

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As you are aware in Australia, we are currently experiencing unprecedented times in General Practice. Medicare rebates for GP consults have been frozen since 2014. The current rebate is not high enough to cover the costs of providing primary medical care. Over the last 2 years due to COVID—19 and travel restrictions we have been unable recruit and or train overseas doctors and this has led to the

current situation that many practices are facing, being a shortage of doctors as well as increasing running costs with no increases to Medicare subsidies.

Yackandandah Health has been working very hard over the past 12 months to improve the Yackandandah Medical Centre and we are pleased to advise that we now have a team of 4 experienced GPs providing 2 GPs per day 5 days per week.

Unfortunately, during this time, the costs of providing GP service has also increased and Yackandandah Medical Centre has experienced monthly losses and although continual staff cuts have been experienced, we still have not been able to eliminate the losses.

Extensive modelling has been undertaken and revealed that unless a series of initiatives are implemented during 2023, the Yackandandah Medical Centre will need to

be closed. This is not the intent of Yackandandah Health nor in the best interests of Yackandandah Health or the Yackandandah community.

In consultation with the Yackandandah Medical Centre, the following initiatives have been recommended to be implemented from the start of February 2023:

Consultation fees will be lifted by \$20.

Louise Thornton, Midwife and Dr.

Tess Goodwin, GP outside the Yack Medical Centre

General medical procedures will be lifted by \$15.

At this stage, the Board has asked for a quarterly report to providing details of implementation of the increases & any feedback from patients & community.

We understand that these increases may seem heavy, but much deliberation has gone into these decisions, and we are hoping that in a short period of time we will see a financial turnaround which will see Yackandandah Medical Centre become sustainable by the middle of 2023.

We also have the visiting clergy who attend the facility three times a month to offer services for our


residents.

Profile: Denis Brown

When the Brigade's pagers go off, chances are that shortly after, Denis Brown will be in the driver's seat of Yackandandah Tanker 2, responding to the

call out. Tanker 2, a light tanker, is housed at the Flaggy Creek satellite station at Bruarong, just a few minutes' drive from where Denis and his wife Ruth Yule, also a firefighter, live.

Denis, 74, has been a member of the Yackandandah Brigade since 1985. He may well be one of the Brigade's longest-standing members and its oldest operational member, but he is still very fit and up to the physical demands of firefighting.

"However, I have phased my involvement in the Brigade down," says Denis. "As you get older you need to phase out to make way for the younger members. When I am no longer capable of being an active firefighter, I will definitely know that and then I'll probably take more of a role as an intelligence officer/on-ground observer, driving out to see where the fire is and reporting on what is happening. And when I can't do that, I'll probably just go into the station and help from there. You don't have to be the person holding the hose; there are other roles that are equally as important."

Denis can't envisage not being involved in the CFA. "It gets in your blood; and my over-riding reason for doing it is as a community service," says Denis. Denis's connection to the CFA goes back to his childhood when he would holiday with family at Emerald in the Dandenongs. "My great uncle, Joe Ovenden, was a member of the Emerald CFA, and from about the age of 16, when I was staying there in summer and autumn, he used to take me out, chasing fires," recalls Denis. "Back then there were numerous fires... so firefighting was instilled in me at an early age."

Denis began working as a geologist in 1969, and wherever he was --Tasmania, Queensland, Western Australia or New Zealand -- he would get involved "officially or unofficially" with the local fire brigades and help fight fires. He moved to Harrietville in

1977 and again was "unofficially" involved in the Harrietville Fire Brigade until 1980. He and Ruth then lived at Myrtleford before buying their rural property at Bruarong where these days Denis is a self-employed sawmiller/ timber merchant.

"Two weeks after moving here, [the late] Maurie Smith, who was my neighbour and captain at the time, got me into the Yackandandah Rural Fire Brigade," says Denis who was a 4th lieutenant from 1995 to 1997, 1st lieutenant for 1997 to 2001 and Brigade chairperson from 1999 to 2017. Denis was instrumental in the successful merger of the Yackandandah Rural and Yackandandah Urban Brigades which occurred in 1999; one of the first such amalgamations in the state.

The merger coincided with the introduction of the first Pumper Tankers to the CFA – tankers that are suitable for fighting both urban and bush fires - and the Brigade took delivery of its first Pumper

Tanker a few years later. "It just massively enhanced the Brigade's firefighting capacity," says Denis who was involved in the tanker's design.

While Denis can tell many a story from his years in the Brigade, particular incidents that stand out for him including the 2003 and 2009 fires, and the Barnawartha fire in 2015. This year marks the 20th anniversary of the 2003 Alpine Region and north-eastern Victoria bushfires when about 2 million hectares of land was burnt throughout the Australian Alps in Victoria, NSW and ACT. The fires started on January 8, a day of Total Fire Ban, when lightning ignited 87 fires in the North-East and East Gippsland regions. Eight of these fires joined together to form the largest fire in Victoria since the Black Friday fires in 1939.

"Yackandandah was under threat from a fire which started at Buckland Gap, went up and over through Stanley and then came barrelling down the Yack Creek under a south westerly," says Denis. "The fire came right to the top of Haring Lane and then spotted into Osbornes Flat. It was full on."

Denis, who was at the top of Haring Lane with fellow firefighter Denise Burbidge with just a trailer unit at the time, tells of how a strike team

from the Shepparton area came to their aid and stopped the fire going down Haring Lane. "2003 was Yackandandah's closest moment and we learnt a great deal," says Denis.

The next major incident was the 2009 Black Saturday fires which started on February 7, 2009. Approximately 400 fires were recorded across Victoria, affecting 78 communities. A total of 173 people died in the fires, and over 2,000 houses were lost. A number of communities suffered extensive loss of life and/or property damage as a result of major fires, including near Yackandandah.

On that day a fire started south of Beechworth in the later afternoon and went down through Barwidgee Creek, Mudgegonga, Rosewhite and Kancoona. The following morning, after a south westerly wind change, Denis went with the trailer unit to the aid of a friend in Brown's Lane, Mudgegonga with the fire spotting and dividing

into three fronts. "The fire burnt over us and the house and then kept going up towards Martin's Lane before dividing with one front headed towards Bruarong and the other two towards Mt Big Ben and Mt Jack," recalls Denis. "Just by chance, by my being there, I was able to give Cameron [Cameron McKern who was Brigade captain at the time] warning that the fire was coming his way. And then the firefight really began from Yackandandah's perspective. Once the fire was contained, we were patrolling and blacking out for the next five days."

The Barnawartha fire burnt about 6,600

hectares severely affecting communities along the Indigo Creek and Indigo Valley into Barnawartha. Three homes and twenty nine cars were destroyed, with water being assessed as unusable for domestic purposes. The fire also impacted agriculture with extensive losses to livestock, stock feed, agriculture and fencing. At one stage, before a cool wind change, the fire threatened the township of Yackandandah.

Denis, who was driving the Brigade's first Yackandandah Tanker 2 (known as the 'Yack Kid' after the late Bill Newton who bequeathed funding towards the tanker's purchase), recalls how the tanker's agility and size meant it was able to access lightly timbered country and narrow roads that were inaccessible to the heavier tankers.

"We were diving in and out everywhere, doing a great job," says Denis who purchased and built that first light tanker.

Denis says one of highlights of his time with the CFA was having Tanker 2 turn out to "quite an incident with a highly skilled all female crew in 2020." The crew included Ruth who joined the Brigade in 2014. "Having Ruth become a firefighter has transformed how we will protect our own

place," says Denis. "Ruth now has all the skills and confidence to fight a fire on a personal level if our own place is threatened. And when we are on the tanker together, it works well as we know each other's strengths and weaknesses."

Other highlights of his time with the Brigade include "seeing men come through and gain skills they haven't had before"; an increase in the number of women joining the Brigade; and the filming of the CFA training scene on Denis and Ruth's property for the movie *Strange Bedfellows*, for which the Brigade received a donation of \$10,000.

If you click on the link "learn more about Bushfire risk in your area" this takes you to a very useful page that describes five different types of fire risk

environments to help you work out which one you live in. By recognising and understanding your risk environment this will also help you to start preparing your property for fire and know what to do. For the different fire risk environments there is information on what to expect, and then what to do.

For example, if you live in an area close to, or among grass and paddocks, and there is a fire, grass more than 10cm tall will have a higher flame

height and intensity; the fire will be faster burning (grass fires can travel up to 25km per hour) than one burning through forest; fires can start

early in the day; and radiant heat (the heat created by a fire).

"What to do" includes information on preparing your property (by creating and maintaining fuel breaks around your property) and ensuring you are not caught out in the open during a grassfire.

This year, with all the growth we've had from last year's wet year, the main concern is the risk of grass fires. However, all forest or woodland can also present a bushfire risk.

THE BIG RED FIRE TRUCK

Community Fireguard Groups (CFGs) are a great way of getting to know your neighbours, and learning more about the fire risks in your local area and how to prepare both yourself and your property in case of fire. There are a number of CFGs in the Yackandandah area including the Haring Lane CFG which held its annual get together on Friday, January 20, attended by 20 people.

Fifteen years after her husband Bill passed away, she moved back into her old home at Twist Creek Rd Yack that is still in family hands, and created a new garden from the neglected area. When she became less independent, she moved to new digs with Rex's family not far along Dederang Rd from where she started. From there she went to the

two years ago, our mother became immobile and quickly declined from the vibrant person she had been until then. She began to long for her release from this world.


It was the year 1958 while she and her husband, William Frederick "Bill" McIntosh were farming on Twist Creek Road, that she responded to the message of Jesus Christ and was baptised by the Gospel Hall Christians in the Yackandandah Creek. For Mother,

her death was simply her last journey - the journey through the valley of death's shadow into the presence of Jesus Christ whom she trusted as the Son of God sent by the Father as the remedy for the defilement of our sins. We were glad to welcome all who wished to join with us in celebrating the life of Mother, Granny Mac, Aunty Sheila, Mrs McIntosh.



ASYLUM SEEKER SUPPORT IN YACKANDANDAH - PUB CHOIR AND SO MUCH MORE!

On 15 August, 2021, Afghanistan's capital city of Kabul was captured by the Taliban after a major insurgent offensive that began in May 2021. Thousands of people were forced to flee the city and their country, and as a result many vulnerable people, mostly women and children, were left fearing for their lives.

Fast forward a month later to Yackandandah where one phone call has had a rippling effect across our small, safe, rural community. That phone call was from an Afghan Australian resident who lives and works in Sydney who started

a foundation to support Afghan refugees. Through a contact in Yackandandah, he made a plea for Australian citizens to sponsor the most at-risk Afghans and propose them for visas to Australia under the Refugee and Special Humanitarian Program.

A call went out

to Yackandandah residents and the response was overwhelming. Together more than 30 asylum seekers have been sponsored by local residents. Some are members of the one family, many are women and children. Some held responsible positions within pre-Taliban Afghan government. Some are single women; some are unaccompanied minors. All are at risk and are in

hiding from the Taliban regime.

Due to the strength of the response, it was decided to start a chapter of Rural Australians for Refugees (RAR) and begin fundraising immediately in the hope that some of the applications should prove successful. As sponsorship includes being responsible for funding airfares and providing accommodation and settlement costs, the commitment is significant. With the new Labour Government there has been an increase in application processing, and we are now seeing results that is translating to action on the ground.

In the last month a number of the applicants have had the encouraging news that their applications have moved forward in the queue and have undertaken interviews with Home Affairs. This news is exciting but daunting! We are now faced with the reality of raising as much as we can to bring people to Australia and provide them with the foundations for future success for their resettlement.

To date the Yackandandah chapter of RAR has had a Community Curry dinner and two Pub Choir events, as well as many generous individual donations, and fundraising is well on the way. But we need more, and we are seeking your help! Over the next few months there will be a number of fundraising activities including Pub Choirs, Trivia nights, a Disco and much, much more. So, please keep your eyes peeled and support us wherever you can!

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

Each week, we will explore a concept related to the theme for the term. Can you guess the theme for this term using these two clues?



RECIPE OF THE SEASON

The Mothership Tomato Salad by Jamie Oliver



INGREDIENTS

- 1 kg mixed ripe tomatoes, different shapes and colours
- Sea salt & freshly ground black petter
- A good pinch of dried oregana
- Red wine or balsamic vinegar
- Extra virgin olive oil1 clove garlic, peeled and grated
- 1 fresh red chilli, seeded and chopped

DIRECTIONS

This is an incredible tomato salad but

there are two things to remember if you want to wow your guests with something so simple. The first is that you should try to get a mixture of different, tasty, home grown (if possible) tomatoes in all different shapes, sizes and colours. Second, the flavour is brought out by salting the tomatoes, so don't skip this bit. Some people get worried about putting this much salt on their food, but the bulk of it will drip off, leaving you with really beautiful, intensely flavoured tomatoes.

If you can get hold of some dried flowering oregano then do, as it has the most heavenly flavour. Oregano is dead easy to grow in the garden and dry.

Depending on the size of your tomatoes, slice some in half, some into quarters and others into uneven chunks. Straightaway this will give you the beginnings of a tomato salad that's really brave & exciting to look at and eat. Put the tomatoes into a colander & season with a good pinch of sea salt.


1. Give them a toss, season again and give a couple more tosses. The salt won't be drawn into the tomatoes; instead, it will draw any excess

moisture out, concentrating all the lovely flavours. Leave the tomatoes in the colander on top of a bowl to stand for around 15 minutes, then discard any juice that has come out of them.

 Transfer the tomatoes to a large bowl and sprinkle over the oregano. Make a dressing using 1 part vinegar to 3 parts oil, the garlic and the chili. Drizzle the tomatoes with enough dressing to coat everything nicely.

This is a fantastic tomato salad, which is totally delicious to eat on its own. It's also great served with some balls of mozzarella or some nice, grilled ciabatta bread.

Yackity Yak only puts tried and tested recipes in this section, so you can be pretty certain they will work out, but stick to the measurements given or you may have have the odd failure!

The Yackandandah **Historical Society** is keeping its gardens trim and terrific, thanks to a Community Grant from the Yackandandah Community Centre. The Museum was one of nine Yack organisations which received YCC **Community Grants** totalling more than \$17,000 in 2022.

This year's grants scheme is now open, so if your community group could use some help with funds for improvements or projects, jump onto the Yackandandah Community Centre website and register an Expression of

Interest. Register at www.ycc.org.au. Grants are awarded to community groups for projects or improvements to their facilities which will ultimately benefit the Yackandandah community.

The Historical Society received \$1,800 last year to help it replace ageing, petrol-driven garden maintenance equipment with modern, electric equipment. Vice president, Pam Noble, said the new equipment would benefit the organisation, volunteers and the wider community. "All the garden maintenance is done by volunteers so it is terrific to have some new, safer, smaller equipment," Pam said. "Our other equipment was very old and we didn't have a lot of things that we needed, such as a wheel barrow and pruners. Our garden equipment is now more environmentally friendly and complies with our environmental and sustainability policies."

YCC manager, David Thorpe said the annual grants scheme offered community organisations funds to improve their services or facilities. "Last year we had a terrific diversity of organisations and projects which YCC Grants went towards," he said. "The Golf Club purchased new tables for the clubhouse, the Riding Club upgraded electrical systems in its clubhouse, the Community Garden resurfaced paths, the Cricket Club improved the irrigation system at the Sports Park, Indigo FM got a new computer for the Yack studio, Osbornes Flat Hall installed a defibrillator, the Cemetery Trust bought new electric garden equipment and the 1st Yack Scouts group received funds for a fire pit and parade ground.

"It's great to be able to offer so many organisations a bit of help with improving things for their members and the wider community." He said funds

for grants came from proceeds of sales through the YCC Op Shop in the High Street.

"I think this is a terrific cyclic system, we are selling items donated by Yack locals to help raise funds which go back into helping local community groups make this a better place to live for everyone in our community," he said. "But the program is only possible through the efforts of our wonderful Op Shop volunteers and coordinator. They help raise the funds throughout the year, without their help the grants wouldn't be possible. And of course, thanks must go to the Yack community for donated items to the shop, as well as coming in and buying from us."

Pam Noble said the funds received from YCC had enabled the Museum to replace old equipment earlier than it would have otherwise been able to. "Having our gardens looking good makes a big difference when you are looking in from the street, so in many ways it is helping the town," she said. "Our thanks go to the YCC Committee for the

generous grant awarded to us last year under their Community Grants program. I would encourage any group with a project in mind to apply for funding under this year's grants."

YCC prioritises projects which aim to create ongoing benefits to Yackandandah, build community capacity and create positive change for the Yackandandah community.

Towards the end of 2022, many of you would have seen many students from the 5/6 classes at Yackandandah Primary School spruiking their wares and services. This was all part of '\$20 Boss', a program designed to teach students about entrepreneurship through hands-on experience.

The program provided students with \$20 of startup capital and guided them through the process of designing, creating, and managing a business. While the program was grounded in the curriculum areas of economics and financial literacy, its goal was not to make all young people entrepreneurs, but rather to promote the understanding of how the skills and mindsets developed through entrepreneurship can be transferable to other areas of life. By participating in the program, students developed valuable skills such as creativity, problem-solving, and critical thinking, which can help them confidently manage diverse challenges in the future, whether it's in work or other aspects of their lives.

As a part of the program, each business was also required to donate at least 50% of their profits to a local community group, organisation or charity, again fostering important skills such as looking beyond your own circumstances and giving back to a community. The program was a terrific success; the students donated more than \$5,600 within the community and beyond.

We completed this beautiful and varied ride in two parts, firstly in late September 2022 after we arrived in NZ, and four weeks later after completing the Otago Central Rail Trail and numerous day bike rides and hikes further south. Frequent shuttle services with a company called Cycle Journeys made it possible for us to complete a recommended section and have Chris picked up at

the end of each riding day and taken back to retrieve our hired van. We enjoyed spectacular and varied scenery and rode our leg powered bikes over many and varied surfaces: sealed road sections, rough and rocky tracks but mainly smooth shingle.

Day 1 & 2 (late September 2022)

Officially, Alps2Ocean starts at Mt Cook. After a short ride, a helicopter takes bikes and riders over the Tasman River and deposits them at Rotten Tommy. The rough shingle road then heads down the valley hugging the glacial expanse of Lake Pukaki to the start of a dedicated cycle trail to the Lake Pukaki lookout. We skipped the helicopter section but cycled a section of this rough road on our first day after a

night at a lakeside freedom camp. Mt Cook, which had been under cloud when we started riding, was unveiled as we rode. A spectacular view and a great start to our version of Alps2Ocean.

The next morning, we tackled the off road trail around the lake to the Lake Pukaki lookout. Mt Cook, a mountain of many moods, was veiled by cloud and the lake was slate grey rather than the glacial blue of yesterday. Still beautiful

though. In the afternoon we rode the section to the town of Twizel and back across the flat grassy expanse of Pukaki Flats. Mountain views were our backdrop.

Day 3 & 4 (October 29 & 30, 2022)

Four weeks later we returned ready to complete the journey to the ocean. With a shuttle organised, we left our van at Twizel with the intention of staying a night at Lake Ohau Lodge and being picked up the next day in Omarama. All went to plan. The sun shone as we rode the sealed road section besides two canals before reaching Lake Ohau and cycling on a gravel path beside the lake. Unfortunately the sun had disappeared by the time we reached the lake and the mountain views were obscured by cloud. The last stretch to the lodge

was on a sealed road again with mist over the mountains at the head of the lake.

Dinner, bed and breakfast was included in the package and, as a change from the van, we had a bed to sleep in and the company of other cyclists. We woke early next morning to clear skies and a stunning view of Lake Ohau and distant mountains. After leaving the lodge, we began the climb up to the highest point of the trail at 900 metres. The ascent was steady, at times precipitous but what made it difficult was the large loose rocks that formed the trail's surface. We bumped and bounced for over two hours. The ride was saved by rest stops to

absorb the view. This was the most difficult ascent of the entire Alps2Ocean. The reward was 27 kms of downhill, initially on a rough track, then a shingle and crunchy grey gravel road. We hardly pedalled all the way to Omarama.

Days 5 & 6 – (October 31 & November 1, 2022) Omarama to Otematata then Kurow

The next two days involved riding around the edge of two huge dams,

Lake Benmore and Lake Aviemore. These vast bodies of water have been created by the construction of huge dams. After starting out from Omarama, the trail runs down the Waitaki River Valley before connecting with Lake Benmore. Lambing season was in full swing and frolicking lambs, many of them twins, were a distraction as we rode through the farmland beside Lake Benmore. The path was benign until a point called Sailors Cutting. From the cutting, the trail was rockier and more precipitous. It was steep but spectacular riding though with views over bays and peninsulas and slab-like rock walls plunging into the water. Day 6, the day we rode over the Aviemore Dam Wall, was the only day we rode in rain!

Day 7 & 8 (November 2 & 3) Kurow to Duntroon then to Oamaru

Back to sunshine and a tailwind to push us down the valley. No roads today, a dedicated cycle path all the way. Mainly flat riding past a vineyard, through lush farmland and avenues of riverside vegetation. Closer to Duntroon, the trail wound through a sculptured wetland. Duntroon offered another pub, so we lashed out on an evening meal.

Our last day dawned bright sunny and windless. This was to be our longest day with 54 kms to go to Oamaru and the ocean. It turned out to be a varied day, mainly off road, with a visit to the appropriately named Elephant Rocks after an easy 7 km. Often the trail meandered through paddocks with some uphill sections providing great views. There was even a railway tunnel at the end of a gravel road descent. Finally, Oamaru and the ocean harbour, the end of the trail. On our version of the Alps2Ocean we rode about 300 kms over eight days.

GARDEN SAFE

Find out what's in your soil with our new citizen science program.

Waste and chemicals that pollute our air, soil and water can persist in the environment. Most chemicals enter our environment through sewage, waste, accidental discharge, or can be by-products from industrial activity. Historical contamination sources, like lead paint and leaded gasoline have also impacted urban soil quality.

Contamination can affect soil quality and impact how our veggies grow. It may also have human health implications from eating garden produce or working in the garden if contaminants are present at high concentrations.

GardenSafe is a soil testing program run by Citizen Science team at Environment Protection Authority (EPA) Victoria. The one-year pilot aims to equip community with the knowledge and resources they need to understand backyard soil quality.

GardenSafe invites Victorians to send 3 garden soil samples for screening. We will assess your sample for:

- Garden soil quality indicators, including soil composition, organic carbon, and soil nutrients phosphorus and potassium
- Trace elements, including lead, arsenic and chromium

The findings from GardenSafe will help to build EPA's understanding of contamination, especially in urban areas.

The Pond - An insight into the characters of Yackandandah - Hayden Rochow - with Rebecca Gibblie

Hayden has lived in Yackandandah since 1953 after being born in Albury's Borrt-Koi Private Hospital to parents Marjorie and Edgar Rochow in 1944. The Rochow family, including Hayden's elder sister lived in Ebden Street while Edgar worked at Younghusband's wool stores. Marjorie provided the care and love Hayden remembered, as a full-time mother.

Hayden's formal education began at Lavington Public School, and it didn't take long for Hayden to decide that school wasn't for him.


Just prior to Christmas in 1953, the family moved to their newly acquired farm on Bell's Flat Road. Life on the 180 acres in Yackandandah suited Hayden. Hayden recalled his parents using a branch of pine to fashion a Christmas tree after the first few days on the farm. A wonderfully memorable first Christmas in Yackandandah.

He was enrolled at Yackandandah Primary School under the care of Charlie McMaster, remembered as a stern and extremely strict headmaster. Sparing the rod was not a part of McMaster's brief which added to Hayden's desire to exit school at the first opportunity. A memory of Hayden's schooldays was catching the train out of Yackandandah to Benalla to see the Queen. Although Her Majesty was briefly seen, the day was marred with badly torn shorts, thanks to Mc Master attempting to assist him over a barbed wire fence. The resulting torn shorts revealing his bare posterior. Humiliated, he spent the day disguising his embarrassment.

Unlike shopping in Albury or Wodonga, 'Denny's', the current post office, and 'Dean's', Ralph's shop, delivered groceries to the farm. Ernie Smith visited the day before to take orders. Toby Britton ran the bread cart delivering freshly baked produce to farms from Damm's Bakery, located where the current Beechworth bakery is.

Edgar and Marjorie took charge of raising the

kids and milking the 50 cows and making a real go of their new enterprise. The two children were always well supported and adored. Hayden's visiting friends were fed and spoiled when visiting. Even though money was always tight, neither of the children missed out. Generosity, love, and affection were the hallmarks of Hayden's childhood.



Just before his fourteenth birthday, Hayden left school to help on the farm after his dad suffered recurring health issues. By the time he turned 19, he was working full time at Permezel's freezer works, located on the site of the current Yackandandah Motel. Ice was sold and rabbits collected. Rabbits were in such abundance and demand, portable freezers were owned by Permezel's in Tallangatta, Beechworth, Kiewa, and Mongan's Bridge. Hayden's elder sister worked at Wishart's store, the site of Sue-Ellen's old drapery. Hayden handled 9,000 pairs of rabbits a week as well as selling farm equipment. By the time Hayden turned 21 he had enough of rabbit wrangling and began work for Yackandandah

Shire, labouring, and truck driving.

Coming of age meant social activities which included the Saturday night dance at the public hall when Yackandandah football club played at home. Movies too were shown on a Friday night at the public hall. Westerns were always popular among the young men. The annual Mardi Gras on New Year's Eve was a major social event in town with dancing until dawn. The Mardi Gras included spinning wheels, live music, and a procession in town. The visiting 'Deaf and Dumb' and 'Blind' troupes performed during the year always adding to the festivities with comedy, singing and acrobatics.

Characters such as Freddie Reid, a relic from the mining era lived in a 'Bag Hut' on Bell's Flat Road. Wheat bag or hessian walls and a tin chimney made up his cottage in the late 50s and early 60s. He held a mining lease and plied his trade as one of the last true Yackandandah miners. Cars were scarce and the town was not seen as a tourist destination as it is now.

In April 1967, Hayden married Jill Draper, very much a local girl and they made their home in Windham St in May of that year with the generous assistance of his parents. The home is known as the neatest house in the street containing an abundant vegetable garden.

Three children followed, Brett, Craig and Michelle, the boys still living locally.

Hayden retired from the Indigo Shire in 2004 to pursue his interests in gardening, the Uniting Church, and Club Connection through Beechworth Health. Hayden added that Yackandandah has always been a unique community because of the honesty and integrity of its people. No one can argue with him on that!

"Wow! Fantastic to see the living history. Thank you for the work protecting our precious heritage".



Ovens and Murray Advertiser (Beechworth: 1855 - 1955), Saturday, 2 December 1876, page 5

NEW ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH AT PETTIFORD'S HILL, NEAR YACKANDANDAH. (FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

The new Catholic Church was almost complete on Pettiford's Hill when it hosted the celebration of its new building. Calico across the window spaces proved a wise move as it was a gusty night – the windows that were supplied were too small.

The crowd of 350 men, women and children were entertained by a number of amateur singers who were generally okay. However, he did comment sweetly about one of the singers "she




St. Mary's Church, Pettiford Hill, Osbornes Flat

exceeded her first effort, having gained a little more confidence: and I may here observe that the unfinished state of the building, windows out, &c., rendered its acoustic properties most unfavourable and trying for amateurs.

A male singer, described as having a pleasant baritone voice, presented two songs "in a capital and appropriate nonchalant style, which almost elicited an encore, but throughout the evening the audience judiciously avoided this."

"The room was then cleared for dancing

which was kept up till daylight, the room being double banked all round in spite of the sets of dancers on the floor. Messrs Fortescue and Downs manipuflated and vocipulated (fine words) their respective instruments till broad daylight, and all went away thoroughly sated with the evening's enjoyment."

The Trust is forever grateful for the tireless work Anna has put into the Chairperson role and we acknowledge her years of community leadership.

Nature Section – In the last addition of the Yackity Yack we announced our new policy for the Nature Section. We are pleased to say the article has prompted a lot of interest. The Trustees thought it appropriate to share the founding principles from which the Nature Section Policy was developed.

Nature Section Founding Policy Principles

 The Nature Section will be designated as a non-denominational area of land within the Yackandandah Cemetery and will accept approved interments of Human Remains (cremated ashes or bodily remains) from all faiths, cultures, and ethnicities;

- The Nature Section will accept both Traditional and Natural Burials. Natural burials will encourage the nutrients in a body to return to the earth in the most environmentally friendly way possible;
- The Nature Section will be defined by a unique approach to natural stone memorials, vegetation use and management, and the characteristics of natural landscape features and outlook;
- 4. The Places of Interment will not chart traditional horizontal grid placement, and grave sites will meander the natural curves of the landscape in accordance with the Yackandandah Cemetery Trusts design;
- The Place of Interment will have no artificial headstone, tombstone or gravesite features, and will integrate vegetation plantings from a species selection approved by the Yackandandah Cemetery Trust; and
- Place of Interments within the Nature Section will be allocated to the Rights holder based on the next available plot. Reservation of a Place of Interment will not be available in the Nature Section.

MEMENTOES AND TRIBUTE POLICY

The Yackandandah Cemetery trustees recently ratified changes to its Memento and Tribute Policy.

The following four principles were established by the Trust to support its approach to governing mementos and tributes. These overarching principles guided policy changes and have helped define items that are approved for placement as a graveside memento, floral and ornamental tribute across the different interment sections.

Memento and Tribute Policy Principles

- The Trust will prioritise the importance of maintaining an environment that is attractive, tidy and safe for all visitors, contractors, and volunteers.
- The Trust will recognise the importance of graveside mementos, floral and ornamental tributes, and the need for families to offer and maintain fitting tributes to their lost loved ones.
- The Trust will acknowledge the significant cultural, historical, and environmental values held by the cemetery and the need for staff to maintain the cemetery grounds to a high standard.
- 4. The Trust will appreciate the diverse nature of families that visit, and the difficulty in defining policy that meets individual needs, and therefore will seek to provide fair guidelines that apply uniformly to everyone.

BEGUILING BONSAI

When you say 'horticulture and art', most will imagine lush flower or veggie garden beds, full of colour, fresh food, buzzing bees and watering systems, and perhaps somewhere in the midst of all of this gift of nature, will be a stunning art piece. The garden itself can well be described as 'art', as it involves creative or imaginative talent, it can exude beauty and evoke emotional power. Come on, not many of you immediately thought of the beguiling gift of bonsai when you read 'horticulture and art'. Bonsai is the Japanese art of growing and training miniature trees in pots, this is a very simplified explanation, but not so easy to achieve.

Many gardeners are in awe of the art of bonsai, but resist from taking it up as an artistic pursuit. It does take a special kind of creative person to put the time and effort into learning, growing and creating the magic of bonsai. Here is some food for thought about bonsai, it just might urge you to find out more and maybe indulge yourself with your first bonsai. The big upside of bonsai is that they are portable, so if you rent or have regular moves, then you can always take your precious plants with you.

You can start with a big tree and cut it down, or you can plant, grow and create this way. Almost any tree or shrub can be turned into a bonsai; the key is to prune the roots and the foliage so the plant remains dwarfed. The Trident Maple has great characteristics for bonsai purposes, it is very vigorous and can develop a fat trunk and strong root system. Junipers, Port Jackson Figs, Banksias, Bottle Brush and Casuarina are other species to consider. The other key point to remember is that bonsai is a long-term endeavour. It takes time to cultivate, shape and tend to the bonsai which provides a creative journey rather than a destination. Bonsai doesn't need brute strength nor hours of labour in the sun, so it might be a more sedate horticultural and artistic activity for you, where you can still get dirt on your hands and enjoy the gift of nature. Over to you, if you want to take this journey.

- ® Involve the family in the planning and design of the garden.
- Are the tools right for your child, not too heavy and easy to handle? Owning and caring for their own tools could start a life-time appreciation to look after what belongs to them. Garden tools should be washed after each session, dried and stored in a given space.
- Grow from seedlings or seed (instructions must be explained and followed). Choose plants that are seasonal e.g., micro lettuce, or parsley will grow quickly and they can eat it!
- Add to the vegie garden by planting a flower; many varieties of marigolds will grow easily and be a delightful surprise to encourage their appreciation of the beauty of flowers.

THE LANGUAGE OF FLOWERS is centuries old...

In Victorian days flowers created a silent dialogue, being primarily used to deliver messages without a word being spoken, and often used by a suitor. How they were presented and in what condition was important, even how the ribbon was tied gave a message e.g. tied to the left, the flowers' symbolism applied to the giver, whereas tied to the right, the sentiment was in reference to the recipient. They were given to express feelings; a rose declaring "devotion", or an apple blossom showing "preference". A "Yes" answer came in the form of flowers handed over with the right hand, if the left hand was used the answer was "No", or if the unfortunate gentleman received a yellow carnation, which symbolised "disdain", he was definitely on the outer! We can appreciate the meaning of flowers being given today, inevitably to show love, appreciation, care and celebration. There is still an appreciation of the language of flowers in today's modern world and it is a blessing we no longer need to anticipate receiving a wilted bouquet delivered upside down - expression of an obvious message.

From a book written in 1913, The Language of Flowers, spelling the word 'flower', we are given:

Fern - sincerity

Lilac (white) – youthful, innocence

Orange flowers - chastity

Wistaria – I cling to thee

Elder - zealousness

Rose (white) – I am worthy of you

A GARDENING TIP to extend the life of cut flowers

- Pick flowers just before the bloom peak.
- Harvest in the cooler part of the day
- Put stems into cool clean water as you harvest
- Use a clean vessel or vase to display flowers
- Recut stems as you arrange them in vessel or vase
- Cut stems on a 45 degree angle
- Keep the water topped up in the vase and change weekly
- Remove any early fading blooms

Garden of Eden

Many attempts have been made to identify the exact geographical location of the garden of Eden, the traditional site of paradise. The biblical account, indicating that rivers were in the region, suggests that its site was part of the area of the former Mesopotamia, present-day Iraq. "Eden" is not a Hebrew name but is Sumerian, and designates a fertile plain, a further pointer to its approximate location. Whatever the linguistic root of its name, paradisal Eden is seen as an abode of bliss and supreme happiness.

YCDCo held its twentieth AGM on Wednesday, 25th January and there was a good community turnout to hear what the

Directors of the Board had to say about the 2021-22 financial year.

The servo sold 3,032,460 litres of fuel over that financial year having been hovering around that figure, but not quite cracking the 3 million litres sold over the couple of previous Covid-19 years. This will ultimately leave the business with a dilemma as there is a rapid push to transition away from fossil fuels to a more electric future for our transport.

At our annual Strategic Planning session in August 2022 the Board have started to look at what this will look for YCDCo's business and how to ensure that our turnover remains buoyant. There is a lot to discuss and debate, but YCDCo should start to have an outline plan for the shareholders to look at during the next AGM.

We routinely have a small turnover with Directors, and this year Barry Maginness and Michael Bell have both sadly resigned, after many years of loyal and excellent service to the Board and we are all very sorry to see them go. It is largely only by the voluntary work by many people in organisations and businesses that keep the show on the road, and it is sometimes hard to recruit new people to step up.

Please do consider sitting on a Board or Committee. It can be immensely rewarding from many points and new skills can be learned and friendships made.

YCDCo have funds always available for Community Grants, subject to Board approval. Over \$36,000 was given to local organisations in the 2021-22 financial year, and it is part of YCDCo's constitution to do this. What great forethought the original Board of YCDCo had. There is an

YCDCo also offers great casual employment opportunities for locals. Pop in and pick up an application form or download from

Many young Yackites have cut their teeth at job experience at YCDCo. It's a great introduction to interesting and more importantly, local work. Our great supermarket, Foodworks, also offers part-time and casual work.

The YCDCo share price continues to steadily rise and is now \$306 a share to buy. We also have a long waiting list for shares. Considering they started off at \$100/share 20 years ago, they have been an exceptional investment for our lucky shareholders.

Congratulations to Totally Renewable Yack for their award from Indigo Shire. YCDCo has been delighted to be involved in the setting up of the first electric vehicle charging station in Yack together with TRY, Indigo Power, Halliday Solictors and Indigo Shire. We look forward to hopefully partnering in other projects over the next twelve months.





Mt. Lawson State Forest and Park – an hour from Staghorn Flat, and just shy of Koetong. I've ridden there with various friends, camped on the southern edge near the trestle bridge, but have not really explored the northern end of the park due to a lack of suitable campsites.

I've spoken to DWELP about Koetong Creek (beautiful), and that the 2^{nd} Grandmother's

Track (bit tricky as two Grandmother's tracks leave Mt. Lawson Road and converge) is always very boggy due to massive springs and is impacted by 4WDs. After a positive initial response from the Department, it's slipped onto a "track upgrade" into the "obviously not gunna happen" out-basket.

A lovely late spring day, I drive along Mt. Lawson Road and park at the 1st Grandmother's Track, a bit deeper into the bush than I'd generally park, alone on a day ride. Not really afraid of the boogie man, just mechanical issues or an exit blocked by falling trees. I have a proposed route on the dashboard and also carry an EPIRB (emergency locator beacon). Nice ride down Mt.

Lawson Road, soon pass the tough Firebrace Track (possibly going on an organised river over there in February) that runs over to Mt. Granya (via private land). Skirt a massive spring that's opened up in the middle of the road, turning into the 2nd Grandmother's

Track. Wow!! Huge splashes of colour from the native flora radiating along the lower creek flats – a result from our abundant rainfall this year? Across the old farmland, back uphill on the track, skirt a large fallen tree where it's wetter than it looks and Sal flounders a bit. Ahead an old log crossover, damaged by flooding leaving a big ugly bog hole. A gentle tap with my heels, a quiet "come on" as Sal carefully but confidently crosses the narrow remains. "Good girl" almost under my breath and a soft stroke of her neck as we reach solid ground - a bit more demanding than I'd planned. Three and a half hours, not a soul to be seen, just me and my horse of near 20 years chilling out and having time to smell the flowers!

I certainly hope that the infrastructure is replaced on lesser used tracks after these weather events! I know the list is long, money tight and bushmen scarce...


