

HAWKINS CONCEDES DEFEAT, WITH ONLY 671 VOTES THE DIFFERENCE

Independent candidate for Benambra Jacqui Hawkins conceded defeat in the race for Benambra, with her vote count on Sunday morning, 27th November, trailing the incumbent, Bill Tilley, by only 671 votes. Ms Hawkins spent election day travelling to each polling booth across the electorate, where her Team Yellow volunteers were out in force in a final push to secure Independent representation for the first time in Benambra's 145-year history.

Ms Hawkins said she and her volunteer team celebrated their achievements in Wodonga on Saturday night, watching the vote count teeter on a knife's edge for much of the evening, however despite "giving the electorate a good shake," she recognised this morning the result didn't fall in her favour.

"I congratulate Bill Tilley and his team on their campaign and on retaining the seat for Benambra," Ms Hawkins said. "I also congratulate the other candidates this election for the work they and their volunteers have dedicated to their campaigns and this community. "This has been an incredibly close race. "In 2018, when I first ran, 2000 votes separated myself and the incumbent, and this year, I've narrowed that to 671 votes between us. "It's amazing to

have increased my first preference share from 16.14% in 2018 to 32.2% this year."

Ms Hawkins said she was proud of the outcome and of the volunteer efforts that drove her campaign during the past four months.

"We have attracted the attention of the entire state this election, and were noted as being one of the seats to watch, thanks to the energy, commitment and power of this volunteer team," Ms Hawkins said.

"I am honoured and excited to be given this opportunity, and I look forward to working collaboratively with my fellow councillors and the community to achieve the best possible outcomes for the Shire," Cr Price said.

"These are very challenging times, not just for our Shire but across the nation and globally and I will work as hard as possible to ensure that we continue to listen to our community and respond appropriately."



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Member Profile: Cameron McKern



Cameron McKern

As the Yackandandah Fire Brigade's current Secretary/Treasurer Cameron McKern says, if you had told him 25 years ago when he was living in Melbourne that he would be a firefighter let alone a captain or an Incident Controller, he would have considered that laughable.

"At the time I thought the skills of an IT consultant were just so different to those of a firefighter," says Cameron, 58. "But fire brigades need a mixture of skills; they need those practical people who can pick up a chainsaw, who can mend a pump and they also

need those people who are calm under pressure, who can sit back and plan for the bigger picture. It's just like society. We need that mix - we need the tradies, and we need the architects."

Cameron, his wife Jennie and their two children, moved to Yackandandah in 1998. Cameron joined the Brigade in 2000; his wife Jennie a year or so

"We kept hearing the siren - this was in the days before we had display pagers," says Cameron who was sharing an office behind the old Post Office with David Larkin at the time. "So, Dave said to me, 'We are here 9 to 5 most days, we should join the Brigade and help out', so we did."

Soon after joining Cameron became the Brigade's

Secretary/Treasurer and then a Lieutenant. After six years in those roles, he became Captain, 2007- 2017.

"I still found of all the things I've done with the CFA, particularly since, Captain is one of the most rewarding roles but also one of the most demanding," says Cameron. These days Cameron, while still an active member of the Brigade, at a broader CFA scale is in his fourth year as Deputy **Group Officer for Bogong** group, and in his second year as an accredited Level 3 Incident Controller. The role of Deputy Group Officer is operational, supporting the 14 brigades within the group at Level 2 and 3 incidents. "If I'm Duty Officer and there's a Level 3 incident anywhere nearby,

it's a very busy day," says Cameron.

Cameron is one of only a handful of volunteer Level 3 Incident Controllers in the state. Across the state there are 88 Level 3 Incident Controllers including from Parks Vic and the SES. Of the volunteer controllers, four are in the Hume Region. A Level 1 Incident is typically handled by a local brigade and usually takes an hour or so; a Level 2 Incident usually goes longer, half a day or so, and may involve five or six Brigades; and a Level 3 Incident is run out of an Incident Control Centre (ICC) and is usually a multi-agency, multi-hour/day

"For a Level 3 Incident, the ICC is very much about providing support," says Cameron. "The firefighters

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in the field, the people doing the sandbagging, they are doing the work. The role of the ICC is to support them, to feed them, to water them, to feed and water the trucks (fuel and water), to provide the aircraft... but particularly it is to communicate with the community and to ensure protection of life (crews and the community)." A Level 3 Incident Controller qualification is not just for fires. A multiagency qualification it means Cameron may be an Incident Controller for any type of emergency.

"Level 3 is all hazards – we [emergency services] work as one," says Cameron, who during the floods in October, was a Level 3 Incident Controller at the Shepparton Incident Control Centre for four night shifts. He was also an Incident Control at the Wodonga Quarry flood in 2016, and during the 2019/20 summer bushfires was Incident Controller for nine or 10 twelve-hour shifts including at Ovens, Wodonga and Albury, NSW.

Initially Cameron studied and completed his Level 3 Planning Officer course but, after being asked to by the District, changed direction and aimed to become a Level 3 Incident Controller. It took six years for Cameron to build up his "portfolio of evidence" which he successfully presented two years ago to a panel which included representatives from DELWP, SES, Emergency Management Victoria, and CFA and a psychologist.

"I'm very conscious of the responsibility that goes with the role and all Incident Controllers are probably aware that their decisions are likely to be reviewed with the benefit of hindsight," says Cameron. "That said, I find the role challenging and being challenged is a good thing. I find it mentally stimulating, you work with some really good people, and even though I'm in an air-conditioned room, I feel like I make a difference. As a volunteer, I'm really conscious of what is happening in the field and I try to manage the incident with that in mind; to utilise volunteers well. I also live in a vulnerable community so I'm conscious of what vulnerable communities want to hear in terms of community messaging, and what they consider timely."

Cameron has attended more than 570 incidents; everything from false alarms to motor vehicle accidents to possums under gutters to major bushfires. "The 2009 fires because they were burning on Yackandandah's patch from Mudgegonga across to Yackandandah were significant," says Cameron. As were the fires in the Blue Mountains in 2013 when Cameron led the first CFA strike team to go to the fires. "While I do have competing interests

on bad days from my different CFA roles, the Brigade is still very much my priority," says Cameron. "While I've stepped back from delivering training a little, I'm still looking forward to mentoring newer and younger firefighters."

Cameron says he has gained a lot from being involved in the CFA. "Something that the most active members of our brigade have in common is a sense of community," says Cameron who, other than his commitment to the CFA, was on the Yackandandah Primary School council for seven years, six years as President, and one of founding seven of YCDCo.

"I get a lot out of it as well as what I put in because Yack really does have that sense of community, and it's an appreciative community." One of his proudest moments was a few months before he finished up as captain.

"There was a Level 2 incident out at Tangambalanga and Yack had two trucks there," he recalls. "The relief crew came in, and from memory, it was seven people, six of whom were under 30 years of age. I was really proud that as a Brigade we had encouraged enough younger people so we had that representation."

Something else he is proud of was the increase in the number of women in the Brigade during his time as captain. "When I finished as captain, a significant proportion of the Brigade were women, in fact, 40% of our Lieutenants were women," says Cameron. "I hope one of the changes in the Brigade through me was that it became less 'blokey' and more welcoming; that it felt like a safe, comfortable place for a woman to be where it didn't matter whether you were male or female, you were just a firefighter." One of these female firefighters is his wife, Jennie, who was a Lieutenant for fifteen years and is now also a qualified strike team leader. "For me having a partner in the Brigade has been absolutely fantastic," says Cameron. "Jennie and I work well together, with complementary firefighting skills. We tag team well. When multiple shifts were involved, one of us would do the shift night, and the

other one the day shift."

Testing our hot fire skills

For the first time in a several years, members of the Yackandandah Fire Brigade attended the

Victorian Emergency Management Training Centre (VEMTC) at Wangaratta as a group on Saturday, November 5. The campus provides members with practical firefighting scenarios in a controlled and realistic environment. The 10 members were presented with a car fire under a carport, a singlestorey house fire, a running grass fire, a power pole fire, a motor vehicle accident and a fire which started as a car on fire at a petrol station which escalated to two cars, a petrol pump and two large gas bottles on fire which really tested the skills of the members.

"VEMTC is a fantastic facility which gives us the opportunity to come up against difficult hot fire scenarios in a controlled environment," said Brigade Training Officer, Lt. Chris Wingard. "Every bit of realistic training we can do better prepares us as firefighters to help protect our communities."

Bogong Group Exercise

Yackandandah was the host of this year's Bogong Group Exercise, which was held on Sunday, 6th November. The event brings brigades across the group together to engage in a range of training exercises. It's a great opportunity to meet and work with our fellow firefighters, and to familiarise ourselves with each others' trucks. This year 56 volunteers from 12 brigades including Allans Flat,

Yackandandah, Kiewa, Kergunyah, Gundowring, Sandy Creek, Wooragee, Beechworth, Tawonga, Stanley and Mt Beauty took part in the exercise.

"Due to COVID it's been a while since the Brigades in the Group (which extends from Falls Creek to Kiewa, across to Stanley via Allans Flat and Yackandandah and back through Dederang) got together to do some training," said Brigade Training Officer Lt. Chris Wingard who helped coordinate the day. "This year focused on a bit of

'show and tell'. We don't always get the opportunity to catch up with our fellow firefighters from other Brigades so don't necessarily know what new equipment has been added. Take for example Mt.



Yackandandah Cemetery – A Sustainable, Contemporary and Progressive Trust

Renewable Energy - The Cemetery Trust formally launched its Energy for Life project in October, marking the conclusion of the Trust's transition to renewable energy and electric maintenance equipment. Trustee Paul Anderson said "A key strategic objective of the trust is to ensure that our policies remain contemporary and aligned with community values. When it comes to community values, Yackandandah stands out on the national stage for its focus on sustainability. We are so pleased to join so many others in the community combatting climate change."

Nature Section - In November, the Cemetery Trust ratified its new Nature

Section into policy. The Nature Section is a designated non-denominational area of land within the Yackandandah Cemetery that will accept both Traditional and Natural Burials.

Natural burials encourage the nutrients in a body to return to the earth in the most environmentally friendly way possible. They allow for natural decomposition with minimal impact on the surrounding ecosystem. Natural burials are shallower in depth than traditional burials, and prohibit artificial caskets, embalming chemicals, and non-compostable clothing and buried artefacts and mementoes. Trustee David Lerch said "The Nature Section is also defined by a unique approach to natural

stone memorials, vegetation use and management, and the characteristics of natural landscape features are complemented in the layout if interment sites".

On Saturday 12th November 2022, the Yackandandah community came together to celebrate the opening of the 'Yack Recycle Hub'. Member for Indi, Helen Haines and her predecessor, Cathy McGowan, were in attendance to unveil the new facility. The hub was created by community group Plasticwise, as a collection point for common household items (not recyclable in the yellow-lidded Council recycling bin). The accepted items fall into six main categories: teeth cleaning products, sports and active shoes, plastic bread tags, dish and air care products, writing implements and razor products.

This exciting initiative was made possible with the help of Halve Waste, who supported the project through a community grant. The grant funding went towards printing costs for the signage. Local design company Springfolk Creative provided all the signage design and website creation, pro bono. The filing cabinets were offered by donation.

The inspiration for the project came from a Japanese village with a population of around 1,500 people. In Kamikatsu, there is no waste collection service, therefore all household and business waste must be sorted by the residents themselves. Items are sorted into 45 different categories at a centralised recycling facility. After being washed and dried, plastics, glass and metals are separated by colour and grade. The complex system acts as a deterrent for waste production due to the inconvenience of sorting the waste into 45 different categories.

As Helen Haines said in the Hub's launch-day speech, "That small town in Japan probably didn't think they'd influence the small town of Yackandandah. And this town... probably didn't think it would influence other small towns around the nation with many things that the people of Yackandandah have done. Leadership from everyday people in

How to use the Yack Recycle Hub

Due to funding limitations, Yack has just six categories at this time. The signage provides easy-to-follow instructions for how to recycle each item and pictures of the items accepted. For more information, scan the QR code to access the Plasticwise website and the full list of accepted items. If the drawer is full, please don't leave any items on the ground or outside the recycling cabinet. Instead, help out the Plasticwise volunteers by getting in touch with the group by phone or email. This way we can empty it as soon as possible. As the project matures, the website will also provide valuable advice for alternative recycling solutions for items not yet accepted in the Yack Hub.

Plasticwise are a community group who strive to make Yackandandah a more sustainable place to live. We are always open to new members. If you want to join the fight against plastic, call Sarah on 0439 864 935. And don't forget to keep Plasticwise in mind when you're donating your points at Foodworks Yackandandah!

RECIPE OF THE SEASON

Tomato and Watermelon Gazpacho By Yotam Ottolenghi

Serves six to eight

Ingredients

- 2kg ripe tomatoes (about 20), peeled and roughly chopped (1.9kg net)
- 5 cloves garlic, peeled and roughly chopped
- 6 celery stalks, pale parts and leaves, all roughly chopped (450g net)
- 1 small onion, roughly chopped (140g net)
- 400g watermelon flesh, seeds removed
- 100g crustless white bread, broken into small chunks
- 150ml tomato passata (or tomato juice)
- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 200ml olive oil, plus extra for drizzling
- 15g basil leaves
- Coarse salt and black pepper

Croutons

- 150g crustless white bread, broken into 2-3cm chunks
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 1½ tbsp red wine vinegar



Method

- First make the croutons. Preheat the oven to 180C. Place the bread in a medium bowl along with the oil, vinegar and 1 teaspoon of salt. Place a griddle pan on a high heat, add the croutons and cook for 2 minutes, turning until all sides are slightly charred and starting to crispen. Transfer from the pan onto a baking tray and place in the oven for about 12 minutes, until golden brown and crispy. Set aside to cool.
- Place the tomatoes, garlic, celery, onion, watermelon, bread,



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passata and 10 grams of basil in a blender or large bowl along with 1½ teaspoon of salt and a good grind of black pepper. Blend until smooth and then, with the blender still going, add the vinegar and olive oil. Refrigerate until needed

To serve, pour the soup into individual bowls and top with the croutons. Tear the remaining basil and sprinkle it on top of each portion, along with a final drizzle of oil. Finish with a little sea salt and serve at once.



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Yackandandah Community Centre

A fine evening ensured that the community were able to gather for the Yackandandah Community Centre Open House on 4th November. A good crowd took the opportunity to socialise, indulge in some free food and music and learn about YCC's recent achievements and future plans and projects.

Chair, Karen Keegan announced two projects YCC is developing in collaboration with other Yackandandah organisations. "YCC has initiated a community resilience project which

will help the community be better prepared for, survive and recover from an emergency," she said. 'We are working with the Red Cross RediCommunities program, along with key Yack organisations and individuals to determine what infrastructure or equipment already exists in Yack and to start the conversations about how we help the community best manage during an emergency.

"It is well recognised that communities which are well prepared are better able to cope with an emergency and recover quicker. This is an exciting

project which we will be encouraging the community to get involved in." She said YCC was also collaborating with YCDCo to ensure sufficient defibrillators are available at strategic locations around Yackandandah. "We are working to identify the location of existing defibrillators, ensure they are available 24/7, purchase and install additional units at key locations."

YCC manager, David Thorpe said the YCC committee were enthusiastic about informing the community about YCC activities and inviting people into the Centre to see first-hand the recent improvements to services and equipment. "The response from the community was terrific, we wanted to have the BBQ outside and the musicians performing at the front of the building as a way of encouraging the community to come along, so a fine evening

was very welcome after all the rain," he said.

"Our aim was to give the community a better understanding of what YCC does, how we connect with and support our community. We have recently completed a new Strategic Plan for the Centre, it has been a great opportunity to reimagine what YCC does and what we can offer the community. So, the Open House was a great way of introducing some of the changes we have made and talk about some of the community projects we have coming up." He said the Centre had played an important role in community connection and support during the past couple of years, and the committee had worked to improve the facility and meeting space.

"Some of our achievements during COVID lockdowns included initiating the Yackandandah Community Initiative, which was a collaboration between the main organisations and groups in Yack, that got together to discuss how we could work collectively to ensure our community remained safe and connected," he said. "There were several great projects which came out of that including providing free or low-cost hand sanitiser, the development of a business directory for businesses able to trade during the lockdowns. And the establishment of Yack Chat with Indigo FM, which allowed community members to connect with presenters on the radio, live-toair for the first time."

He said the committee had also been keen to improve the meeting room, which has recently had an array of state-of-the-art audio-visual equipment installed. "And we are really proud of the YCC Community Grants that we have been able to award to Yack community groups for projects which go towards improving facilities for Yack locals," he said. "Earlier this year we provided more than \$13,000 in grants to nine community groups. All the funds for the Community Grants come from profits from or Op Shop on High Street. It's terrific to be able to put money back into our community and it is the efforts of our dedicated volunteers which makes this possible."



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Observers of the dramatic weather events over the past 3 years will also have noted the impact of the weather on a stable electricity supply. Close to home, most people in the Upper Murray were without power for up to three weeks after the 2019 fires. The June 2021 storm across southern Victoria left more than

500,000 properties without power – for some that stretched to four weeks.

During extreme weather, it is mighty hard and often dangerous, to maintain the massive National Energy Market network infrastructure and its systems. These observations leave a question. How prepared is our community for sustained power outages? How do ensure our most vulnerable receive care?

With others, Totally Renewable Yackandandah (TRY) has been turning its mind to these questions for about 4 years. This consideration has resulted in solar, battery and generators on both the Yack CFA and the SES. When the power goes out – and of most relevance during emergencies, our amazing volunteers can keep on with the task of protecting people and places.

Similarly, there are modest sized batteries at both the Yackandandah Public Hall and the Sports Park. At best, these batteries will keep the lights on, but won't provide the broader services so essential during sustained

outages - communications, air conditioning, catering, toileting/showers, shelter and professional help. Fortunately, Yackandandah Health and YCDCo also have generators capable of powering their needed services.

In emergencies and sustained outages, generators can provide highly valued role – controllable power for

single buildings, but have the limitation of being loud, polluting and requiring petrol or diesel to continue and that may not always be possible.

TRY is working on a broader energy resilience campaign, and in support of the larger township 'emergency readiness' leadership by the Yackandandah **Community Centre** (YCC). The effort by TRY is working on three specific projects to ensure we do have electricity for times of emergency in critical buildings. The focus is on incorporating larger batteries at the Public Hall, YCC and the Sports Park, and then establishing mechanisms to provide a suitably sized and flexible trailer-mounted generator so people can quickly receive the services provided by electricity.

More broadly, we continue to support people to consider the purchase a solar and battery for homes or businesses - to get the cost savings, emissions reductions and enjoy the option for a redundant power supply.



Play – this is how we do it

Play is a powerful tool – it's not just fun and games at Kinder but also full of diverse and wonderful learning opportunities! All children love to play – it's in their nature.

Studies have shown that play helps children develop a wide range of lifelong skills which significantly impact upon future learning and development. Play offers children physical, emotional, social, cognitive, creative and communicative learning opportunities. We believe taking play outdoors - whether in the Kinder's playground or Bush Kinder environs - enriches a child's learning experience even further; offering opportunities to explore, discover and appreciate the natural world whilst also being active, testing physical limits, learning safe risk-taking, testing physical limits, developing fine motor skills and the joy of getting messy. In addition to the physical and cognitive benefits, outdoor play helps children to develop a sense of curiosity, an appreciation for nature, social relationships with their teachers and other children and a sense of belonging.

We aim to stimulate our little learners through free play and structured activities whilst encouraging them to shape their own outdoor experiences. Their happy, smiling faces and eagerness to demonstrate their abilities suggests to us that we are on the right track. It is a joy to see children actively shape their own outdoor experiences independently and with friends and teamwork.

Here's how we do it:

Water Play

When the children run through a sprinkler, splash in puddles, engineer mini waterfalls, build moats around sandcastles in the sandpit and explore the Bush Kinder creek waterway – it's no surprise that water play days are some of the most popular events at Kinder!



The fun and freedom to create great play and learning opportunities all ties into the Healthy Bodies unit of our Health & Wellbeing Achievement Program [HWAP].

On a grown-up thought note - water play has also been shown to be an age-friendly way to explore early foundations of physics!

Gardening Play

As part of our HWAP, our own seasonal vegetable and herb gardens and wicking beds are situated in our outdoor play area. Learning how to grow vegetables and herbs, including caring for the growing plants and harvesting, are important skills in maintaining a healthy world now and into the future. By planting and nurturing our gardens, the children are learning about food sustainability, responsibility and caring for their environment. This marries well into our curriculum to build an understanding of food production and life cycles and the intricate connections between all living things – from worms, to butterflies, to birds, to food production and people. We hope our own beehive might yield some honey in 2023. So many of our children are demonstrating sustainability knowledge

already gained from their family's own lifestyle practices and bringing this to Kinder.

Playground & Bush Kinder

Our playgrounds combine traditional play structures and nature play structures to encourage the children's climbing, building, balance and physical fitness skills. Whether it's building castles in the sand pit, climbing ladder arches, negotiating little bridges and boardwalks, balancing on the stone spinners, zipping along on the flying fox or clambering around the stone turtle structure – they all serve to enhance children's physical fitness, whilst offering opportunities to experiment with teamwork and explore their imagination.

We are all very conscious of society's growing awareness to address children's sedentary lifestyles and growing obesity challenges, so we advocate strongly for play to build co-ordination, strength and opportunities for exploring spatial awareness and how the body moves in space.

We are happy to answer any questions on our play-based program and welcome visitors to tour the centre.

Kinder staff hope everyone is enjoying some quality time together these holidays and we look forward to welcoming existing and new families back to Kinder in January 2023.

Fire Hazards

Ratepayers are advised that inspections of properties for fire hazards, or potential fire hazards, by the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer will commence in Rutherglen, Wahgunyah, Chiltern, Barnawartha, Yackandandah, Kiewa-Tangambalanga, Beechworth and Stanley townships over coming weeks depending on weather conditions.

Owners/occupiers whose properties are overgrown with grass, weeds or other vegetation or contain rubbish which constitutes or will constitute a fire hazard, are requested to clean them up as soon as possible.

Following the inspections, Fire Prevention Notices will be issued, where necessary, requiring hazards to be removed within fourteen days of the notice. Non-compliance with directions will result in work being carried out by Council at the expense of the owners.

The Country Fire Authority Act 1958 prescribes the penalty for non-compliance of \$1,849 for an on the spot fine, or a fine of up to \$22,200 or twelve months prison or both.

Residents are also advised that permits to burn are required to be obtained from the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer, or by the Country Fire Authority, by any person wishing to burn off during the Declared Fire Danger

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YACK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Whereas history cannot be changed, the stories to keep the past fresh and alive, can constantly evolve, and it is what the Historical Society takes pride in doing.

We recently conducted a Cemetery Walk focusing on families that experienced the loss of more than one child due to illness. The work of volunteer, Thelma Buchanan, is to be applauded for her coordination of the event and the extensive research she undertook to bring this history to us, engaging with many descendants of the graves visited.

The Historical Society would also like to thank Dr. Rebecca McGowan who was on board to explain how diseases that caused the death of children in the 1900s, such as measles, scarlatina, cholera, whooping cough and diphtheria, are preventable today.

Yackandandah Folk Festival

Local Volunteer in Profile John Bentley

John and his wife Chris originally bought land here in Yackandandah back in 1994. John was working in Melbourne at the time for a business systems firm. The Bentleys were looking for the ideal as it satisfied all of their criteria and was situated close to a branch of John's work. Over the next few years, John and Chris spent many weekends here, developing their

land with gardens and other infrastructure. During this time, they got to know the community and the locals very well. 2001 saw them build and move into their new home.

A few years
later, John's
organisational
and computer
skills came to
the notice of folk
festival organisers,
and he joined YFF as
the Billeting Manager
in 2005, taking over
the reins from Sharon
Emmet. John set about
developing the billeting system
further, resulting in what is now an
extensively detailed database.

John volunteered his time in this important role between January and April every year for the past 17 years, until his retirement after the 2019 festival. His job involves surveying the accommodation needs of festival performers from both out of town and overseas and matching them to locals with similar outlooks who have volunteered to host performers and have themselves been surveyed by John, checking such things as preferred age range, type and number of rooms, dietary needs and whether they mind having toddlers or young children around. Once he had all the necessary information, John matched everyone together. He then wrote to all billet hosts and performers every year, detailing each initial arrangement. Many follow ups are required before

the final arrangements are made and confirmed for both parties. Contact details are passed between the hosts and their billets so they can sort out the fine details, but John remained in contact with everyone throughout the lead up to the festival, to make sure they were happy throughout. John also carried out post event surveys with

hosts, taking careful note of any issues and ensuring these were addressed prior to the next festival.

community who have volunteered their time selflessly to the festival continuously over many years.

Naturally, John will be actively involved in the handover process with all the necessary paperwork, guidelines and helpful advice passed on to the new person. 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WHAT A YEAR FOR WETLANDS, FROGS AND LEARNING!


The last few months have been wonderful for our wetlands. The frogs are calling, birds are nesting, insects are pollinating and we are all learning!

Yackandandah Landcare hosted a Frog Walk and Talk with Karen Retra in late October at our newly named Whiskey Flat Wetland. Parents and children were keen to find out what frog species were at home, so Karen

identified several species by call on the spot.

We heard the Eastern Froglet, Eastern Signbearing Froglet, Green Tree Frog and Pobblebonk or Banjo

habitats, and locations. You can even record calls and upload them so an expert can identify them for you!

We also had Prof David Watson talk about the Wonders of Mistletoe at the hall in August. He explained how mistletoe provides nectar, shelter, shade and ground litter for hundreds of birds, possums, reptiles and insects. It does not kill trees directly but if trees are already sick or dying, mistletoe will dominate thereby still providing loads of goodies! We have four species of mistletoe in our region so keep a look out for the beautiful flowers over summer.

Chris Tracey showed Grades 5-6 at Yack Primary School how to store and manage the data they collected from water samples at the two wetlands in

So far the results show water quality is very good in both wetlands. They will venture out again before years end to take summer samples and com-

pare with the winter results.

A new Native Plant Growing Group has formed in Yack! We are often short of local species for planting days so our tree growers will collect seed and try their hand at growing seedlings! Peter Mourik from Wooragee and Neil Padbury from Yack, kindly ran training days on how to identify species, treat seed

if necessary and tips on growing. If anyone is interested in having a go, we have a guide to get you started.

The Rowdy Flat project will kick off this summer with an information session on Sunday 11th December, 10am to 12pm at Osbornes Flat Hall.

The aim is to do weed control and bush regeneration from Mongans Lane to the Sewerage Farm. Working bees will be organised on a regular basis so keep an eye out for notices in Yack Landcare Facebook and noticeboards around town.



This month we have a 12/2017, 40kwh Nissan Leaf up for sale (1WJ-7BB).

It's done a few more kilometres than some of our other offerings (87,000 km), but being electric, this really doesn't matter. The car itself is still in very good overall condition, and comes with lots of great standard features and options. It's Wonderful White (keep the heat out on these hot summer days), has heated front seats and steering wheel (for those chilly Winter days), adaptive cruise control and much more. What condition is the battery in I hear you say (one of the most important parts of an EV)? It still has an excellent 87% State of Health reading (the 40 and 62kwh Leaf batteries are proving to be extremely reliable). Having a 40kwh battery gives you plenty of range for running around on, and with a bit of planning, longer journeys can be undertaken.

This Leaf we are doing as a Christmas special at \$37,990 driveaway (registered until 4th April, 2023). Comes with the normal Kilowatt Cars 6 month/7000 km warranty, plus our 3 year battery warranty (yes, there are terms and conditions!! Check out our website for all that at www.kilowattcars.com.au.

My not-so-new EV and Me: A Love Story by Tom Colcott



We bought our EV about twelve months ago. The thing that struck both of us almost immediately was that the EV became the favourite car to drive because of its quietness and smooth ride compared to the diesel ute. Our first service was a welcome surprise coming in at just over \$100, an

unthinkable service bill for any other car we've owned (so cheap!!).

We have a first-generation Nissan Leaf with what is now regarded as a tiny EV battery (24 kwh) so the range is limited to around 90 kms. This is around the hills of Yack and Wooragee, but as we had hoped, having another car with a longer range for extended trips, the Leaf has worked well.

We live off-grid, so charging the EV was something we were initially anxious about. But we got a power outlet installed that only comes on when our home battery hits 100% and then cuts out again when it falls to 90%. We always plug the car in when we get home and very rarely have low battery when we need to use it again.

Overall, we have had a great experience owning and driving an EV. There are some everyday differences to traditional cars; like not having to go to the petrol station, but instead plugging your car in at home, but this quickly becomes the norm, and you appreciate the convenience of just charging at home without trips to the servo!

By far and away in terms of driving an EV most things are exactly the same as driving the cars we are used to -- only quieter, cheaper and we love the fact that it's zero emission.

The Kilowatt Car Corner by Russell Klose

The second Budget of the year was handed down in October 2022 and it was a bit of a boon for electric vehicles. There is increasing acknowledgement that electric vehicles are part of the solution to Australia tackling climate change, particularly as our electricity grid continues to rapidly shift from one powered by coal and gas to a renewably powered one.

The Budget looked to address some of the key factors holding Australians back from purchasing electric vehicles:

- 1. Cost, through a tax rebate and also removing tariffs on some electric vehicles and,
- 2. Range anxiety, by committing to build out another 117 new chargers on key routes across Australia.

It's a start but it's not enough and once again communities like Yackandandah, are leading the government in this space. Transport is about 17% of Australia's climate emissions and we need to be doing all we can to replace petrol powered cars with electric ones.

Not only will this be better for people's health (air pollution from the burning of fossil fuels kills an estimated 9 million people each year) and the climate, but electric vehicles will likely soon be used as batteries to power our houses and help stabilise the electricity grid - providing financial benefits to people who feed power in at peak times. This is on top of the fact that I drive about 250 kms a week in an EV and pay on average about \$10/week to power it (yes, I'm fortunate enough to live in a house and have solar installed). The other huge bonus, often overlooked, is the lack of servicing costs as well. No oil changes, no spark plugs, injectors, air filters and all those other costly little items!!

But for me, the best thing about electric vehicles (and why I am increasingly becoming their biggest advocate) is they're a genuine dream to drive. And with more charging stations coming, range anxiety will be less of a concern.

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Christmas Crackers (for Ian N)


Christmas crackers are of comparatively recent times, dating back to the middle of the nineteenth century, and are said to be of French origin. In their earliest form in France, crackers were sweets or bon-bons enclosed in twists of coloured paper. An English pastrycook named Tom Smith saw these bon-bons while visiting Paris. Smith's novel idea did not catch on at first. Then, on Christmas night in 1846, as he sat in front of this fireplace with its crackling logs, he got the idea of imitating this sound. He did this by inserting a small explosive in the paper tube, which was set off with a bang by pulling from both sides. This saw the birth of the popular and appropriately named "cracker".

'HABITAT GARDENS OF ALBURY-WODONGA' — NEW BOOK FOR YACK LIBRARY

The joy of spotting tawny frogmouths huddling on your Hills hoist, bluebanded bees buzzing in your dianella or echidnas stopping for a bath is

indescribable. It's magic moments like these that spur many gardeners to create more habitat for wildlife in their gardens.

A new coffee table photo book inspiring residents to create such habitat is now available from Yackandandah Library and electronically through Wodonga Urban Landcare Network's website. 'Habitat Gardens of Albury-Wodonga' is a 40-page book produced by Gardens for Wildlife Albury-Wodonga, featuring more than 100 images from eight local gardens, each providing rich inspiration for novice green thumbs to experienced wildlife gardeners.

Habitat gardens do more than provide us with pretty visitors to admire. They play a critical role in species preservation. Urban sprawl and land-clearing have led to significant habitat loss, species extinction and reduction in native animal populations across our country. Climate change is making matters worse and challenging the resilience of all species. Albury-Wodonga region is not immune to these impacts, with 51 animal species listed as threatened in our area.

Smaller, more fragmented patches of native bushland make it difficult for wildlife to travel across the landscape for food, water, shelter, breeding, and migratory purposes. By creating habitat in domestic gardens, we are providing native wildlife with vital stepping stones through the urban landscape and linking parks, reserves and wildlife corridors. Even small habitat gardens have the potential to provide temporary and longer-term refuge for native birds, insects, reptiles and small mammals.

Habitat gardening also improves our health

and wellbeing, just as any gardening does. The physical and psychological benefits of exercise, fresh air and time in nature have long been understood.


> Habitat gardeners enjoy a greater sense of purpose and enhanced self-esteem, made all the greater for knowing they are caring for the natural environment.

> There is no perfect habitat garden. Small to big, flat to steep, formal to informal, cottage-style to contemporary, or the natural bush look; while habitat gardens share many common elements, outward appearances can vary markedly. The habitat gardens featured in this book were selected to illustrate a cross-section of gardens.

Local libraries with copies of the book include Wodonga, Albury, Lavington, Beechworth, Yackandandah, Rutherglen and Tallangatta. The online copy can be accessed at: bit.ly/awgardens

dog men who are employed to set trap lines and lay baits through the back country adjoining farm land. Yes, at times it's a harsh country.

Running for twenty five years and started as a fundraiser by Bruce (school principal), Pud, Lou and all - the great local volunteers for the Valley's Primary School while it was open. What great assets such a small country school were able to deliver to its students because of the ride. It's now organised by Bullioh Football and Netball Club.

I've done the ride seven or eight times, but not for some years. Back in the early 2000s, I rode Drum and led Snow my packhorse, from my place at Staghorn Flat to the Tallangatta Ride, a trip of approximately 125 kms and five nights camped out. At the time I was recovering from a serious injury – yes! Horse related...

Back then I put some miles into my horses, planned campsites (water and spring grass), access through private property. Some landholders I knew, some I didn't – all were very helpful.

The big day arrived, down some back lanes and over Simpson's Gap and camped by the Kiewa River at the Kergunyah

Reserve. Fish and chips from Rossie Reynolds' shop – yummo! Then over the Gundowring hills to camp over the top of Upper Sandy Creek. Maremma guard dogs patrolled the adjacent paddocks protecting stock while I slept.

I dropped down to the Mitta Highway and rode along a wide verge to Tallandoon, set up camp by the Mitta River. My parents and sister turned up with a cooked chook – doing it tough! After checking out my snug little camp, I'm sure they felt happier.

We ran up and along the ridge on

I camped for 2 nights on Watchingorra Creek. The ride had physically and mentally taken it out of me, so I lounged in the sun by the creek, recharging my

soul and watching my horses pig out – life's good!

I rode into the recreation reserve as Bruce and a bus load of kids were leaving (last minute jobs). I thanked the kids for looking after my F100 and float which were parked in the school yard, a good stretch of my legs away.

The mobs arrive tomorrow – bacon and eggs, roasts, cake, music and laughter, old and perhaps new friends. Then the riding starts.

Footnote - 140 riders battled rising water, bad weather and poor road conditions to ride at Tallangatta Valley. My near neighbours came from Rye, Lake Cargelligo and Kilmore – and they weren't the furtherest

travellers. A tough but very rewarding weekend.

SOLDIER BEETLES

Lately you may have found your flowers covered in elongated beetles with orange underbellies and dark brown upper part. They are mainly

intent on mating or seeking out nectar and pollen. Have no fear, these are friends not foes, so don't reach for the spray. You may need to keep your mouth shut as they fly around in their thousands. They are the Australian 'swarm' soldier beetle, a predator to the Eucalyptus leaf beetle. Their larvae are also predators, living in soil and leaf litter and are commonly found in worm farms, where they make great compost. They look like mini alligators with a velvety skin. Some people use these grubs instead of worms to compost their kitchen waste.
