I did feel confident enough."

That was back in 2013, and Ruth, who is now 73 years of age, has been an active operational member of the Brigade ever since. In 2019 she also took on the role of the Brigade's Fire Equipment Maintenance

Officer.

Looking back over her past nine years with the Brigade and what she has learnt, Ruth says it is not so much specific skills "but that I no longer feel powerless when there is a fire. I feel confident that I know what to do and my training kicks in.

Other things I appreciate about being a member of the Brigade is that it pushes me way beyond my comfort zone in that I'm not mechanical, have trouble figuring out my left from my right, and I hate the heat; and that the strength of the Brigade is in its supportive culture and inclusiveness. So, if there are tasks I feel I can't do I don't feel bad about that because I know I can ask somebody else on the team to do it because it is all about the team."

Ruth says while there is no one incident that stands out in her memory from her years in the Brigade, what does stand out is that now when the pager goes off she switches into "firefighter mode" and follows her training.

"And that training carries over into other things," says Ruth citing an example of where she was driving to work and saw a car beside the road

with "a person rolling around on the side of the Freeway."

Her training kicked in. She parked her car safely on the side of the road, called Triple Zero, spoke to the person and administered First Aid.

Ruth is one of the Brigade's older members. "I think it is important that CFA members, as they get older, recognise where their strengths and limitations are, and recognise when it is no longer safe for you to do particular tasks," says Ruth. "For example, I recently gave up my currency for operating Breathing Apparatus (BA) because while I certainly am still strong enough to carry the equipment, in the environment in which I'm likely to be using BA I don't feel physically confident and I'm not going to endanger somebody else. Whereas I still feel perfectly capable of responding to a fire, getting the hoses out, putting water on a fire... and for things that require more physical strength than I might have, somebody else in the team will be able to do that."

Ruth says she took on the role of FEM Officer when she knew she would have time to do it following her retirement from teaching in 2020 and that the Brigade's previous FEM Officer, John Meyer, would mentor her into the role "which he's done really well."

The fire equipment maintenance that the Brigade undertakes is its largest regular source of income that is generated. The FEM team service some 62 premises in Yackandandah and surrounds including Yack Health, all Indigo Shire buildings in the Yackandandah and the Shire Depot, the Caravan Park and the schools. Ruth says when she originally was asked to do the FEM training in 2016 or thereabouts, she hesitated because it was outside her comfort zone but still decided to give it a go.

"But when I did the training, I actually found it interesting and it challenged me to develop new competencies," says Ruth. "The FEM officer is essentially an organising/paperwork role but, coming from a teaching background, that's something I can easily do. It gives me a way of being useful to the Brigade – and to the community as

FEM is a community service - for the medium term even if my ability to climb up and down hills may decline. I also have a really good FEM team and have more members of the Brigade ready to do the training when it becomes available because, again, it is about the team."

Being retired also means that she is almost always around to be able to respond to calls, and usually that's with Denis [as driver]

on Yackandandah Tanker 2 which is housed at the Flaggy Creek satellite station, 10km from town.

"I appreciate the fact that even though I'm now older, because I am retired, I can respond, that that I'm fit enough to be able to do so," says Ruth whose interests other than the CFA include gardening, coffee with friends, being an assistant timber worker in the family business, and President of the Bruarong Community Centre.

## A SMOKE ALARM IS A BEDROOM ESSENTIAL



Fires are fast. A small fire can spread to an entire room in minutes. Without a smoke alarm a fire is more likely to damage or destroy property. It is also more likely to cause serious injury or death.

Did you know that 72% of fatal fires start in bedrooms and living area? That when you are asleep you lose your sense of smell? That a working smoke alarm installed in all bedrooms and living areas will wake you if there is smoke? There are also specialised smoke alarm systems for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.

The CFA and FRV are recommending that smoke alarms be installed in all sleeping areas of the home including bedrooms and living areas.

250 years ago, Allans Flat would have looked very different and would have supported many species of native animals and been a good source of food for the local people.

Mining significantly changed the landscape, older locals talk about it being a totally bare site, just a "dust bowl" in their lifetime. At that time the land would have been useless to people and animals.



The land is slowly recovering from the impacts of previous human activity. If you listen and look you will hear frogs in the wetlands and possibly see several different native birds. Those of you who swim here in the summer will also know there are turtles in the water hole.

There have been other tree planting events in the area, one of the learnings from these earlier activities is that species selection is very important. The site is difficult! However, the successful species that were planted on these earlier occasions are now providing seed stock for the small native plants that are appearing across the site. As the human population continues to increase and even more land is used for housing development, it is vitally important that we value all our public land.



There is still much to be done at the site, but I hope that little by little we can restore this area, creating a small but valuable piece of native bushland which can once again support a large variety of native fauna and provide a place for people to interact happily with nature.

Thank you to Neil Padbury for growing and donating many of the plants, Indigo Shire for helping to prepare the

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# YACK CEMETERY TRUST

## Update from the Cemetery Trust

After a busy autumn maintaining the cemetery grounds, the Cemetery Trust has welcomed the slower growing period and is using this time wisely to work through a range of governance activities including policy updates, strategic planning, and a review of the risk register.

Of course as many good gardeners would know, winter still brings with it some important gardening activities, and the Trust would like to thank the Yackandandah Gardening Club for the wonderful work the club members have completed in the Memorial Rose Garden. All roses are now pruned ready for spring, and 5 replacement roses donated by the club have been planted. What a terrific contribution to this community asset.

The Cemetery Trust 'Energy for Life' Project is in full swing, with the installation of our off-grid solar photovoltaic and battery storage work commencing on 8<sup>th</sup> July. Many in the community would recall the success the Trust had gaining several grants to assist an ambitious shift toward a more mindful relationship with energy.

The Trust has commenced transitioning its range of petrol powered maintenance equipment to lighter, quieter, safer, and more efficient electric equipment in readiness for renewable energy generation. We thank our project supporters: Indigo Shire, YCDCo, Yackandandah Community Centre, Department of Health, Yack Mower Shed, Totally Renewable Yackandandah, and Sun Real Renewable Energy Systems.

### Did You Know?

Did you know that the Yackandandah Cemetery is a Class B cemetery? Class B Cemeteries are controlled by a statutory board of Trust members appointed by the Governor in Council on the recommendation of the Minister for Health under section 6 of the Cemeteries Act. So what does all this mean? This means that your local Cemetery Trust is a volunteer committee that serves the community by providing cemetery services and maintaining our public cemetery.

Accountable to the Minister for Health, the Trust is responsible for the conduct and performance of the cemetery including:

- **strategic** – setting the overall operational direction of the cemetery in line with its obligations under legislation and in line with government policies
- **stewardship** – ensuring the cemetery trust's activities reflect public sector values and employment principles
- **compliance** – ensuring a cemetery trust meets its statutory obligations
- **operational** – providing cemetery goods and services to the community.

celebrations will include inviting previous students, teachers and families to revisit our school and connect with others who have had a connection with Yackandandah Primary. We would like to collect school and class photographs to display as part of the celebration.



Astute travellers will have noticed some random earth works at the southern end of the Indigo Shire Council owned carpark at the rear of the Senior Citizens Centre in Yack. As mentioned in the previous edition of Yackity Yak, a 50 kW Electric Vehicle charger is soon to be installed. Happy days...

A local consortium of organisations is preparing to finalise the commissioning of the charger in mid-August. Totally Renewable Yackandandah, YCDCo and Indigo Power are working in collaboration to set up the charger and which will be available for public use. Indigo Power will operate the charger and secure the services of a software platform which gives EV drivers access to power and a billing system.

Fortunately, Indigo Shire Council has also identified the need to transition to clean energy and now operate four EVs as part of their fleet as part of their net zero by 2035 commitment. Equally, as the owner of the carpark, Council has also been a key partner in the planning, lease establishment and guidance for installation. A huge thanks to Indigo Shire!

# Yackandandah Community Centre

Community development is a core aspiration of the Yackandandah Community Centre and to that aim its annual Community Grants program is making a significant contribution. This year YCC gave more than \$17,000 to nine Yackandandah community organisations in order to improve facilities for members and the broader community. Several of the organisations have jumped into action and have completed their projects or have them well under way.

First of the organisations to complete their funded project, upgrading pathways to improve access to all areas of the garden, was the Yackandandah Community Garden (YCG). The garden was first established in 2014 and has become a valuable community resource and point of social connection. YCG secretary, Lee-Ann Benson, said the opportunity to access funding for improvements had meant the garden had a better capacity to cater for people of all abilities. "It's terrific to be able give people with limited mobility greater access, already the new paths have been used by someone in a wheelchair," Lee-Anne said. "In line with the environmental nature of the area we used natural crushed granite to resurface and upgrade the pathways. It also allows better accessibility for garden

equipment, it has really enabled access to the garden that was originally intended. It really needed upgrading."

She said the garden and surrounding area meant different things to the community

with a range of activities attracting people there. "It's a place for the community to meet in a non-threatening environment, a place to come and sit and reflect, people just sit by creek to think, to come and learn from local growers and a place to come and meet socially when we have celebrations," she said. "Accessing the YCC funding has been great, it was a nice simple process and the positive comments we have had about the path are fantastic."

Another organisation to benefit from YCC grants this year was local radio station, Indigo FM. The station has purchased a new computer for its Yackandandah studio, which is based at YCC, which will improve its capacity to provide programs to an extended audience.

President, Scott Landells said the new computer would effectively allow the station to connect with audiences worldwide. "One of Indigo FM's key strategic goals has been to be able to live-stream from the Yackandandah site," Scott

said. "Our previous computer was not up to the task, so we needed to a new modern computer. YCC was very generous in providing funding through its grants program. We look forward to being able to include presenters and listeners, through live-streaming, who reside outside our FM broadcast area."





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# DEFIBRILLATORS... they could save a life

Do you know what to do, or know where to find a defibrillator to help someone having a heart attack? It can be a challenging time and there is a lot to think about in an emergency situation.

The Yackandandah Community Centre (YCC) and Yackandandah Community Development Co. (YCDCo) are teaming up to identify locations of defibrillators and plan to provide some training in their use to help community members take action in the event of an emergency.

Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs) are used to help someone in sudden cardiac arrest. They are relatively easy to use. They analyse the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock to help re-establish an effective heart rhythm.

YCC and YCDCo are collaborating to identify publicly accessible AEDs in Yackandandah, determine the need for additional units in, and close to, town and install new units in conjunction with Yackandandah citizenry in general and community organisations specifically.

YCC manager, David Thorpe said that with increased numbers of residents and visitors in Yackandandah it was timely to look at strategies which can benefit the community in an emergency. "There are a number of AEDs in Yack, but some of them are not accessible 24/7 and others are not well identified," he said. "We

want to identify and publicise the location of present AEDs as well as look at providing more units in other public areas."

He said another aspect of the project was to deliver training to help community members gain the knowledge to use the units in an emergency situation. "Access to AEDs is important, especially now that we have more people living in and visiting Yack, but making sure that more people know how to, and are comfortable with using them is also important," David said. "Our intention is for YCC to work with Ambulance Victoria to deliver some training programs in the near future."

Some years ago, YCC funded an AED which is now located at the front of the CFA in High Street and also more recently, one which is located at the Osbornes Flat Hall. Rex Little, Board Member of YCDCo with responsibility for Community Commitment said "It has only been a few short weeks since I made contact with David at YCC regarding AEDs, and we have decided to embark on this project

jointly." YCDCo, a few weeks ago, also installed an AED unit at the Yackandandah servo on the forecourt, and Yackatooon Retirement Village received a YCDCo grant for an AED recently.

It would be very useful to know if there are more AEDs locally so that they can be accessed quickly if needed. 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## North East Water prices 2022-23

North East Water's prices will rise by less than inflation in 2022-23 as the water corporation works hard to keep customer bills affordable and at the same time invest in critical water and sewerage infrastructure.

Executive Corporate Services, Anthony Hernan said average bills for residential customers would increase 4.6% or approximately \$42.11 in 2022-23. Without the impact of inflation, the water volumetric price would have risen by just 0.45% this year, and the fixed charges for water and wastewater would have decreased by 2.03%, he said.

Mr Hernan said although North East Water continued to have one of the lowest average residential water bills in Australia, the corporation recognised that some customers may need help with their bill.

"North East Water has a dedicated support team ready to help customers experiencing financial difficulty paying their bill, especially those who may be experiencing financial hardship for the first time", he said.

"We have a range of easy to access programs and support services that can ease the pressure and stress for customers having difficulty paying their bill.

"This includes help with concession card discounts, access to government relief and rebate schemes, payment extensions and payment plans and referral to financial counselling.

"Supporting customers who are having difficulty paying their bills is our priority, with help just a phone call or email away."

North East Water's prices are regulated by the Essential Services Commission and were approved for an eight year period from 2018 to 2026.

Tariffs for 2022-23 will ensure the delivery of high quality water and sewerage services to 110,000 people across North East Water's 20,000 square kilometre service region which covers 39 towns.

They will also enable North East Water to invest in infrastructure including critical water and sewerage upgrades in Wangaratta and Kiewa-Tangambalanga, waste water renewals in Wodonga, Beechworth, Tallangatta and Bellbridge, and also provide support to customers experiencing financial difficulty.

### By and Large

Now totally divorced from the sea, "by and large" continues to suggest a lack of exactitude. It is a mere approximation.

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# YACK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

At the YDHS we have an abundance of stories to tell, and we love telling them. Trevor Matthews brings to you the following historical notation which is now woven into Yackandandah's history.

## REVEREND THOMAS DOWELL

A couple of years ago a document fell into our possession, outlining the sale of a farm in Herefordshire, England. The document, of some 4,000 words and including a map of the property, prompted some research. What we have found is a remarkably good, certainly well-intentioned person.

We plan a small exhibition; here are some insights into a remarkable Nineteenth Century clergyman.

Born in Exeter in 1811, and educated at Oriel College, Oxford. In 1841 Thomas began his work at the Brislington (Bristol) Lunatic asylum. In December 1841 he was appointed to the new chapel on Wellington Heath in the parish of Ledbury.

How he became owner of Hill Top, an estate just outside Ledbury, is not known to us at the moment, but he eventually sold the estate for six thousand pounds and sailed for Australia.

An extract from the Hereford Times, 17/1/1855:

*Testimonial. — We understand it in contemplation to present the Rev. Thomas Dowell with a testimonial of respect, as slight acknowledgement of his services as pastor of Wellington's Heath church, this parish, and also for his generous and kindly spirit towards the poor of Wellington's Heath division of the parish, during long course of years. It is a pleasant thing to speak of the virtues of a people, and do it sincerely and with pride, but it is a more pleasing circumstance to render honour unto man who is really deserving of it. ...*

*Seeing the utility of the garden allotment system, Mr. Dowell very kindly allotted off portion of the Hill Top Estate for allotments, which were let to the poor moderate rents this was beneficial measure for many who did not possess gardens of their own, it enabled the working man to rear vegetables cheaply for his family.*

According to The Age, 25/10/1855, Dowell arrived at Hobson's Bay on a barque, the Cornwall. He made his way to Yackandandah in 1856.

In his **A Nineteenth Century Village: Yackandandah**, Wodonga 2012, Colin

Barnard writes of Dowell's life in and around Yackandandah.

*He apparently arrived in Australia wealthy but lost much of his money on projects aimed at assisting and improving the lot of the forsaken and forlorn.*

*One such project was to Christianise the Chinese of Yackandandah, for which purpose part of his premises and a generous provision of food were set aside. A visiting Chinese gentleman brought up in the Church of England mission at Hong Kong was invited to help begin the project, and later, after the Reverend's hopes had fallen through, the Moore family was asked to form a small class of boys to be instructed in Chinese, a task which required them to learn the language by memory.*

*Another of the Rev. Dowell's schemes was an asylum he established for orphans, widows and destitute families on 400 acres of land about 16 miles from Yackandandah on Indigo Creek. Initially the Reverend settled about six families of the farm under a supervisor or governor brought from Melbourne and a 'sturdy' farm manager named Humphrey Pooley.*

*The Rev. Dowell supplied the families with all necessities and paid them wages to bring the land under cultivation, after which they would farm on their own account and give him a tithes of their produce. A school was established on the estate. Unfortunately, failure was inevitable. With the Reverend 'quick to discern worth, but no eye for the opposite', his 'so-called gentleman' governor who 'wore a high hat and did nothing for his parson's bounty except curse the dullness of country life', the governor's wife who apparently considered Pooley was there only 'to lay out her flower beds and gravelled walks, and keep her two acres of garden in proper trim', and a community of 'useless idlers' on the land, the 'able and honest'*

*Humphrey Pooley finally resigned his managership and went to a neighbouring farm. Even the veteran teacher, an ex-regimental school master from India, every six months 'drew his salary and then swilled away until it was gone.' The Rev. Dowell's farm went from bad to worse after Pooley's exit, into liability and mortgage, until finally its ownership was transferred to extinguish its debt. By February 1865 Dowell relinquished his ministry and was winding up his affairs, his house was for sale in March and reluctantly he returned to England.*

The farm was near the site of Koendidda, on what we now know as Pooley's Road. Dowell, exhausted some would say by his good works, wished to leave in 1861 but was persuaded to stay until he finally left in 1865.

1871 and 1891 censuses show he was the vicar of Evencoyd where a new



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

church was built in 1870. Evencoyd is a small (population 365 in 1866) hamlet near Kington which is now in Herefordshire. He died on 22nd January, 1897 in Hereford.

## BEHIND THE DOOR of the Newsagency and Chemist Shop

The double-fronted brick building c1868 (with addition in 2006) was in the past occupied for some years by Charles Falck, a watchmaker who was quite famous for his skill. Two of his clocks are on display in the Burke Museum in Beechworth. The premises was also the first site of Haig's General Produce and Fancy Goods shop. An earlier timber shop was occupied by the Isaacs, where it is assumed Alfred Isaacs operated his business as a tailor. Alfred was the father of Isaac Isaacs, Australia's first Australian born Governor General. There is much to learn about this famous past resident of Yackandandah, and you can visit the Museum to find out more.



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## SO - WHY BUY AN EV FROM KILOWATT CARS?

My motivation for buying an electric car was to reduce my personal CO2 emissions. I did this after I had done everything else I could think of to reduce my greenhouse gas emissions in my home and life style. Transport was the last thing on my list as it was the most expensive.

Two friends were also interested in electric cars. We did our research, becoming familiar with some of the terminology, working out what we wanted/needed. We then went looking at local EVs on sale. This was fun checking them out with friends. I kept talking about EVs and this paid off as another friend told me of Kilowatt Cars in Yack who were importing 2nd hand Nissan Leaf EVs from Japan. This got a tick from me as this is one of the three Rs - Reusing.

These Nissan Leafs are imported from Japan and one of the advantages is they are also right-hand drive. It's important to check out battery life with second hand EVs.

I decided to buy a second-hand Nissan Leaf through Kilowatt Cars. My two friends have decided to buy new EV's online which should be delivered in July. They are new makes so in my mind they are as yet untried. They are still waiting, and I have been driving my car since February!

So - what gets a tick?

- ✓ My car had low kms and was in near perfect condition;
- ✓ It has a 62 Kw battery and its battery health when checked was 95%. Covering over 330 km plus on a charge;
- ✓ I liked the Nissan Leaf as it has been around for a while and its reputation is good;
- ✓ It was available right now;
- ✓ It is made in Japan and, to me, this suggests it is quality;
- ✓ I had a choice of colour;
- ✓ It was \$10K less than the same car new;
- ✓ Customer service has been excellent both before and after sale. Russell answers all my questions no matter how elementary. And continues to do so;
- ✓ Local follow up servicing is available, and
- ✓ We got to test drive the car a few times before we bought it with Russell explaining all the features such as the 'e-pedal'.

What I like about the car

- ☺ It's quiet, it's smooth. As there is no gear box there is no jerky gear changing. I don't have to go to the service station, and this saves not just money but also time. I simply plug my car into the power point in my garage and it's ready in the morning. It's a nippy car to drive, accelerates brilliantly and handles well, thank goodness for cruise control as its soooo easy to speed!
- ☺ I love the electric door lock which only requires me to have the key in my pocket, no rummaging through pockets or bags to find it especially when my hands are full.
- ☺ The e-pedal is great, this puts power back into the battery when breaking or going down a hill. It also enables the car to start breaking as soon as you take your foot off the accelerator. This also saves on brake pads. There are no oil changes, fuel filters, oil filters and air filters needed! What a cost saving - it's great.
- ☺ It is compatible with my phone so my contact list, apps, maps etc are all there. It is connected to Siri so phone calls are easy.

**Yack Creek Distillery's Cellar Door and dog-friendly grounds**

Yack Creek Distillery was established in 2016 where Jamie Heritage and a mate were discussing business opportunities, both having a passion for whisky and rum decided to explore the possibilities of how they could make their own. Not long after that, Jamie undertook a university short course in malting and brewing to refine his skills and to experiment with different types of grain, molasses and barrels.

The Distillery is situated 2 kilometres out of the township of Yackandandah on acreage with the Creek to the east and the Stanley State Forest to the south. The Yack Creek water used in the creation of the spirits stems from the Stanley Forest hills and includes brown trout and the Murray Spiny Crayfish, hence the logo was born from the crayfish.

The distillery uses a 1000 litre copper & glass tower still with stainless columns and a 130 litre stainless & cooper modular high column still.

The two stills allow flexibility to manufacture different products and enable experimentation. The spirit neutrals are created on premise from Australian

sourced grain and molasses and the young orchard on the property that was established 3 years ago assists in supplying our flavours and garnishes.

What is also important to us is the opportunity to use local produce such as berries and truffles to make our gins, therefore supporting other local producers.

Whisky and rum have always been Jamie's main interest while vodka and gin have developed along the same way. Experimenting and enjoying the huge flavours and profiles possible with gin is so interesting.

Whisky is in depth

too where a minor change in the process or recipe can make a large difference to the flavour and its profile. We record our processes and recipes within our database to enable us to hopefully reproduce any whisky or rum should we desire. Our current stock of barrels includes American Oak, French Oak and ex-red wine used to age our whiskey's and rums with a number of second-hand barrels being locally sourced from around the region.

Jamie likes to create a diverse number of products however, keeping

it in small batch quantities consisting of between 80 to 150 bottles. The aim is to keep the distillery a micro business that will produce small batches for release throughout the year.

Craft beer has been added to Yack Creek's repertoire in February this year where Jamie and his father, John have created ales, bitters, IPAs, lagers and stouts for those who are looking for something different. They have aged several beers in barrels previously used to mature the distillery's whiskey's and rums.

For the past two and a half years, Jamie and his partner, Paula have been running a successful on-line business for their spirits and added a cellar door, which opened in December 2020. To accommodate more people indoors during the winter period, they have recently extended the cellar door room. Visitors to the distillery can experience the range of whisky, rum, vodka, gin and craft beer all brewed and distilled in-house as a family owned and operated local business.

The distillery invites people to bring their own picnic and enjoy the surrounds while tasting our spirits and craft beer, or to create your own platter from the selection of cheese, dips, olives, pastes and salamis on offer.

The Epic Mountain Bike Trail provides a beautiful walk from the Yackandandah township past the Gorge along the Yackandandah Creek leading them out onto the distillery surrounds which are also dog friendly.

Yack Creek Distillery took out the Champion Victorian Distillery 2020 in the Australian Distilled Spirits Awards (ADSA) run by The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria (RASV). They also won Champion Australian Micro Batch Spirit 2020 for their Blackstrap Rum and Silver and Bronze for a number of their whiskey's and gins.

Miranda grew up in Yackandandah attending the kindergarten and primary school here and then Wodonga High School. She now lives in Canberra and works for the Commonwealth Government as a General Manager in the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water.*

You think you leave forever. And you do. But also, where you live now there is a pagan circle on the mountain that seeks to summon the magic back into the land, and up on the hill there was a door carved into the tree which led, not to another land, but to another level of this reality. You remember going there, once.

You think you leave forever. And you do. The distance between the bus stop and the top of the hill is nowhere near as far as it once was. The post office is boarded up. In the school grounds there's not a portable in sight. There's no milk bar anymore.

You think you leave forever. And you do. But also, the first time you left, when you saw the thick Liffey moving dark and slow through a distant city, you could hear her speaking, because you learned her language staring into willow-bound current waters under the bridge.

But also, where you live now is ringed by muted green hills cloaked with eucalypts and in the autumn the trees that line the streets turn iridescent yellow, orange red and whenever you see the leaves piled up you want to kick them over and run away even if you'll get told off later in the main street.

You think you leave forever. And you do. But rhythms are written into your blood and skin, and when you visit and you're watching a band play at the Folk Festival in the back garden of the pub you sense the laneway where you and Keira Jensen picked mulberries and convinced one another that werewolves existed and met at the full moon in the memorial park and the world is full of secret doorways but they're easier to identify if someplace taught you how to talk to rivers, how to find maps in trees.

And even though you left, forever, where you live autumn mornings are still chill and clear and bright and there is a week in August where you feel the earth may never wake again but then in the darkness you smell the wattle blooming; you still walk every day on land that connects through the knobbed spine of the continent to the place where you were made.


## HORSE SENSE






## RECIPE OF THE SEASON

### Mary Berry's Simmered Red Cabbage and Cider

Easy. Serves 6

Mary Berry simmers red cabbage with redcurrant jelly and cider to create a gorgeous side dish that's bursting with sweet, tangy flavour. Red cabbage is a hearty vegetable and perfect to serve in the autumn as a delicious accompaniment to game dishes.

#### Ingredients

- |                 |                                      |
|-----------------|--------------------------------------|
| 1 tbsp          | olive oil                            |
| 2 knobs of      | butter                               |
| 1               | onion, sliced                        |
| 1kg (2lb 3oz)   | red cabbage, finely shredded         |
| 250ml (10fl oz) | cider                                |
| 4 tbsp          | redcurrant jelly                     |
|                 | Salt and freshly ground black pepper |

#### Method

- Preheat the oven to 160°C/140°C fan/Gas 3.
- Heat the oil and a knob of the butter in a deep ovenproof saucepan. Add the onion and cabbage and fry for 3–4 minutes. Add the cider and redcurrant jelly, season with salt and pepper, bring to the boil and boil for a few minutes.
- Cover the pan with a lid and place in the oven for 1-2 hours or until completely tender. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the cabbage to a warm dish, leaving the juices behind in the pan.
- Place the pan on the hob and reduce the liquid until the colour has darkened and it has reduced to a syrupy consistency. Stir in the remaining butter, remove the pan from the heat and pour the syrupy liquid over the cabbage in the dish.

Can be made up to 12 hours ahead. To reheat, put into an ovenproof dish, cover with foil and bake in a moderate oven until hot, or stir gently in a pan on the hob. Freezes well once cooked.
