

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# THE EFFECTS OF BUSHFIRE SMOKE

I live and work on the land of the Wiradjuri, Waveroo and the Dhudhuroa people. I would like to acknowledge Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the Traditional Owners of these lands, in the spirit of reconciliation. I recognise that First Nations peoples have cared for Country and lived sustainably for millennia, and that sovereignty of this land was never ceded. I pay our respects to First Nations Elders past and present, and

to emerging leaders.

I would like to share my story of my work as a Rural Doctor. I am a rural GP, (a doctor of over 30 years' experience) working in Albury in busy General Practice. I live in Indigo Valley on the farm where I grew up, and work one day a week, in my other business (called Lifevest) where I provide preventative health programs to national companies, Local and Federal Government business across Australia and soon to be in our area in February and March working with the Indigo Shire.

In the past year, I have been very active in talking out about the impact of Climate Change on my patients, in particular, the negative effect of bushfire smoke on the placentas of my pregnant patients and the subsequent serious impact on babies born to this bushfire smoke exposure. I have been interviewed locally by ABC (Sally Sara, the World Today), ABC The Drum, 2GB, CBC, Irish News, BBC Radio and BBC World News (going out to over 100 million people) and Al Jazeera about this issue (see links below.)

I have also been involved in a newly released Amazon Documentary, called "Burning." https://www.if.com.au/ burning-trailer/ Burning is the first Australian documentary that Amazon has funded, Eva Orna (Melbourne Academy Award Winning producer who grew up in Melbourne and is now based in LA) is the director, and Kate Blanchet has produced it. It is available on Amazon Prime.

As a doctor who is focussed on preventive medicine for my patients, I want to talk about the negative impact of Climate Change on my patients and community so that we can all work urgently together, to reduce the heating of the planet. "Burning" won the Sustainable futures award at

the 2021 Sydney Film Festival. It is now shown in 240 countries around the world from the 26th November, 2021 and won a standing ovation when shown at COP26 in Glasgow. The film also features Greg Mullins (RFS), Bruce Pascoe, Tim Flannery, and the secondary school student who started school strikes for climate in Australia - Daisy Jeffery.

In September, I was invited to speak at the



Senate Enquiry to the lessons learnt from the Black Summer Bushfires 2019-2020. In particular, I called on the Federal Government to have a National Consistent Air Quality Monitoring, along with the installation of local air quality monitors connected to real time delivery of information to people's phones via a free app such as AirRater.

In 2022, I will be working with our local Federal Member, Dr Helen Haines, and also the Federal Minister for Rural Affairs, David Gillespie, to pilot

smoke apps in our local bushfire prone areas. As a rural GP, I am continually working to help protect my patients from the toxic effects of inhaled bushfire smoke. I want my community to be provided with real time accurate information on local air quality, particularly when there is toxic bushfire smoke around, so that they can act accordingly to protect themselves. I would love

to see a smoke monitor on every CFA shed and every small rural town in our area.



# A RAMBLE WITH THE EDITOR

Such a pity, particularly as Shane Nicholson and his music is brilliant, and I was one of the first to nab tickets to see him live... Let's hope that we may see it back later this year, or that 2023 will see our favourite little Folk Festival back in action again.

However, we can celebrate 100 editions of Yackity Yak and look back at its history

and what came before it. Many thanks to Moira Dale for jogging my memory of this important anniversary, and also to Susan Reynolds who helped me ferret out all sorts of interesting newspapers connected with Yackandandah at the Museum - such a font of knowledge - thanks Susan!

YCDCo is also celebrating its 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inaugural meeting to set up the now well known Servo and Rural Store. The Age have got wind of this, and some of the Board and staff had a happy couple of hours recently recounting the story of YCDCo. It will be interesting to see the Age's spin on this.

COVID-19 has now been let out of the box and we are now completely responsible for our own actions regarding this as many people escape from the cities and come north. In many ways, it's changed our habits radically. We tend to shop and run, and not spend a great deal of time where there are people we don't recognise, and our property has benefitted from that with much more gardening done! Travel more widely has disappeared for the time being and our new camper trailer still awaits its

virgin voyage some 8 months after purchase. We have been foiled largely by the weather that seems to attract torrential rain every weekend we have planned to use it! Still, ours is not to question why and we certainly don't mind the rain although

the wetter weather has brought on bouts of Barber's Pole worms (Haemonchus contortus) with the sheep locally, so keep an eye on your woollies, and if they are developing "bottle jaw" or chronic anaemia, then get them wormed PDQ with a wormer



for barbers pole. Sheep and goats so affected with this parasite develop a baggy watery pouch under the jawline amongst other symptoms, but a dose of a suitable wormer can keep this at bay. These worms can reproduce very quickly and can cause fatalities in your sheep and goats so don't ignore any likely symptoms.

It has been great not having to overly worry about really dry conditions and the likelihood of wildfires; the garden and property have rarely looked better at this time of year, and autumn is now only a matter of 5 weeks away as I write this, so we will be looking at getting in the winter's wood supply soon. The weather has really been amazingly benevolent to us with nothing over about 36°C which is miraculous for this part of the world looking back at the past 20 years or so.

It has been worrying however to see the Yack and other Shire pools having such a poor staffing attendance over the season to date. I hope our councillors are looking after their ratepayers and townships with this in mind. When speaking with locals about this and the lack of opportunities to swim, everyone has said that in this instance they are happy for the pools to make a loss and their rates to be used to balance the books. The thought of people having to travel miles and miles to use public pools is not a good one just from carbon emissions alone, and the Shire need to have a good think about the swimming facilities in the five townships and not concentrate on just one solution.

# YACKANDANDAH CFA

#### **PROFILE: LT MARGRIT BEEMSTER**

When the Brigade's 4<sup>th</sup> Lieutenant Margrit Beemster first approached the then Yackandandah Captain, Cameron McKern with the idea of "doing something more to help the Brigade" little did she realise just how involved with the CFA she would become.

"As coordinator for the Haring Lane Community Fireguard Group at the time, I'd become much more interested in fire safety and prevention and wanted to learn more," says Margrit who joined the CFA in 2013.

"Cameron suggested I do the Minimum Skills firefighting training [now General Firefighter] which I did, and, somewhat to my surprise, found I really liked the training, being on the fire truck, and being part of a team."

Since then, other than operational firefighter, Margrit has taken on a number of roles within the Brigade. These included the Brigade's Community Education and Information officer (2015-2019); Publicity and Promotions officer (2019 to the present); and 4<sup>th</sup> Lieutenant (2019 to the present). She is also a member of the Brigade's Fire Equipment Maintenance (FEM) team which services fire extinguishers around the town.

At a district level she was a member of the District 24 inaugural Women's Reference Group (2016-2019).

In her eight years with the CFA, Margrit has turned out to many local fires and incidents as well as being on strike teams to other parts of the state.

"You learn something new every time," says Margrit who qualified as a Crew

Leader last year. "And you never know quite what to expect when you get a call out. I can remember a call out to a 'toaster fire' which was so much more than that by the time we arrived."

She says the two bushfires that have had the biggest impact on her since becoming a firefighter were the Indigo Valley fire in 2015, and the Corryong fire on New Year's Eve 2019.

"With the Indigo Valley fire - my first experience of a big fire - I saw just how quickly a fire can travel, grow in size, and change direction with a wind change," she says. "With the

fire at Corryong - my first experience as a scribe in a strike team leader's vehicle - I got to see just how complex it is to protect a township from a major and unpredictable fire."

Margrit finds being a member of the Brigade is fulfilling at many levels. "I think it is good to be able to 'give back' to a community I have been part of for close to 40 years," she says. "At a personal level, it has also been very satisfying (and challenging at times) to learn new skills such as using breathing apparatus. Sometimes I think I should have joined the Brigade when I was younger as it can be very demanding physically at times, but then I wouldn't have had the time to be as active in the Brigade as I have been able to be at this stage of life. But I've always said, while I still can still climb up onto the truck I will, so I can learn as much as I can for when I no longer can... and then I might see how else I can help out, maybe in an Incident Control Centre or something like that."

Margrit is proud to be a member of the Yackandandah Brigade. "I have found the members of the Yackandandah Brigade to be, not only very welcoming and friendly, but also encouraging," she says. "While we look after the community, we also look after each other."

## **HELPING OUT A NEIGHBOUR**

It's been a very quiet summer fire season so far this season but one incident in December – a large hay



shed fire at Mudgegonga – gave us the opportunity to help out a neighbouring Brigade.

Two Yackandandah trucks – the Pumper Tanker and Tanker 2 – turned out to the fire to support the Mudgegonga Brigade, along with tankers from Myrtleford, Gapsted and Rosewhite.

#### WILL THE FIRE TRUCK MAKE IT UP YOUR DRIVEWAY?



Low overhanging branches create problems with access.

With all the rain we've been having and the warm weather, everything has been growing like mad including the trees and shrubs lining driveways. So, it is worth a reminder to check access to your property i.e., can a fire truck can get through your gate and up your driveway? Is it wide enough all the way along for a truck to get through? Are there any overhanging branches that might be in the way, particularly when the branches are wet, heavy and lower than usual? Your car may still get up the driveway, but our trucks might not be able to. The trucks measure around 2.7m wide, 3.1m high, so we need a clearance of at least 3.6m wide and 3.5m high to get through, and more if we need to manoeuvre around corners.

members who came along and helped run our craft stall, to those who contributed items to





Yackandandah is set to witness yet another neat collaboration and leap forward on a Clean Energy future. Around mid-year we will see the installation of an Electric Vehicle (EV) Charger in town.

TRY has secured a \$44,000 grant from the State Government's Zero Emissions Vehicles program that will support the installation of a 50 kW Tritium destination charger. Community-owned 'social enterprise' YCDCo will own the charger and continue to be a pivotal provider of transport fuels (and other services) in our little village. Further, in an expansion of the services of Indigo Power, they will operate and maintain the charger and connect e-car drivers with renewable energy.

This has been made possible with key funding inputs from YCDCo, as well as the contributions from Indigo Shire Council and TRY. A local business has also offered sponsorship support to see the project blossom — and with a little intrigue, their identity will not be announced until the unveiling of the charger!

Over the past 18 months, TRY has been working with Indigo Shire to identify, plan and locate this charger in

Yack. After considering closeness to the main shops, strength of the electricity grid, and suitable car parking spots, a Planning Approval has been received to install a charger at the carpark at the back of the Seniors Citizens Centre, with an entrance off Wyndham St.

The Zero Emissions Program is striving to create a dense network of electric chargers right across regional Victoria and will address a key barrier to the expanding uptake of clean energy mobility. And indeed, a key pathway to Australian States matching the boom of e-transport globally.

And for our town, yet another example of what happens when a forward 'leaning' town sees a clean energy opportunity, whether that be energy-resilient emergency services, affordable E-cars, a solar powered post office and delivery service, e-bike vegetable deliveries or microgrids.

Bring on smart energy!

# That's a Wrap! TRY's 100% Renewable Feasibility Results

After well over 12 months TRY has got to the end of our 100% Feasibility Study. Just how will we achieve a 100% renewable energy supply?

One of the most challenging aspects of widespread infrastructure change is figuring out how to do it right. An exciting finding in our 100% Feasibility Study is that Yack has already reached 60% renewables in the electricity that we use. And compared to the average rooftop solar installation density around Australia of 31%, Yack's is 58%. That's significantly higher than the leading states of SA and Qld that have an average of 40% rooftop solar installation density. For the 100% Feasibility Study, TRY teamed up with Mach2 and other consultants to analyse the best way to get our town to 100% renewables. The resulting Feasibility Study report is available on our website!

TRY is powered by volunteers, grants, donations and huge levels of community support. It is extremely important to us that these resources are used wisely, and with respect. This means ensuring that we are getting the best bang for our buck. We want to use technology that is projected to have as

much positive impact on the community as possible for an achievable cost.

This means acknowledging that supplying all of our energy needs all the time, independent of the grid (a 100% Gross target), is challenging and expensive. The more feasible end of the spectrum is a

. 100% net target, which means on average the town generates more than it Continued on Page 9



uses throughout the year . This is significantly more achievable and ten times cheaper than a 100% gross target.

When doing the modelling and analysis of Yack's energy use there are so many factors. We have taken into account infrastructure cost, suitable locations, economic



savings, reliability and resilience, and current and future energy requirements. What the study discovered is that the most cost-effective and timely way to get Yack to 100% renewables is to continue building on the work we have already started – behind-the-meter, solar and battery installations with smart energy management. This means that TRY will continue to seek funding for subsidies on solar and battery systems for residential, business and community buildings, and replace electric resistive hot water systems with efficient CO2 heat pump systems.

The study has found that if this was implemented on four hundred extra properties, plus installation of two or three community batteries, two backup diesel (or later hydrogen) generators, and an intensive energy efficiency program, we could achieve outcomes that match the whole of community needs. The study found that largescale infrastructure is not feasible in Yackandandah because of a lack of suitable land, and it requires significant grant or philanthropy inputs (\$5-8 million minimum), and also has significant regulatory hurdles. But our goal can still be reached by taking a behind-the-meter approach.

This result is hugely encouraging. It means we have huge achievements on the board already that are paying off both economically and environmentally, and have taken us a long way towards our goal. It also means that we are practiced and prepared for the work to come.

We thank the people of Yackandandah for their support and encouragement and can't wait to show you what we are going to do next!

# **Council secures Changing Places funding**

Sir Isaacs Park will be the location for Indigo Shire's first fully accessible restrooms. Indigo Shire Council has successfully secured \$110,000 under the Victorian Government's Changing Places program and will contribute \$234,000 towards the total construction cost of \$374,400.


Sir Isaacs Park was chosen following community and stakeholder consultation in late 2021 in which Council received more than 400 survey responses, with many nominating the Yackandandah location as the preferred site. Disability service providers, carers of people living with disability and Council's Community Access Committee were also involved in the consultation.

Mayor Cr Bernard Gaffney says Council has a long-term vision to transform Sir Isaacs Park into an all abilities accessible destination in Yackandandah. "The current toilet block will be replaced with unisex accessible toilets and a Changing Places facility including adult change tables and hoists," Cr Gaffney said. "The Yackandandah community is highly inclusive and aware of the barriers that the heritage town presents, as with all Indigo Shire towns. This new facility is a great step forward in removing these barriers, allowing people with disabilities to get out and about and enjoy our Shire. A Changing Places facility will provide greater access to social and tourism opportunities for people with a disability, their families and carers and we are extremely grateful to the Victorian Government for including Yackandandah in this latest round of funding."

Construction of the new facility is expected to commence mid-2022.







# TAKEN FROM ISSUE #48 OF YACKITY YAK DATED JUNE/JULY 2013

In March 2002, a notice appeared in the window of the petrol station in Yack's High Street announcing that it would be closing in ten days' time. Seven local people got together and decided to do something positive about it. We initially formed a company called the Yackandandah Community Development Company Pty Ltd (YCDCo).

YCDCo was formed with an initial goal to secure the future supply of fuel in Yackandandah. Fuel is regarded as such a basic service function for the town that it is crucial to retain. Initially, this involved taking over the operation of the existing petrol at 12 High Street, but now has progressed to longer term solutions.

Having established a company as an operating structure, the directors of YCDCo formed the view that the petrol station issue might be the 'thin end of the wedge' and that other similar issues may emerge in future which call for a concerted community-based effort/response. We therefore decided to establish the company on a semi-commercial/ semi-community basis. The idea is that the company having a commercial focus will ensure that we are not seen as a charity and is basically self-sustaining. It is locally controlled, is not beholden to politics and is not reliant on grants, subsidies or donations.

In a way, our Vision for YCDCo is to become a strong 'voice' for the broader Yackandandah community (business and residents). It is focussed on both general community-wellbeing, as well as the economic interests of the

Yackandandah community and surrounding areas.

The rationale for the existence of an organisation like YCDCo is based on the fact that the community's ability to respond quickly to issues and challenges which may arise (ie the petrol station closing) and to take positive steps to influence or control any such issues which may impact on its well-being, depends heavily on having some collective economic power and resources available in an

organization which has only the town's interests at heart. The local Council also plays an important role in this but is limited by legal, political and resource

constraints.

Therefore, the immediate goals of YCDCo were as follows:

- to undertake projects and initiatives which will economically and socially and culturally benefit the community of Yackandandah and its surrounding areas;
- to operate YCDCo on a commercially sustainable basis and generate profits to shareholders in the long term;
- to extend the ownership base of YCDCo so that it has a broadbased community ownership structure;

- to return 50% of any future profits the company generates (e.g. after operating expenses) back to community causes and projects (to be defined); and,
- to return the remaining 50% of any profits to YCDCo shareholders.

As of 5th December 2002, YCDCo Ltd became an 'unlisted public company'. What this meant is that we can have as many shareholders as we like and can raise public funds

through the issues of shares, subject to the Corporations Act. Our shares are not traded on a stock exchange (as with listed public companies). At this stage shareholders in YCDCo who

owned 11 x \$100 shares each.

In order to raise the funds necessary to build a new purposebuilt fuel outlet with the capacity to receive full semi-trailer loads of fuel, dispense fuel to more than one customer at a time, etc, an Offer Information Statement was issued.

The process was launched in the Yackandandah Public Hall with between 200 and 300 people attending. Applications for shares closed on 21st May, 2003.

The share issue was a resounding success:

Using the capital raised, together with a State Government contribution, made through the Indigo Shire to develop the Industrial Estate on which the new *Yackandandah Station* was to be located, the new service station was built, opening for trade on 5<sup>th</sup> December, 2003.

The rural supplies/hardware business opened for trade at *Yackandandah Station* on 18<sup>th</sup> February 2005. Despite some early glitches in getting the rural supplies/hardware/produce business up and running, the Board remains confident that this, together with fuel, will underpin the long-term profitability of YCDCo.

And YCDCo continues to go from strength to strength with a number of great developments at the site over the past 18 months and a very healthy bottom line.

We are always looking for active, talented board members to keep up the good work, particularly younger members of the community and women.

One of the earlier predecessors of Yackity Yak was the Yackandandah Community News which ran from March 1990 to February 1995 with Shirley Dobson as editor for the whole period. This was then incoporated into the Ovens and Murray Advertiser for a short period of time.

The Kiewa & Yackandandah Valleys' Community
News was published from September 1995 until January
1997 with Kelvin Quonoey at the helm, and was at
that point taken over by the Indigo News, again with
Kelvin as editor (operated by the Indigo Shire) in August
1997. Sadly, that didn't even last a year and it ceased
publication in April 1998 due to financial issues.

It wasn't until March 2005 when Yackity Yak first made its appearance with Zinna Davies and Julie Keeble at the helm. And the rest is really history.

One hundred issues and seventeen years on, the paper is still provided to Yack and district residences free of charge, and is also freely available at various outlets in the township including the Servo, the Post Office, the Community Centre, the Newsagency, the Shire Office, the Visitor Information Centre and the two doctors' surgeries. Like so much in Yack, it is eyed with envy by other townships who see Yack as the town where anything is possible!

Congratulations to everyone who has had something to do with this great little community newspaper. It is only by standing on the shoulders of those who came before that Yackity Yak has done so well. It really is something to be exceptionally proud of. Three cheers for Yackandandah!


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# PLANNED BURNS AROUND YACKANDANDAH - 2022

Crews from Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) Ovens Fire District will work alongside the Country Fire Authority (CFA) to carry out a planned burning program over the next few months. These planned burns will help to reduce flammable vegetation, which reduces the risk of a bushfire.

The burns planned to be delivered around Yackandandah are shown on the map. FFMVic is unable to give you an exact date when these burns will be lit as the final decision to proceed can only be made on the day of the burn, following monitoring of weather conditions and local fuel moisture levels.

We encourage you to sign up to the Planned Burns Victoria automated SMS and email notification service about any upcoming FFMVic and CFA planned burns. There is no charge to register or to receive messages. Please go to <a href="https://www.plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au">www.plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au</a> and follow the links.





# **HORSES FOR COURSES - The Silver Brumby**

A call from my brother after he watched the movie recently jogged some good but distant memories.

they were heading back up to Dinner Plain with another truck load of horses. They were preparing for the filming of the horse scenes in Elyne Mitchell's famed tale of

"Why don't you come up and check it out? Plenty of beds at the company's rented house/chalet." The horse wranglers had their own pad – about 10 horsemen/ women, truck driver, fencer etc. A weekend spent feeding (a big job with up to 80 horses) and exercising some of the riding horses around Dinner Plain. We met a young Russell Crowe, a cool bohemian, who didn't mind mixing with the rough end

Me being between jobs went up for a month's work as Deb hurriedly organised a couple of weeks off work. We spent a couple of days exercising horses around the village, then they started trucking horses from behind the pub out to location. Deb

My partner at the time, Deb – a good horsewoman - and I dropped into the Carrier's Arms for a pot. After saying hello to a few mates, I noticed two blokes and a young lady finishing a counter meal. A baby wombat slept in a basket at the blonde's feet. Barry, whom I've know for years said hello, we both sidled over and were introduced to Murray and Lisa as they explained

They then split the crew and we luckily relocated to Pretty Valley above Falls Creek with thirty plus horses for some of the helicopter shots seen at the end of the movie.

Day 1 – Plan A – we run a mob across the valley, we drop right back out of the helicopter's view. They get the footage, then it's over to us. Though we can't catch up with the runaway mob through a myriad of watercourses, rocks and low heath-like flora. Horses split, then cause mayhem amongst others and support staff back at the hut!

Day 2 – Plant B - I'm sitting out in Pretty Valley on Trembles. I pick up horses and run them 2-3 kms into holding paddocks. "Great job" everyone said. Actually, the day before had knocked the sass out of them – they just wanted to go home!

The film crew packed up, wranglers into Falls Creek to party, Deb was leaving tomorrow. A mountain hut, warm crackling fireplace – mmmm! Oh and 30 thirsty horses you had to bucket water from a dam to scooped log troughs.

So much for love and romance. Some great scenes were never captured on film. I picture the other guys and gals after a long day, running a mob of horses down Junction Plain and crossing the Victoria River and into holding paddocks whilst the movie crew watched o in wonderment. Seems like it was yesterday, not thirty years ago!



# **RECIPE OF THE SEASON**

What to do with overgrown zuccini, 6 easy suggestions for using these pesky veggies that arrive in their thousands at this time of year, or not at all!

- 1. Make side dishes.
- 2. Make zucchini soup.
- 3. Stuff zucchini with your favourite stuffing (meat, vegetable, rice, mushrooms...)
- 4. Use it in stir-fries.
- 5. Make zucchini patties mixed with potatoes.
- 6. Make zucchini sauce with tomatoes and preserve it.

# Freezing blanched zuccinis

Slice the zuccinis into thick rounds or cut into batons. Bring a pan of water to the boil. Steam blanching helps preserve produce before it's frozen by destroying enzymes that can increase how quickly foods spoil go off. Steam briefly. Pat dry, then lay the zuccinis on a second tray and freeze until solid. Transfer to a labelled resealable freezer bag and freeze for up to a year.

If you ever had this popular dish before you would have been impressed with their flavorful texture, full of salty, tasty feta cheese with a hint of fresh mint! A healthier alternative to these traditional Greek courgette balls is to bake them – best done at 180C, but make sure you brush them on the top with some olive oil to get that crunchy texture going.



#### A LITERARY SOIREE



What did she think as she sat here, often alone, her walker parked beside her – her 'Johnnie Walker Still Going Strong' as she was all those years ago. Did she remember times walking in the forest with her Johannes before war and separation changed everything? Or was it the dappled floor of the forest at the border that promised freedom but delivered captivity? Did she remember her homeland, her family, the passage of time?

The tree endures. It has weathered the years (though not as many as she who sits with me now) silent and strong, testimony to the dictates of the seed from which it grows. A clutch of acorns in a glass dish affirms the generations

in what was once her home.

A light plane chops the air as it flies overhead and I'm reminded, as she must have been, of those engines of war that dropped fire and death on cities, towns and homes, the choking smoke of loss and despair. In the silence that follows its passing, the throaty call of a magpie clears the air, rising to a carol of light, air and hope.

It is nearly ten years since she departed this world and I am joined by that other woman she loved, a companion in times of sorrow and joy – the oak tree in my life as Johannes was in hers. And as each summer brings new leaves, so life is renewed, memory is rekindled and love is replenished.

There is a scar on the branch before me, the wound where a branch was lost. It mirrors the scar on my heart, the mark of vacancy and the mark that affirms her presence, the giver of leaves, the giver of life.

# Watching "Don't Look Up" made me see my whole life of campaigning flash before me

I've broken down on TV too, trying to explain the horror of the climate crisis to those who wield power and do nothing

No wonder journalists have slated it. They've produced a hundred excuses not to watch the climate breakdown satire "Don't Look Up": it's "blunt", it's "shrill", it's "smug". But they will not name the real problem: it's about them. The movie is, in my view, a powerful demolition of the grotesque failures of public life. And the sector whose failures are most brutally exposed is the media.

While the film is fast and funny, for me, as for many environmental activists and climate scientists, it seemed all too real. I felt as if I were watching my adult life flash past me. As the scientists in the film, trying to draw attention to the approach of a planet-killing comet, bashed their heads against the Great Wall of Denial erected by the media and sought to reach politicians with 10-second attention spans, all the anger and frustration and desperation I've felt over the years boiled over.

Above all, when the scientist who had discovered the comet was pushed to the bottom of the schedule by fatuous celebrity gossip on a morning TV show and erupted in fury, I was reminded of my own mortifying loss of control on Good Morning Britain in November 2021. It was soon after the Cop26 climate conference in Glasgow, where we had seen the least serious of all governments (the UK was hosting the talks) failing to rise to the most serious of all issues. I tried, for the thousandth time, to explain what we are facing, and suddenly couldn't hold it in any longer. I burst into tears on live TV.

I still feel deeply embarrassed about it. The response on social media, like the response to the scientist in the film, was vituperative and vicious. I was faking. I was hysterical. I was mentally ill. But, knowing where we are and what we face, seeing the indifference of those who wield power, seeing how our existential crisis has been marginalised in favour

marginalised in favou of trivia and frivolity, I now realise that there would be something wrong with me if I hadn't lost it.

In fighting any great harm, in any age, we find ourselves confronting the same forces: distraction, denial and delusion. Those seeking to sound the alarm about the gathering collapse of our life-support systems soon hit the barrier that stands between us and the people we are trying to reach, a barrier called the media. With a few notable exceptions, the sector that should facilitate communication thwarts it

It's not just its individual stupidities that have become inexcusable, such as the platforms repeatedly given to climate deniers. It is the structural stupidity to which the media are committed. It's the anti-intellectualism, the hostility to new ideas and aversion to complexity. It's the absence of moral seriousness. It's the vacuous gossip about celebrities and consumables that takes precedence over the survival of life on Earth. It's the obsession with generating noise, regardless of signal. It's the reflexive align-

ment with the status quo, whatever it may be. It's the endless promotion of the views of the most selfish and antisocial people, and the exclusion of those who are trying to defend us from catastrophe, on the grounds that they are "worthy", "extreme" or "mad" (I hear from friends in the BBC that these

terms are still used there to describe environmental activists).

Even when these merchants of distraction do address the issue, they tend to shut out the experts and interview actors, singers and other celebs instead. The media's obsession with actors vindicates Guy Debord's predictions in his book The Society of the Spectacle, published in 1967. Substance is replaced by semblance, as even the most serious issues must now be articulated by people whose work involves adopting someone else's persona and speaking someone else's words. Then the same media, having turned them into spokespeople, attack

these actors as hypocrites for leading a profligate lifestyle.

Similarly, it's not just the individual failures by governments at Glasgow and elsewhere that have become inexcusable, but the entire framework of negotiations. As crucial Earth systems might be approaching their tipping point, governments still propose to address the issue with tiny increments of action, across decades. It's as if, in 2008, when Lehman Brothers collapsed and the global financial system began to sway, governments had announced that they would bail out the banks at the rate of a few million pounds a day between then and 2050. The system would have collapsed 40 years before their programme was complete.

Our central, civilisational question, I believe, is this: why do nations scramble to rescue the banks but not the planet?

So, as we race towards Earth system collapse, trying to raise the alarm feels like being trapped behind a thick plate of glass. People can see our mouths opening and closing, but they struggle to hear what we are saying. As we frantically bang the glass, we look ever crazier. And feel it. The situation is genuinely maddening. I've been working on these issues since I was 22, and full of confidence and hope. I'm about to turn 59, and the confidence is turning to cold fear, the hope to horror. As manufactured indifference ensures that we remain unheard, it becomes ever harder to know how to hold it together. I cry most days now.


#### What would you say to someone considering joining the Yack Garden Club?

The Yack Garden Club has open arms for anyone interested in gardening. We are a group of people who love to share our knowledge, to help each other with ideas and to help within our community. We love contributing to our community by way of maintaining the gardens and tubs on Yack's High Street, and pruning at the cemetery. We love a good morning tea after any garden activity, and we love to share laughter and good times. Come and join us and find out for yourself.

#### A GARDEN TIP - GROWING ROSES FROM CUTTINGS:

The best time to take cuttings is mid-summer, when the wood is semi-hard. Find a stem or heel which you can even snap off with your fingers. Cut off the flowers and trim back to one or two leaves. Dip in hormone powder or honey (or commercially bought root solution) and then plant it in a pot in a mixture of peat and sand. Cover the pot with a plastic bag or half a used plastic bottle and place in a shaded position; within six weeks roots and shoots will appear, with flowers soon after.

Another method is to take hardwood cuttings while pruning in winter. Just below a node, cut off a piece about 300mm long that includes two or three nodes or buds. Wrap in a slightly damp paper towel, seal in a plastic bag and place in the refrigerator. After one month callus tissue (like a scab) will have formed at the base of the cutting. Around the end of August, before spring, either plant it in a pot with




#### Thank you to Yack Creek Landcare and Plasticwise Yackandandah
