

known world-wide with its setting up with extremely limited ouside assistance, and how it raised enough capital via a share float to save Yack's only fuel supply. YCDCo and the original board members have a pretty legendary



New firefighter Daniel Lopez III

The Brigade's newest firefighter Daniel Lopez III had only lived in Yack for a few months before he made the call to join the Brigade. Daniel, who moved to Yack with

his family wife, Olivia, and son Nalu,3, in

January this year, was taking a photograph of a fire truck outside the station one Saturday morning, when our now Captain, Chris Wingard, offered to show them the truck and station.

"I'd always said that when we moved to rural Australia, wherever that may be, I would like to join a local fire brigade, says Daniel, 43, who was born and raised in San Francisco, California. "I asked Chris if the brigade was taking volunteers, he said 'yes' and how to apply, and it's gone from there."

Daniel undertook his General Firefighting training and became an operational firefighter in mid-October. He is an enthusiastic member, keen to get as much experience as he can through training, on the fireground and engaging with the community.

"The really cool thing about being with the Yack Brigade is everywhere you look there is a teacher with so much experience," says Daniel. "The Brigade has been very welcoming which has really allowed me to settle into the community as well as the Brigade. That level of comfort helps you find your feet, feel accepted as part of the group, and ask questions that you might have felt hesitant about asking initially. I've never been in a place where literally everyone is your teacher."

Daniel's interest in firefighting goes back to when he was 18 years of age and how impressed he was with the firefighters when the adjacent house to his home caught fire. "Because it is San Francisco, there is maybe a 5cm gap between houses, so our home partially caught fire," says Daniel. "We had to evacuate, get low to the ground, smoke was coming through the hallways... and then the fire brigade came. The firefighters were just so composed, so calm, so well- rehearsed... I just thought it was one of the coolest things I'd ever seen."

As well as being interested in firefighting, and "everything it encompasses", Daniel also sees his being a volunteer firefighter as service to the community. "I think a community really thrives when we all take some sort of action or do our part

one I would regret if I didn't take it up." They moved to Sydney in November 2009 where they lived until 2018. They tried living on the **NSW Central Coast** for a time where their son was born but as Daniel says "we would always come to North East Victoria for holidays. We were always attracted to the mountains, the forests, and the bush."

Like many others Daniel and his wife worked from home during the COVID-19 pandemic so they knew a move to a rural area, where they could continue working from home and earning an income, was feasible. Their decision to choose Yackandandah was very much the result of serendipity.

"As soon as we rolled into Yackandandah, we just knew that this could be the place for us, and to raise children," says Daniel. "And now we are here, and we don't want to go anywhere else."

At this point in time Daniel is taking a break from his work in supply chain logistics and the corporate world, to explore other opportunities including his love of music (he played the trumpet with the Californian Youth Symphony Youth Orchestra) and composing. His wife, who works as a project manager for a childcare company, is also studying to become a herbalist. Their dream is to buy some land they can regenerate and practice permaculture.

As to the coming fire season, "I want to be as

BUSY PERIOD

The Brigade has had a busy time over the past couple of months responding to both local and regional requests to take part in community engagement activities and events, as well as training exercises, fuel reduction burns and a few callouts. Some of the activities we have been involved in were:

Yackandandah Primary School

At the invite of the Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) program run by Yackandandah Primary School, the Brigade took its pumper tanker to the school during the September school holidays on 28th September. Sixteen children had the opportunity to climb aboard and check out the truck, try their hand at coupling fire hoses and attaching

a branch, and to learn more about the Brigade and our role in the community.

Kerryn Roberts, the program's coordinator, said the idea of inviting the Brigade came from wanting to get the Yackandandah community more involved in the program.

"We are looking at trying for some grants for next year so we can run some skills sessions using local people/coaches," said Kerryn. "We are keen to trial a few new things... such as asking the Fire Brigade to come along. It's great for the kids."

Then as part of a Yackandandah Emergency Preparedness assistant educator with the event, the Brigade took along its Pumper Tanker, Tanker 1 and Ultralight

to the Yackandandah Primary School on Thursday afternoon, October 19. The event was organised by the Yackandandah Community Centre and included the SES and CERT. The kids had a great time checking out the vehicles and having a go at propelling the "little fire trucks" with a fire hose.

The event at the school was followed by a Yackandandah Emergency Preparedness Session for parents and community members at the Public Hall presented by Maureen Piera and April Padbury from the CFA with input from Brigade members.

And lastly on Monday morning, October 24, two classes from Yackandandah Primary School -Foundation and Grade 1 - visited the fire station where they had the opportunity to use a fire hose to propel the little trucks, climb aboard our fire trucks, have a look around the station and ask lots of questions! In all 40 children attended along with their teachers and parent helpers.

FIRE RESTRICTIONS IN PLACE

The Fire Danger Period for Indigo Shire will commence at **0100hrs on Monday, November 27, 2023** which means that fire restrictions come into force. You cannot light a fire in the open air unless you have a permit or comply with certain requirements. If you don't obtain a permit, you

could be breaking the law and may be prosecuted.



They have been living in Yackandandah for some four years now, and whilst Glenn is the Deputy Director of the Emergency Department at Wodonga Hospital, Heather manages their farm and livestock. Their plan is to retree a large proportion of their

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100 acre property partly to help offset their carbon emissions on their travels. They have plans for the planting of 4,000 trees, and they are both, as they quote, "plant-powered" i.e. vegans.

The type of extreme sports that they are both involved in includes BASEjumping and the nearest thing to flying - using wingsuits (fortunately with a parachute to see them safely to ground again) with Heather being the only woman in the world who has done a Himalayan BASEjump.

A husband and wife duo and extreme sport athletes, their collective achievements span the realms of medicine, exploration, and world records. Both jointly hold the Guinness World Record for the highest BASEjump (exit altitude) and the highest wingsuit BASEjump, showcasing their

indomitable spirit and passion for pushing the boundaries of human capability. With expeditions including the first to climb Mt Minto in Antarctica to ballooning over Mt Everest, Dr. Glenn Singleman is also recognised as the world's most experienced expedition doctor.

> Dr. Glenn Singleman and Heather Swan said: "We are deeply honoured to receive the Lifetime of Adventure award from the Australian Geographic Society. Adventure is about conquering the physical challenges before us and expanding our understanding of the world and human spirit. Our many expeditions symbolise our unwavering commitment to exploration and push the limits of what's possible. We hope to inspire others to explore the world and discover the boundless potential within themselves."

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THE YACKANDANDAH LIONS CLUB NEEDS YOU BEFORE IT'S TOO LATE

DOES YACK NEED A LIONS CLUB?

This is the question that the Yackandandah Lions Club

Committee are currently asking themselves. They are now reduced to 5 committee members and 3 other members who only assist on Sunday market day. Their secretary is looking to step down with no one to take on the role.

They require a minimum of 6 new active committee members, one of which needs to take on the Treasurer role, releasing Matt Smith to pick up the Secretary's role. Meredith is currently Acting President and only prepared to continue in the role if there is a functioning committee. She has personally approached many Yack residents urging them to join the Lions Club without any success. There is only until the AGM which will be held in March/April 2024 to recruit new members, and if no new members come forward, then Yackandandah Lions Club will sadly close.

Unfortunately, if the club folds, which organisation will take on the projects that Lions Club have auspiced or funded to get over the line in recent years?

WHAT DOES THE LIONS CLUB ACTUALLY DO?

They run the monthly Sunday market that raises money that is injected directly back into the Yackandandah community. This popular monthly market stimulates the Yackandandah economy by attracting many visitors to the town.

The Lions Club also manages Wellsford House enabling community access to groups such as the Garden Club and a visiting podiatrist.


WHEN AND WHERE DO LIONS MEET?



<u>Method</u>

 Preheat oven to 180C. Remove skin from ham and score a diamond pattern across the fat with a small sharp knife. Spread over scored part of ham and roast until deep-golden and crusty (1-1½ hours).

- 4. Serve ham with mango salsa and coleslaw, if you like.

Yack moving towards a power of resilience

Yackandandah is now one step closer to having a back-up power supply on key buildings via TRY's Yackandandah Emergency Readiness project. In early November TRY ordered two trailer-mounted generators and confirmed with Council a plan to upgrade the power inlets at the Public Hall and Senior Citizens Centre.


Yackandandah residents should always follow the advice of emergency services, and commonly leaving town

> early before an emergency event (fire, flood, storm, major heat wave) is the best action.

But if it remains safe to stay in Yackandandah, we will soon have expanded, preplanned options for accessible power in town, so people can charge devices, cool down or warm up, shelter from the weather and access toilets.

Big thanks to the Public Hall Committee, YCC, YCDCo and Indigo Shire Council, plus a few skilled

local people for contributing to an advisory panel. Public announcements will occur when the generators are operational – we expect mid-January.

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Quality And Reliability

Last year TRY received \$304,000 from Emergency **Recovery Victoria** to boost options for emergency power supplies at suitable buildings in town. Since then, an extra 12 kWh battery has been added to the Public Hall and a 13 kW solar system and 16 kWh battery at YCC. Both have the capability to operate when the electricity supply is out of action.

Engineering assessments have now determined the generator sizing for eight buildings

MAREE ROBERTS – CAKES BY MAREE

It's always great to catch up with Maree - nothing is ever too much of a problem and that lovely smile could be the hallmark of her business! She spared me a portion of one of her endlessly busy days, and sat down for nearly the whole interview with only one swift leap to the stove to stop something from boiling over. Her energy is extraordinary and in hearing her story about how she set up her catering business, I felt exhausted by the end of the interview.

With a view to stepping back and having a bit more time for herself, Maree confessed that her fantastic business, Marobe Cakes, is busier than it has been for quite a while! At the time of the interview (mid September) the workload wasn't so much planned as she had six cakes to make before heading off to the UK for a well earned break. This seems to be Maree's pattern of work - her cakes are so good that she is always in great demand.

Marobe Cakes has been in operation for fourteen years. It started purely as a hobby up at Keeble's Timber Gallery Café in Back Creek Road which opened in 2006 and closed five years later. After that, Maree was working with Gum Tree Pies, Sticky Tarts and also her own business, where she sold her goods at local markets. Maree mused on the struggle she had, juggling so many part time jobs. She also worked at Yackandandah Hospital, as it was then, cooking in the kitchen for the residents for around sixteen months, and then back to work with Seb at Gum Tree Pies.

For a business that started as a hobby, it soon became a full time job. Maree started cooking in her domestic kitchen which was duly registered for food production. She bought a commercial oven but realised that an extension for her work was long overdue and would free up the house which was rapidly being overtaken by the Marobe Cake business. Husband Steve, suggested that they turned one of the bedrooms into a kitchen. One of the sons converted the bedroom into the kitchen, and the business has blossomed since, completely overtaking Maree's expectations. Markets that Maree has sold produce at include Wangaratta, Oxley, Beechworth, Wagga and the Causeway at Albury-Wodonga. Maree also used to travel to the Craft Alive markets at Wodonga, Bendigo, Shepparton and Ballarat. So much time was spent travelling and the costs of that plus accommodation really saw the death knell to visiting markets for limited income. Maree now only attends the Yack Christmas market now run by the redoubtable Yackandandah Women's Shed.

recent quote from father, Les was "Grandma and Auntie Alice would be shining down on you, Maree. They would be so proud of you."

The Keeble family have a long and happy history in North East Victoria. They moved up to the Yack area some sixty six years ago into Back Creek Road, leasing a farm, and then briefly to Ovens for tobacco picking. Les Keeble, Maree's father, has been on many committees locally, he has been a District Scout Commissioner, Chair of the Yackandandah Community Centre Committee of Management, as welll as being a taxi driver and gas deliverer when they bought the Newton Store in the Yack High Street.

> Maree has 4 sons and a patient husband! They have now been in Keeble Way for 23 years, after Maree & family moved from Albury in 1990. Son Josh was involved at Yack Newsagency for over 20 years, and the other boys have all been involved in the local community. The catering gene does seem to have passed over most of the boys as none of them other than Josh have been involved with the industry! Josh's brothers started off as brickies, but have since diversified into a carpenter, a roof plumber and a boiler maker/sales person at Lucas Mills and all very busy people, - three of them living locally and one in QLD. Maree and Steve have six grandchildren - one grandson and 5 granddaughters.

> > And the plans from 2024 onwards?

There are a few bookings for next year, including a booking for a wedding cake. Maree confessed to getting very nervous particularly doing wedding cakes where there is little room for disasters! She also works closely with Jenn Wright of Juniper and Stone Florist who does the flower arrangements for some of the cakes. Juniper

These positions all come with varying benefits to give the volunteers time to enjoy the Festival whilst participating in a wonderful, well-known and respected event in the folk calendar.

Catering and cooking is clearly something than runs in Maree's genes. Maree's mother, Shirley Keeble, also cooked at Yack Health as well as at the Church Camp off Back Creek Road. Maree reflected very fondly on how her grandmother was a great cook as well, and produced huge amounts of food for fundraisers at Yackandandah Hospital. She said that there was always a piece of cake or a biscuit or two at her grandmother's home, waiting for hungry family members' visits. A

and Stone is based in the old ANZ Bank near Gum Tree Pies. Maree and Jenn work brilliantly as a team - Maree gives Jenn the cake and Jenn does the floral decorations. Another wish for 2024 is to have more time to experiment on further recipes for cakes.

I asked Maree if she was a keen cafe visitor. She said that she always checks out the cafes that she visits with a view to identifying new lines of product. She will experiment and changes ingredients sometimes - small tweaks just to improve a recipe. Her grandmother has passed on some recipes which are used to great acclaim, and she has plans to get the family cookbook from her uncle sometime to check out other recipes.

So the plan is to do just the cakes for a while, with perhaps a bit of catering, take some time to look after her parents with the assistance of other family members and planning a bit of travel. I suspect there won't be much sitting around!





The Garden Club strongly associates with a quiet community group in Yackandandah, one that works behind the scenes and which you seldom see in public. I am speaking of the Cemetery Trust. Jim Ralston, our Streetscape Coordinator, and I visited the Cemetery and talked to Ian Jenkins, who acts as the Treasurer and

Sexton and has volunteered on the Trust for twenty three years! I asked Ian about the history and ongoing management and care of our Cemetery's approximate ten acres.

The first burial recorded was fourteen-month-old Ellen Anderson on 7th Sept. 1859; up to now, there are over 3,811 interments. The Cemetery's layout consists of four main sections: Memorial, Lawn, Rose Garden and the new Nature section, which is for nontraditional burials. There is also a Chinese section

Island Strawberry tree '*Arbutus Canariersis*' and a Lawson Cypress' *Chamaecyparis lawsoniana*'. Thought to have been planted in the 1870s, they can be recognised by the brass plaques identifying them. There is also a diverse range of native grasses, herbs, orchids and lilies. The notice board at the main gates of the Cemetery lists nine varieties, including Sun Orchids, Bulbine Lily, Grass-Trigger Plant, Purple Coral Pea, Black-Antherer Flax, Native Geranium, Grey Guinea-Flower and Kangaroo Grass.

On a recent walk around the Cemetery, which the Historical Society organised as part of their Cemetery Walks program, I was delighted to find some of the various orchids and grasses less visible in gardens today. This insight inspired our collaborative chat with Ian, and I hope it may inspire readers to wander through our historic, significant, and well-cared-for plot on the outskirts of town.

where the Chinese burial footstones are apparent and a Trustees Ground section. The Rose Garden, which members of the Garden Club prune twice yearly, is for the interment of cremated remains and is non-denominational.

Maintenance of the Cemetery is based chiefly on volunteer commitment to keeping the grounds neat and safe. However, the Trust employs a person on a needs basis to assist with basic tasks. Occasional assistance comes from teams from the Beechworth Correctional Centre, the Community Work Group from Shepparton, and the Garden Club, which maintains the Rose Garden.

The Trust conducts an annual working bee on the

first Saturday in December, which is coming up on the 2nd. All community members are invited to come along and elp on the day. Ian explained the Trust enjoys excellent relationships with various bodies and services. These include funeral directors, monumental masons, gravediggers and local community groups, including the Yackandandah Garden Club, the CFA and the Historical Society. The Cemetery boasts three trees, listed as significant by the National Trust (Victoria) - An Irish Strawberry tree' Arbutus Unedo', a Canary

and Christmas can form a heartwarming tapestry of tradition, growth and wonder. It is a time of joy and giving, creating a perfect backdrop for promoting the connection between children and gardening. Tending to plants, watching them grow, and experiencing the beauty of nature's cycles can be a valuable life lesson they can share. If your child has

nurtured a plant over the past few months, talk to them about gifting it or simply picking a flower from it to give to a loved one. In this relationship, children learn the joy of tending to living things and giving them from the heart, making Christmas a truly magical experience.

GARDENING TIPS – for a hot summer

Good preparation is critical for your garden to survive the predicted hot summer. Here are some tips to help you and your plants survive the heat:

• Water early. If you water in the afternoon, allow enough time for foliage to dry out, which will help to avert mildew.



• Add soluble nutrients to the water.

- Keep the lawn long and lush. Longer turf wears better and helps prevent weeds from taking over. A trick to keeping lawns lush is to apply a handful of poultry manure per/sq metre each season.
- Do the more challenging jobs in the cool of the day. Drink regularly, wear sunscreen, a hat and protective layering of clothes.
- Take care of budding plants such as camellias. Mulch and water deeply once or twice weekly.
- Morning and early evenings are the best time to sow your new plants. Shelter them with shade cloth, mulching or even leafy branches.
- Fruit and vegetables will ripen quickly under a hot sun; pick them regularly to avoid missing out.
- Help pots to stay cool by adding light layers of mulch and positioning them out of the western sun. If they dry out, soak them in a bucket of water for half an hour and let them drain.
- Thin your crops; it will prevent undersized veggies and fruit when it comes to harvest.
- If you are going away, prepare your garden beds. Re-mulch, liquid feed, knock up some shade cloth tents, hook up an automated watering system, and ask a friend or neighbour to drop in and water if that's not possible.

CHRISTMAS BEETLES - We found this story in an old Burke's Backyard magazine.

"Where have all the Christmas beetles gone? Well, we have cleared away their habitat to build our towns, and for another thing, our bright outside lights aren't helpful. Christmas beetle larvae feed on the roots of native grasses, so won't trouble your lawn. But if a vacant lot or grassy woodland gets built on, there go your chances of seeing any true Christmas beetles in summer. Adult beetles feed mainly on eucalyptus leaves, but without the grubs, there cannot be any adults. The problem for the beetles can be our overuse of outside lights. Night-flying insects use the distant light of the moon and stars to navigate by, and by keeping the distant light striking their backs at a certain angle, they fly in a straight line. Artificial lighting is far brighter and closer, so they fly in a spiral to keep the angle to the light correct- and as a result, they end up trapped in the light. If they survive, bashing themselves senseless until dawn, they are then at the mercy of the birds and ants as they lie on the ground, too exhausted to hide. Suppose they somehow manage to survive even this ordeal the following evening. In that case, the outdoor lights return, and they're still trapped in their insect 'Hotel California' situation where they can never leave. So, please turn off your outdoor lights when you don't need them and help the beetles to survive at Christmas."



The Cemetery Trust would like to acknowledge Master Felix Anderson for his ongoing service to the Yackandandah community by volunteering at the Cemetery. Felix has been a regular volunteer at the Cemetery for over a year now, and first volunteered to earn his 'Creating a Better World' badge from the 1st Yackandandah Scout Group. Felix enjoyed it so much he has returned on an ongoing basis to help with a range of maintenance tasks. As our youngest volunteer, Felix has completed his safety induction and equipment orientation, and under supervision, is regularly seen mowing, weeding, and putting the bins out on collection day. Work undertaken by Mr. Graham Schmitt to install a further section of underground stormwater drainage is now complete. This work involved the removal of existing above ground concrete swale drains and replacing this infrastructure with a suitably sized subterranean reticulated network of stormwater pipes, noting that better stormwater management was needed to reduce safety hazards, and reduce the risk of damage to cemetery infrastructure.





What can I do with too many mangoes? Or is that an oxymoron?

With Yack to be afloat with mangoes shortly, we thought it would be a good idea to have some out of the box tips on all things mango - see also our Recipe of the Season on page 11.

Basically mix chopped mango with anything. Things like finely diced onion, chilli, coriander, garlic, lime juice, pineapple, capsicum, avocado or tomato and

serve with grilled seafood, fish or chicken. Pureeing mango on its own and freezing can save them for later if you're too inundated with them!

- Can mango be frozen? Stock up on mangoes while they're in season (October to March), then freeze them so you can enjoy them for longer. To freeze, remove the cheeks and peel. Wrap each cheek in plastic wrap and place, in a single layer, on a baking tray. Place in the freezer. Frozen mango is also pre-cleaned and pre-chopped. Better still, mango holds its texture so well while frozen that you won't even know the difference once it's thawed.
- Freeze mangos whole if they're too soft to cut open and slice. If you have a mango that is getting a little over-ripe but you're not ready to use it yet, try freezing it before it starts to go bad. Simply place the entire mango into a freezer-safe bag, label it with the date, and slide it into the freezer.
- Unripe mangoes must not be refrigerated as cooling slows down their ripening. It also makes the mangoes hard in texture. It is advisable to store only ripened mangoes in a refrigerator for that keeps them firm, sweet and fresh. Whole, ripe mangos may be stored for up to five days in the refrigerator.
- But you know what makes it even better? A squeeze of lime juice! Adding a little lime juice to freshly cut mango slices will bring out the flavour of the fruit, highlighting its sweetness and making it an even more delectable treat.
- Did you know? That the tree is evergreen, often reaching 15–18 metres (50–60 feet) in height and attaining great age.
- Worldwide, hundreds of mango cultivars are known.

Some history on VICSES for those interested in joining

SES was originally established to act as a volunteer based Civil Defence Agency that could be activated promptly in the event of a war or large scale event. In the 1960s, this role was enhanced to include management of peacetime disasters and natural disasters. In the 1970s, the Commonwealth shifted its focus from Civil Defence to more general disaster management, including storms and floods. The Victoria Civil Defence Organisation was renamed the Victoria State Emergency Service in 1975 to conduct as a general emergency management agency.

Today, the SES functions as a volunteer based emergency service across the State of Victoria. There are more than 5,500 committed and dedicated volunteers around the state who provide these services 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. VICSES undertakes a wide variety of roles including flood response, severe storms,

earthquakes, road accident rescue as well as search and rescue.




I have been thinking of going to Buttercup
