Election Day of Saturday, 21st May, 2022 was an intensely nail-biting occasion for the electorate of Indi, and in particular, the small township of Yackandandah. After all, it had been the battleground some nine years before when Cathy McGowan and the Voices for Indi took on the previous incumbent of Indi, and shocked everyone including themselves, with an Independent

taking out a blue ribbon seat for the first time. And from then on, things have gone from strength to

strength.

Helen Haines set another milestone in 2019 when Cathy retired. Another Independent retaining the seat of Indi! The Voices team were well aware that the majority at this election was small (1.4%), and so everything was marshalled for the 2022 election.

At this point, Cathy and team had also been seeking out and training likely Independents to take on safe seats throughout Australia. It needs no explanation from Yackity Yak to expand on the success of this. Helen retained the seat of Indi with a substantially improved vote.

The overall results of the 2022 election were electrifying. Labor took line

honours, but both the Labor and

Liberals saw massive swings away from their parties, and the Independents and Greens reaped rewards in spades.

Will politics ever be the same again? A good question. There is no doubt that the Independents will need to be on their mettle and will be well tested. Helen Haines has a "shovel-ready" ICAC set to go, and Labor have promised to get this in place by the end of the year. We may well be looking down the barrels of a completely different way of politics, and one that has been a long time coming. Watch this space!

"COURT HOUSE" PROJECT SHORTLISTED FOR MAJOR AWARD

Court House has been shortlisted in the Houses Architecture Awards in the categories of "New House over 200m²" and the "Sustainability" category.

The "Court House" project in Railway Avenue will be known to pretty much everyone in Yackandandah.... It sits on a prominent site and represents a striking architectural statement within our heritage village. Court House is the home of Julia Brinsdon-Farr and Craig Brinsdon, and their two daughters. Julia and Craig purchased the land, which had previously been proposed for a three-lot subdivision, with a vision to create a long-term family home within a substantial garden. Perfectly located within a short walk to High street, the Yack pool across the road, and as Julia describes it "on-site security" (next to the Police station)

Architects Archier were engaged to design the house; it was not hard to convince Archier director, Chris Gilbert (brother of local Sculptor Ben Gilbert) to take on the project in his home town. Archier have delivered a delightfully simple, elegant and meticulously detailed dwelling which responds beautifully to the site and to the context of the township. Once planning consent was achieved, local builder Sheringham Construction was engaged to assist in resolving the construction methods and detailing, and later to build the house.

Despite the apparent simplicity, Court House is a high tech and high performance house – built upon a fully thermally insulated concrete slab, using structural

insulated panels for the walls and roof, and timber framed, double glazed and air-tight windows, the thermal performance of the dwelling is among the best in the broader region. Air-tight building methods were employed in the build process, and heat recovery ventilation is installed in the building to provide continuous fresh air to the inside of the building without sacrificing any seasonal heat loss or gain, as well as managing internal condensation issues.



Passive solar design principles have also been very effectively leveraged by Archier to maximise the passive heating of the insulated polished concrete floor in the winter, but totally exclude the sun in summer.

Based on the thermal efficiency modelling completed by Detail Green in Beechworth, there are only two 5kW reverse cycle heat pump air conditioners installed to service the whole building. Julia and Craig report that since moving into their house in March 2020, they have only used the heating a handful of times – pretty remarkable in Yackandandah! The all-electric house (cooking, hot water, and the minimal heating and cooling) matched the mantra from Julia that "we are not going to burn stuff to be comfortable". A solar PV system supports this by offsetting the energy use of the building.

An extremely efficient and cleverly zoned floorplan ensures that the building size is kept at the optimum, and the separation of public and private spaces within the house is very well managed. Natural materials further enhance the experience – notably the prominent use of timber cladding and ceiling lining combined with natural off-form concrete, the polished concrete floor, and the subtle texture of oriented strand board wall linings internally. Since occupying the completed building Julia and Craig, (as well as Julia's mother, Shirley Farr) have worked tirelessly to establish the garden – a process that will only improve over the coming years as the garden becomes more established.

Yackandandah Health's **Big Thank You**

What a wonderful community we live in - so many people caring for our elderly residents and working to keep them happy and safe. On the 28th April, the danger every aged care community dreads crept into Yackandandah Health - Covid. Yackandandah Health was declared a Covid Outbreak site by the Public Health Department and our Covid Plan swung into action. Staff worked long hours in full PPE, covering shifts of colleagues who were in isolation and trying to keep our residents' spirits up. We were grateful to receive assistance from the Australian Defence Force staff and commonwealth medical staff. This boosted our morale.

To minimise spread, residents were isolated in their rooms with meals delivered. We continued to welcome people who had nominated to be a designated visitor, had no symptoms and were in full PPE. All staff went the extra mile to help - our

laundry and cleaning staff worked tirelessly, the Lifestyle Officer delivered activity suggestions to each resident and discussed ways of exercising safely in their rooms. There are so many people to recognise for the extra efforts your work is noticed

A total of 37 residents tested positive for Covid over the period 28 April – 16 May. Everyone received treatment, one resident went to hospital and returned 4 days later. Sadly, one resident died and we send our heartfelt condolences to the family. This was an event we hoped to avoid, and our continual improvement processes are in action to further enhance our Covid Plans for the future.

This is a timely reminder that Covid and Influenza are in the elderly and vulnerable both can be

It's been such a wonderful feeling to throw open the big wooden doors of the Yackandandah Toy Library (YTL) and welcome back our members after such a tumultuous few years! The COVID-19 pandemic, and the various resulting restrictions, has meant that YTL has often been closed for borrowing; but quietly, there were still many things happening behind the scenes. Our toy selection has been culled and refreshed, and our fabulous handyperson (Alyce) has cracked out her power tools and revamped the inside of our little shed to allow for more space, ease of access and visibility of our wares. We also have plans to add onto our shed (currently in the works), so watch this space!

With the current easing of restrictions, we have recently hosted our first 'Come and Play' in as many years to great success. It was so lovely to see our community getting reacquainted, and already we are seeing Saturday borrowing becoming a regular fixture in our families' weekend routines. We have a few new little beauties about to hit the shelves just in time for the cooling weather and more time spent indoors.

If you haven't heard of Toy Library, it is a not-for-profit organisation where you pay a small fee to borrow toys for a period of time. The concept of toy libraries is an idea that gained a lot of momentum in the 60's and 70's, but is so relevant today as we all face the impacts of over-consumption and the environmental woes that accompany it, costs of living pressures, and the struggle to find community for carers who have moved outside of their usual networks.

Toy Library is a wonderful way to keep your children's toys fresh and interesting without purchasing more, saving you money, clutter and also is far, far more friendly for the Earth! Win! It's also a great way to engage and connect with other families and carers in our community. Once a term, the Toy Library hosts a "Come and Play" day where we provide food and refreshments, and YTL members and the wider community are invited to come for a chat, a play and to get to know each other.

We stock high-quality indoor and outdoor toys, puzzles and games for children aged 0-7 years old. Some of the brands we carry include: Playmobil, Duplo, Schleich, Ravensburger, WOW, Melissa and Doug and Djeco. We also always take suggestions from members to expand our collection and improve our offering.

Our memberships are annual memberships or casual borrows. Annual memberships are offered from \$35 at the beginning of the calendar year and reduce as the year goes on. Casual memberships are available for those that wish to borrow less often, at the price of \$10 for 10 borrows; often a popular choice for grandparents or occasional carers!

We are open Saturdays 10-11am, February to December. We would absolutely love to see you! We are located just behind the Yackandandah Community Centre and Op Shop. We also have a Facebook group, Yackandandah Toy Library, where we post information and events.

Stepping Back But Not Away

While you won't find Bryan Smith on the back of a fire truck these days, the 76 year old says he still finds his role within the Yackandandah Fire Brigade as a non-operational member fulfilling.

"I decided to step back from active firefighting last year because, firstly, basically the older you get the more risk adverse you get, and secondly, there are a lot more younger people in the Brigade who can 'hold the hose,'" says Bryan, a member for the past 17 years. "I've been there and done that."

Bryan says he intends to remain with the Brigade however "as long as I can contribute something. And that's the beauty of the CFA; there are roles for all ages, from 16 to 76. There are a lot of 70 years old who are still very active in the CFA but I felt our Brigade has plenty of younger members coming up the ranks."

Bryan took on the role of the Brigade's chairperson a year ago after having been Secretary/Treasurer for 14 years (from 2007 to 2021), a role he enjoyed. "It was good because you knew what was happening within the Brigade and you were kind of a centrepiece without the responsibility of being the Captain," says Bryan. He is also still an accredited Staging Area Manager, a role he undertook during the Black Summer Bushfires (2019-2020), at the Tallangatta Showgrounds which was set up as a staging area for the fires at Corryong. "I'm more an admin and organisation type person," says Bryan whose background is in education and human resource development.

After graduating from the University of Western Australia, his first job was as a teacher at Eastern Goldfields Senior Highschool in Kalgoorlie in 1967 - the era of National Service in Australia. While Bryan was conscripted, he decided instead to join the regular army in 1968, graduating from the Officer Cadet School in Portsea, Victoria, in 1969. In 1971 he spent a year in Vietnam

but after a couple more years in the army got a position as a lecturer at what was Burwood Teachers' College (now Deakin University). (His role in the army was in education.) That was followed by a stint in corporate training, working for Coles as the State Training Manager (Victoria), and then National Training Manager. He then returned to Perth where he lectured in human resource development at Edith Cowan University and completed his PhD.

At 58 years of age, he retired and in 2004 he and his wife Lillian moved to Yackandandah (a small property at Osbornes Flat). They chose Yackandandah because their two children were living in Melbourne at the time; they had friends in the area who they visited so they knew and liked the area; and "it was time for a tree change."

Bryan says he joined the CFA for three reasons – to get to know people in the community; a desire to help the community; and personal

development — "learning new skills and gaining more knowledge." As a firefighter Bryan has attended numerous incidents but the one he'll "never forget" was the Black Saturday fires in 2009. Bryan was a member of the crew from Yackandandah (on the tanker) that was part of the first strike team from District 24 to go to Kilmore on the Saturday evening.

"On the way down we heard that there was a large out-of-control fire at Beechworth but of course you couldn't turn back," says Bryan. "One of the things I remember was getting out of the truck to refuel at Avenel and the wind felt like the heat from a fan forced oven. We fought the fires all Saturday night, which was pretty horrific. On the Sunday we were tasked with checking out the burnt properties and that was probably worse. Everything was still smouldering. It's a cliche but it was like a warzone.....we then came back, had a bit of a rest, and then we fought the fires at Bruarong."

Bryan says his three reasons for joining the Brigade have been "absolutely" answered. "It's great to be part of a highly trained, highly experienced Brigade," says Bryan. "It's very supportive and inclusive which is part of its appeal. I've also made some great friendships as well."

Preventing House Fires

On average there are 3000 house fires in Victoria each year. Most could be prevented by taking some simple precautions. These include:

- Making sure your smoke alarms are clean and you have tested them to ensure they are working.
- Changing your old smoke alarms to new units with a lithium battery that has a 10 year lifespan.
- Ensuring all electronic equipment is turned off and charged out in the open with good airflow so the heat can dissipate. Do this while you are awake.

Fires from electronic equipment is on the increase, so please take extra care to ensure your families safety.


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Looking to the future for the 20th Kerferd Oration

Peter co-founded the Future Schools; a global collaboration of innovators aligned to transform learning communities and co-evolve the future of education. Future Schools now includes a community of over 100 member schools, including ten of the most innovative schools in the world. Peter was the former Principal of Templestowe College, one of Australia's most innovative schools.

"Education has been discussed as a topic for many years within the committee", stated chair Jessica Oldmeadow. "Regardless of whether you are currently engaged with the education system or not, how it is delivered and how effective it is has a massive impact in our communities. The Education System is a major part of our lives, economy, and social expectations, starting with those as young as 6 weeks old, in early education settings, through to lifelong learners at U3A. We could hold another 20 years of Orations focused on education alone!

So why now? Covid exposed the Australian community to an alternate way of delivering education and prompted mass re-evaluation of societal values and individual's priorities. What is 'essential' work? Is that what we are preparing our children for? Does our work and education need to be restricted by physical boundaries? Are schools the best places for young people to socialise? Do we value our teachers enough?

As a community, do we simply slip back to the 'norm' of what we believe education to be? Or has Covid given us an opportunity to explore the possibility for change? That's the discussion we're hoping to open with the community at the Oration this year".



YACK LANDCARE FOCUS ON ROWDY FLAT, TOWN WETLANDS AND JUNIORS

The Yackandandah Landcare Group has a busy year ahead with three newly funded projects to get involved with! A Junior Landcare

grant was awarded to Yackandandah Primary School to involve grades 3 and 4 in learning about flora, fauna,

invertebrates and pollinators, and aquatic life. A tree planting will be held out the back of Yack Health on Thursday, 23rd June by students and residents. Feel free to come along and lend a hand!

A local wetlands project funded by The Ross Trust aims to involve Yack community in learning about our two wonderful wetlands within the town. The wetlands at the Sports Park were renovated in 2016 and a successful tree planting by Scouts and local families has created a beautiful space for birds, frogs, reptiles, wallabies and insects. The wetland now has a bench seat and is a peaceful spot to take a walk and rest. The residents of Yack Health and Yackatoon will be invited to join a community walk around the wetland in the Spring. Grades 5 and 6 will be doing a wetland health survey over winter and spring to measure water quality, discover invertebrates, identify vegetation and birdlife.

The second man-made wetland on Bells Flat Rd will also be used as a study site to compare features of a natural versus artificial wetland.

A series of public talks will be held throughout 2022 on topics ranging from waterbirds and wetlands, magic mistletoe, local fauna, environmental weeds and much more.

MAJOR FUNDING BOOST FOR LOCAL SPORT AND RECREATION PROJECTS

The Barnawartha Recreation Reserve will get two new multi-purpose hard courts, suitable for netball and tennis following the latest round of funding under the Victorian Government's Local Sports Infrastructure Fund. Rutherglen youngsters will also benefit from the latest funding round.

Council will also be able to commence master planning for several outdoor spaces and parks, with funding of \$30,000 to be matched by its own contribution of \$40,000.

The plans will prepare for the future activation and development of the Allans Flat water hole, Rutherglen's Barkly Park, Coulston Park in Tangambalanga and the Yackandandah Sports Park.

The funding, totalling more than \$700,000, together with Council's contribution, will see more than \$1M invested into important local facilities that will have wide ranging benefits for community members of all ages.





A SHORT HISTORY OF THE YACKANDANDAH TO OSBORNES FLAT RAIL TRAIL

In the last issue of Yackity Yack there was an excellent article explaining the history of the community involvement in the creation of the rail trail from Yack to Rowdy Flat /Osbornes Flat. Those community members should now feel so proud of their efforts as the bike trail is now enjoyed by many walkers and



bike riders.

Since the completion of the track, many locals and visitors have asked about the park-like area a short walk down from the Osbornes Flat Hall. I thought the community that use the trail might enjoy hearing how this area came about.

On coming upon the area, the chattering of birds darting among the trees, the early morning call of the kookaburra and the gently flowing creek give us a sense of tranquillity that refreshes the spirit. In the years preceding the completion of the bike path, the Osbornes Flat community maintained the hall area and the bush and the leased land along the creek side. Over the years it became very overgrown with weeds and blackberries. Two professors from ANU assisted with research on the vegetation and Chinese mining in the area pointing out areas of significance. The area was, at that time, heritage listed.

In 1998 Graeme Ridgeway started clearing the 4-5 metre high blackberries with the help of friends - a big job taking at least 5 years to clear. Graeme had the foresight to plant a memorial tree for our friend who helped with the initial clearing, and also many varieties



of beautiful deciduous trees to beautify the area. Graeme and friends looked after the area in the following years and had many happy and memorable times there.

In 2018, the Indigo Shire held meetings with the landholders discussing their wish for the Rail Trail to pass the historical area made by the miners and Chinese prospectors who had worked the creek for gold many years (you can still see the results of their efforts all along the creek and "the flats"). So now the trail passes through this beautiful area and helps make Osbornes Flat a special place. Graeme always loved being close to nature, loved the bush, the birds and animals and would be so pleased that locals and visitors can

now enjoy the area. The nearby local landholders are helping with the upkeep of the Ridgeway Reserve area. The Yackandandah Men's Shed has also assisted, and the Yackandandah Garden Club has planted an additional commemorative native tree.

As Autumn is so spectacular in the North-East, we can be thankful to those who had the vision to plant all the beautiful trees around our town. This Autumn especially has bought beauty and enjoyment to many and will into the future.

THE END OF AN ERA & HERE'S TO A BIT OF A LEGEND!

There will be very few people in Yackandandah who won't recognise the guy in the hat above. Wal Cameron, together with his wife

Lyn, have been involved in running the ANZAC Day services in Yack for fifteen years. On 13th April, a small get-together of RSL and Yack townsfolk met by the Memorial Gardens to present Wal with a drawing of himself and Lyn by Indigo Valley artist, Evelyn Marshall, as a small gift and thank you for the tremendous amount of work

put in during those fifteen years.

It's almost impossible when seeing the huge turnouts to the Yack ANZAC Day services, both the early morning and the mid-morning parade, to believe that when Wal attended his first service in Yack, there were about ten people attending. Now, hundreds of people turn up with a more than impressive march along the High Street involving many of the service clubs in the township and a phenomenally well attended early morning service.

Wal offered his assistance after that fateful day. "We didn't know what we were doing. We just wanted to keep the tradition alive." He offered to put on a breakfast out of his own funds, and so the Gun Fire Breakfast started. Wal hated asking for help, but everyone he asked for assistance always came good. Postie Norman and Jack Jensen have been responsible in the past for the sound system which wasn't always used for the services. Wal recalls the occasion when, as the light grew in the dawn and the sound system was being used for the first time, he looked up and saw the size of the crowd. "Holy @#\$t" said Wal, completely taken aback by this and relayed all over the Memorial Park to the amusement of the crowd!

Horses have become bit of an occasion now at the dawn service, and this was started by Pete Denahy and a friend some years ago. This year, over 25 horses were present together with their riders – a fitting reminder of the Australian Light Horse Brigade.

Wal is now handing the baton on to Lincoln Ablett, an ex-military local, who will have some big shoes to fill! Wal particularly wished to thank his wife, Lyn, who has been the driving force behind organising the food and the kitchen; the people who would always step up and wash dishes after the breakfast; all the local clubs including the SES, CFA, Lions Club, Yackandandah Men's Shed etc who have chipped in and helped or been involved over the years, and of course to everyone who turns up for the services.

THE 2022 ANZAC DAY ADDRESS FROM MAJOR MICHELLE SHEATHER

Good morning. It gives me great pride to be invited to speak today. Not only because of the immense pride I feel towards this occasion, but also speaking here in Yackandandah amongst the community I feel very much a part of.

When researching for this speech, I looked at the list of names on the Memorial Gates at the entrance to this park. I wanted to capture a story with a local connection. So I'm going to take this opportunity to share with you a small piece of how a few serving members from this region have shaped our history through their actions in WW1, and, hence, their inclusion in the ANZAC spirit ... and then I'll share some of my own experiences as well.

I'm going to share the story of the Huon family, the children of John and Sabina Huon, who were a farming family from the Huon district. Four siblings from this family enlisted and served with the Australian Imperial Forces in the First World War (Charles, Robert, Harold and Ada).

Harold and his older brother
Charles were two of the first from the
Huon district to enlist in the AIF. They
travelled to Sydney and enlisted on the
1st September 1914 at the Randwick
Racecourse. They were allocated
consecutive service numbers – Charles
904 and Harold 905. They were
assigned to the 4th Infantry Battalion.
They trained together in Egypt before
landing on the shores of Gallipoli
together.

In late May 1915, Charles was evacuated with 'a touch of pleurisy' (chest pain). Charles wrote to his mother to reassure her he wasn't wounded, however, he also told of the fate of his younger brother Harold. He wrote: "Harold got a shrapnel bullet through the upper lip a week after we landed; it only knocked out a few teeth

and came out of his mouth without making a second hole. It was healed in four days and he was back in the firing-line again, so we've both been very lucky so far." I wonder how reassured his mother felt?!

However, Harold's luck ran out on the first day of the Battle of Lone Pine, when he received a shrapnel wound to his right arm. While recuperating in Cairo, Harold contracted mumps and developed a septic hand. He was sent home in May 1916, and he was discharged medically unfit shortly thereafter.

Robert Huon, better known as 'Bert', had remained home farming - working two farms in the absence of his brothers, but on 19th February 1917 he accompanied his brother Harold into the recruiting office in Melbourne - and the pair enlisted! Robert was accepted for overseas service. Harold however, was restricted to Home Service and, despite promoting quickly to Acting Corporal, Harold again submitted a request for discharge and left the Army for a second time, his second enlistment having lasted only 5 months - one can only assume the restriction of not being able to join his brothers fighting overseas played a part in his short-term enlistment.

On the 4th October 1917, the oldest sibling, **Charles**, was killed in action in Belgium. He was 28 years of age. His mother received a letter regarding her late son, Charles Huon:-

Belgium, 17th October 1917.
Dear Mrs. Huon, It is with the
deepest regret that I have to inform
you of the death of your son in
action on 4th October 1917. He was
Company-Sergeant-Major of this
Company for some months prior to his
death, and was esteemed by all with
whom he came in contact. He was an
excellent soldier, and always did his

duty unflinchingly and cheerfully, no matter what were the circumstances or the danger. On the 4th October this Battalion took part in an assault on the enemy's positions on the Broodseinde ridge, east of Ypres. We accomplished all that had been asked of us, and reached the final objective without serious casualties. It was shortly after arrival there that your son was wounded in the head by an enemy sniper.

He was dressed by Lieutenant Borirere, of this Company, but died soon after. Late that night we buried him about 50 yards from Celtic House, which was situated a short distance west of Celtic Wood. Although German snipers and machine guns were very active, under cover of the darkness he was given a soldier's burial there, and a rough-hewn cross set over him, inscribed with his name, to mark the spot as the resting place of a brave Australian soldier. The personal effects as well as his Military Medal are being forwarded under separate cover. Please accept the deepest sympathy of the officers and men of Bravo Company consequent on the loss of your dear son and their gallant comrade. Yours sincerely, LIEUTENANT F. L. MARR."

Shortly after, in November 1917, Robert Huon was embarking from Melbourne. Robert spent some time out of the action with a three week stint in hospital with bronchitis. And then, within a month of his return, Robert succumbed to another common ailment among the troops, mumps. He re-joined his unit just as the Division was preparing for the Battle of Amiens, what is known as, the "One Hundred Day Offensive". Robert was detached to another 3rd Division Artillery unit, during September and October 1918. This coincided with the Divisions last major battle, which ultimately led to

the end of the war.

The Huon brother's younger sister, Ada, also enlisted in the AIF into the Australian Army Nursing Service on 11th July 1917, having only completed her final nursing exam a month or so earlier. Unlike her brothers, Ada's war wasn't in England or at the front in France, but rather in India, where there was a desperate need for skilled medical personnel. Ada arrived in India, on the 6th October 1917. Unbeknownst to Ada, her eldest brother, Charles, had been killed in action, just two days earlier.

Nurses had been told before leaving Australia they would only serve six months in India before being moved closer to the fighting. On this understanding, Ada may well have been disappointed to have found herself spend her entire war effort transferring between 4 different hospitals in India prior to her eventual resignation due to marriage. Staff Nurse Ada Huon resigned on the 30th March 1919, and was married the following day to Captain Frank Macaskie. Ada had been one of more than 2,000 courageous and dedicated Australian women who had served overseas as part of the war, working in difficult and sometimes terrifying conditions, all the while providing medical aid and care for the wounded and ill.

Such was the service of the Huon siblings during World War One.

During my own experience in Iraq in 2007, I did not have to endure the harsh living conditions or the hardships that those before me have endured, however we were not void of the dangers of a warzone.

I was part of a team of approx. 30 Australians located in Taji, North of Baghdad. We were accommodated and Continued on page 16.

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fed on a Coalition Base and travelled through checkpoints to an Iraqi Army Base in order to teach the Iraqi Army some logistics trades – I was involved in the maintenance training – I was part of the command team teaching small arms maintenance, generator maintenance and welding trades. Lincoln, our MC for today, was part of the warehousing and supply training team. Although not in combat roles, there was certainly evidence that we were in a country suffering the effects of an insurgency against coalition forces and widespread civil war.

On a couple of occasions we were unable to go to work on the Iraqi Army Base due to intelligence reporting that there was suspicion of a potential suicide bomber amongst the Iraqi soldiers we were

On occasions our base came under rocket attack. Often this would have little effect on us because the insurgents were not sophisticated in their firing and aiming techniques, so often the rockets would land in fields without fatal effects.

However, on the 15th August 2007, our base was hit by ten 81mm mortars. This time the aiming was more effective and a total of ten people were killed. Some were the contracted workers who were on base working to feed us, others were members of the coalition forces. Along with the fatalities were also injuries - a couple of US soldiers sitting at the recreation area trying to unwind and relax had their legs blown off.

A 22-year old American soldier by the name of SGT Princess Samuels was in her accommodation block, which is a small unfortified demountable like the kind you find on a job-site. When the mortars started coming in, the base alarm system went off to warn of such an attack. Now I can assume that SGT Samuels was following her US Army protocol – she left her accommodation block and was running to the nearest bunker (a concrete structure reinforced with steel) - her bomb shelter was probably about 50m away. Unfortunately for SGT Samuels, a mortar landed a direct hit on one of the accommodation blocks near where she was running to her bunker and she fell to the ground. When she managed to regain her feet and composure, she phoned a colleague and reported that she "didn't feel right". She had not been at the direct point of impact for that mortar, but she had been close enough to be exposed to the shock-wave of that mortar's impact.

US Army SGT Princess Samuels died from those

I saw SGT Samuels being rushed past on a stretcher as I was running back from the bunker to my accommodation room to get a fire extinguisher to help extinguish the fire. I too had been close to the point of impact for that mortar, but unlike the Americans, our Australian Army protocol was to lie as flat as possible during a rocket attack and to not move to the bunker until after the rockets had stopped, as this afforded better protection from the subsequent shock-wave that follows the impact of the rocket attack. I had been knocked onto my back and I was frantically trying to put on my body armour and helmet. Let's be honest, I was scared for my life.

I was very lucky that day. And I think myself lucky that my few exposures to danger during my time in the military seem so insignificant in comparison to the horrid experiences of others.

Our sacrifices and stories may be different, but I'm a very proud serving member, as I'm certain those before me have also been. If you see a veteran or a serving member today, please enjoy a chat, a

drink or a laugh with them. For today, on this ANZAC Day recognising 107 years since the landing at Gallipoli, we pause to remember all those Australians who have served our nation in wars, conflicts, peacekeeping and domestic operations, from Anzac Cove to Afghanistan. We pay our respects to the almost 103,000 Australian service men and women who have sacrificed their lives in service for Australia.

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On the EDGE of our seats for the Community Celebration!

On the evening of the 27th April, Totally Renewable Yackandandah (TRY) hosted a fantastic community celebration in the Public Hall. We shared the results of our federally funded feasibility study and community survey and discussed how you can participate in the Project EDGE trial. What a night it was! There were many familiar Yack faces in the crowd, smiling, supporting and asking excellent questions. Attendance is greatly appreciated, as TRY relies not only on the unwavering support of Yackandandah, but also invaluable conversations with its people. Those conversations begin on nights like these!

TRY's primary goal has been to assist Yack to 100% renewable energy by 2022 though this has necessarily been revised with analysed confidence to 2024. We consider community awareness and input to be a critical focus in this journey. Our organisation formed out of the dedication of locals striving towards a particular goal, and it is vital to us that our achievements continue to align with the wants and needs of our community.

Some excellent issues were raised at this event and have been further discussed by TRY at our latest strategy meeting. A question about TRY's intentions to increase education around energy efficiency and renewable energy was asked. This is a topic TRY has long been aware of. As TRY President Juliette Milbank answered, this is unfortunately a trickier subject than we would like it to be.

Building knowledge and understanding regarding the complex issues of energy proves time intensive and bespoke. Unfortunately, TRY continues to be a volunteer organisation and reliant on sporadic and project-focused grant funding. Unfortunately, it is not currently within our capacity to engage a paid employee to scale our efforts amongst community members regarding renewable energy and efficient usage. However – do not despair! We are working hard to raise the needed money to deliver a sophisticated energy learning program. As Juliette Milbank mentioned on the 27th, it is easier to secure

funding for 'stuff', but not so easy to do so to create a job and pay someone to deliver complex programs!

The Feasibility Study was conducted by the 'fabulously fastidious' Mach2, including Mark McKenzie-McHarg and Cameron McKern. We would like to sincerely thank them for their efforts and support throughout this whole project. Being able to

access such a wealth of knowledge and experience right here in our town is truly exciting, and a credit to our community. If you are interested in viewing the results of the feasibility study, you can locate it on our website (totallyrenewableyack.org.au) under the 'Watt's Happening' dropdown menu, or click the link at the end of this article.

One of the most important findings by Mark and Cameron was that due to many Yack-specific factors, pumped hydro and solar farming were not immediately financially feasible to help us reach 100% renewable energy. The upside of this finding is that the most feasible way to get to 100% is to continue what we're already doing! This being to support the community to install more solar panels, batteries, orchestrated with smart energy controllers

and super-efficient hot water systems to reduce your bill and clean up our energy sources. Yack is already more than 58% rooftop solar coverage (in comparison to an estimated national average of 25-30%) so why stop now!? The simple maths tells us that we will achieve a 100% renewable supply with the addition of 400 extra modest-sized household

solar systems, to which we are striving to add batteries. And actually, we are also seeking to reduce the purchase costs for people on lower incomes, as well as working to build larger community generation and storage projects.

At the celebration, AusNet Services subsidiary Mondo also gave an excellent presentation regarding the exciting new virtual power plant, Project EDGE (Energy Demand and Generation Exchange). This is an energy marketplace trial funded by the Australian Renewable Energy Agency, together with AusNet Services and the Australian Energy Market Operator. As the amount and type of energy changes and shifts to renewable energy — so must our infrastructure and market. Mondo is offering attractive subsidies for business and residential batteries. Information on Project EDGE can be found on the Mondo homepage, or follow the link posted at the end of the article.

As the night ended and like all busy volunteer groups, the TRY Committee found themselves doing the dishes in the hall kitchen. It was mentioned that it feels like a volunteer's main job is putting out chairs before an event, and stacking them back up at the end. But we love doing it for Yack, and we're so grateful for the journey we are sharing together. It feels like a small price to pay for a bold new 100% renewable Yackandandah!

Efforts to help people into a low-cost energy future

The Yackandandah area now has a solar installation density of just under 60% (of buildings), and in fact, that figure stretches to 63% of buildings in Osbornes Flat. This terrific result does not however highlight the people who are missing out on the bill and carbon saving value of renewable energy.

TRY is therefore working to raise money for people who can least afford the addition of solar systems and batteries to their home, including people on fixed low incomes and renters. This absence is compounded perhaps by the awareness many cannot afford to take active steps to improve the thermal performance of their home, and indeed make the home more comfortable.

Before we get too far however, we want to understand how many people in our community really feel the genuine and external need to get additional support to purchase energy systems and become part of the transition to 100% renewable energy.

TRY is going to publish and share a local survey which we hope people with low fixed incomes can complete and return. We will be sharing this in print and electronic forms and will share widely across the community.

Please watch out for it and if you know someone you think might benefit from support, please help them access a survey!

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Have you ever wanted to spend a night in Gulgong?

Recollections of a trip on the Central West Cycling Trail in NSW



Recently a large group of us spent a week cycling the Central West Cycle Trail in NSW. Our group of sixteen consisted of friends and friends of friends coming together from the Gold Coast, Melbourne, Euroa, Wandiligong, Wollongong and Yackandandah. One of us, back in the dim days when COVID-19 wasn't an issue, had suggested the circuit as scenic and doable for moderately fit riders in their sixties and seventies. The website sells it as "hundreds of kilometres of quiet roads" and the route would take us from Mudgee through Gulgong, Dunedoo, Mendooran, Ballimore, Geurie, Wellington, Goolma, then back to Gulgong and Mudgee.

Fifteen cyclists (the sixteenth member drove

the support vehicle) were usually spread out along the roads because, as in any large group, there was a range of fitness levels and a range of bikes: four e-bikes, a second-hand city bike and an assortment of mountain, touring, gravel and road bikes. Road conditions also varied. We were often on

sealed roads, but the more interesting sections were on gravel. Sometimes the gravel was rough, sometimes smooth and sometimes soft and sandy. Water hazards also provided both fun and wet feet and were a constant reminder of how much this part of NSW has been inundated with rain. It also meant that the paddocks were tinged with green and the scenery lush, unusual for

Our riding soundtrack was provided by galahs, choughs, magpies, magpie larks and cockatoos. Their screeching and calls were particularly loud in the Goonoo State Conservation Area where the eucalyptus, cypress and casuarinas were a haven for the birds and the mallee fowl, only present in their scratchings. Often, we rode through sheep and cattle country and occasionally shared the road with grazing cattle.

Most days we had morning tea and lunch on

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the trail: thermoses for tea and coffee, fruitcake, flapjacks, chocolate brownies, a birthday cake on Day 4 (Happy Birthday Hamish!!) and often a sandwich purchased in the morning at the local bakery for lunch.

Amongst the highlights of the ride were the small-town pubs. The Courthouse (Mudgee), The Centennial (Gulgong), Hotel Dunedoo, The Royal (Mendooran), Hair of the Dog Inn (Ballimore), The Cow and the Calf Hotel (Wellington) all provided comfortable accommodation with character. The pub meals offered a surprising variety over the week;

however, it was great to get back to Mudgee at the end and treat ourselves to a woodfired pizza at the Mudgee Brewery and a Thai meal in the evening. A few of us managed to fit in a Mudgee wine tasting in the afternoon as the final morning was a short thirty kilometres.

Gulgong deserves a special mention because, like Yackandandah, it has a gold mining history and a main street of wooden verandahs. It also boasts a Henry Lawson Centre as he spent his childhood and early teens in locations between Gulgong and Mudgee. The painted silos at Dunedoo were also



The trail running down to the Jamieson River

Sal stepped out smartly and Romany followed without hesitation as we traversed Mitchell's Track, at times with an almost 100 metre sheer drop to the Jamieson River that feeds into Lake Eildon. It reminds me of riding "The Wall" which runs above the Murray from Bunroy Station towards Tom Groggin in the Upper Murray, a bridle path that many horse riders have ridden back to the famed Jack Riley himself. Mitchell's Track was cut and formed to connect a silver mine and the remote homestead in the shadows of Mount Sunday with the beautiful township of Jamieson, a distance of 30-35 kms some 150 years ago. A fair trip for a latte!

A mate, Ron, had asked "you ever ridden around Jamieson?". I pored over a map. A call to Jeff (the local ranger and the whole crew) was very helpful. "Yes, you are very welcome, although it's quite

steep". He was right about that. The last kilometre WAS steep (I'm only 2WD), but we landed safe and sound at Granny's Flat. A few fishermen with

A five and half hour ride, back for more late lunch (us and them), collect water, light fire, lose the sun early. Rug Sal for the night and a hot water bottle for me? Don't call me a softie!

The Civil Defence Service began in New South Wales during World War II when the National Emergency Services was established.

The State Emergency Service was established to deal with emergencies such as floods, earthquakes and bushfires before our fantastic CFA was established. We were also placed in charge of flood warnings, evacuations, housing and feeding of evacuees, land and water rescues, provision of essential services, medical and nursing facilities, and for various forms of immediate relief including the feeding of stock and the restoration of essential services. Now we are extremely lucky to be part of multiple Emergency Services all working together to assist in keeping our community safe. We are proud to be continuing the work of thousands of volunteers before us.

We began acknowledging our members with introducing two of our powerhouse members, Jackie our unit controller and Mick who has been a dedicated member for over a decade. vice Award. To be eligible for this award one must be currently active in their Unit and have served a minimum of 20 years, be dedicated to the organisation, show that their contributions to the service have enhanced its standing within the wider community and been actively in-

leadership. We could think of no two more deserving members than Joe Riella and Steve Roberts.

Joe Riella has been a valued member of the State Emergency Service for 35 years and still counting. During his time with the SES, Joe has demonstrated a high level of commitment and dedication to volunteering. He was a trainer for the Wodonga SES for 15 years before becoming the controller. During that time, he became an integral part of the development of the Rescue Boat Training. He trained members to very high standard in every aspect and is well recognised for his skills as a Rescue Boat

Coxswain. Many rescues were under his superb leadership. In 1992, Joe was the Team Leader for crews at the Wodonga unit assisting in the floods. His role included organising crews to be deployed to flooded areas, as well as, completing tasks such as rescue people from homes and vehicles, animal rescues and general recognisance of the area where he would report back to the Incident Control Centre. In 2015, the Yackandandah and surrounding towns were inundated with rain causing flooding to newly built homes and roads. Joe's role included hours of sandbagging, traffic control and the welfare of those around him.

Joe joined the Yackandandah SES Unit in 2002 and has attended many rescues over the years. Joe has around 60 SES competencies and is still continuing to learn. During the "Black Saturday" Fires, Joe assisted with navigating fire crews into the remote 4WD fire areas of the Yackandandah/ Stanley Forest. He supported the CFA with ration deliveries and any other deliveries that were needed. Joe encourages members to reach their best possible abilities. He has



Lucy Wise is a Central VIC-based singer-songwriter with a long history of association with the Yackandandah Folk Festival, both as a solo artist,


as a member of the Wise Family Band, and in collaboration with other artists. Her lyrics and melodies are warm and heartfelt, referencing the folk music she grew

Phoebus Is Stirring

It was 25 years ago, when the very first Yackandandah Folk Festival hit the town!

As you read this, Phoebus, the Yackandandah Folk Festival mascot, is stirring from her long Covid-induced slumber, pulsing to the music! Well, that's a colourful account of what's been happening behind the scenes as we all recalibrate our lives



to the pandemic era. At some point in the last 25 years, Phoebus was "recruited" to represent in graphic form the essence of our Folk Festival. A Google search tells us that in Greek mythology, Phoebus is the "God of Light, God of Prophecy and Poetry and Music"... What could be more appropriate?

Our current Phoebus was built by Xavier Pinard back in 2017 to mark our 20th year. The mascot vividly reflects the values of how the festival has evolved from that tentative beginning 25 years ago. The core values of the festival have been about:

- Community Renewal
- Sustainability
- Music
- Youth mentoring
- Fun & inclusion

Each of these values has been embedded in subsequent festivals and beyond, to be the catalyst for new Yackandandah initiatives that go together to make our community what it is today.

Community Renewal: The 2019 Festival was possible by over 15 Yackandandah Community Groups contributing their creativity and energy. The group that got the first festival going posed the question 'Why don't we run a Folk Festival? "Why not, indeed.... well, let's just do it!"... and so, we did!

This philosophy has continued with each succeeding festival. It was about 5 years after the first festival that the only town petrol bowser was going to close. Some people

got together and thought "Why don't we take it on? Why don't we have a community owned business to sell petrol?" And so we did.. and YCDCo was formed.

Sustainability: From the first years, the festival has focussed on activities that were environmentally sustainable long before the climate crisis. Leaving our town in better shape than before each festival. An early YFF project was to install Solar PV electric generation at the new YCDCo with enough capacity to generate power to match what was drawn from the grid to conduct the festival over 2 days. Over the years, "Why don't we try to get Yackandandah off the grid and be totally renewable?" ... and so Totally Renewable Yackandandah was born in the same spirit. ... "giving it a go". Dealing with what used to be called rubbish generated by lots of people over a weekend has also been important. Finding ways to reduce the amount of discarded stuff and to keep it out of the rubbish tip (what we now call "landfill"), each festival brought new initiatives to achieve this. Plasticwise Yackandandah formed and has built the "Dish Pig" to safely reduce the need to use single use food containers. The sustainability task continues as there's always fresh ideas and opportunities.

Music:

The festival has been the starting point for many young local musicians and the not so young! People such as Richard Perso and Sal Kimber have toured nationally and internationally. Lisa Mitchell won the busking

competition before moving on to bigger things, Jane Thompson and James Rigby launched our community choir, and now their children kicked off in Yackandandah with the now successful folk duo, The Maes (Maggie and Ellie Rigby pictured above). Tom Richardson evolved here as did Charm of Finches, who launched here in their early teens. Pete Denahy and Candice McLeod have both chosen

to call Yackandandah home.

YFF weekend is a magnet for touring Australian acts as well as the first point of call for many international acts.

Recent festivals have had a significant youth stage for musicians finding their voice along with a busking competition and from the early days, there's been a Folk Festival Choir with up to 100 local people sometimes singing for the first time, working together, and discovering the joy of making and presenting music.

Youth Mentoring: From the first festival, Yackandandah Primary School has been a partner with the Saturday Night Community Dinner and along with the other schools, been part of the creative effort with music making, drumming, the Opening Parade and Bush Dance. At least one member of the YFF committee has grown up with the Folk Festival all her life.


Fun and Inclusion: When given the chance and the stimulus, we humans can be very creative. YFF has been the catalyst for much creativity and fun over its 25 years. Standouts are the Great Yackandandah Jam of 2009, involving every willing local musician, the school and community choirs, the Yackandandah Strummers and bagpipes for good measure....

For 25 years, our Yackandandah Folk Festival has provided the focus for the community to come together in a creative and fun endeavour to celebrate what the community of Yackandandah is and continues to be. Whether the festival was in practice, the catalyst for the subsequent 'spinoff' projects, YCDCo, TRY, Plasticwise, Uke-N-Dandah, or just part of the Yackandandah DNA and would have happened anyway... well, that is an arguable point.

The 2022 "Not the Yackandandah Folk Festival" has come and gone. This was put together to give Phoebus a friendly prod and remind her that Yackandandah hasn't forgotten her! It was a fun day of good music in each of the pubs and participation by Osbornes Flat Primary School and both venues to at least keep us well fed and watered.

24-26 March, 2023 has been set for the 26th Yackandandah Folk Festival and it's time to start thinking about what that might be. The organising Committee Secretary, Craig Ramsay is keen to hear all interest from the community or groups with ideas for participation in 2023... after all, it's only 50 weeks away!!!



A GARDENING TIP - How to germinate seeds

Germinating seeds is a mix of getting the science and the art right. There are fundamentals to follow to help you be successful and the art of applying your special touch. Seeds can be sown directly in the ground, or in a container. If you are recycling containers, make sure to clean them thoroughly. Growing in a container allows better scope to achieve the optimal conditions for seeds to germinate. Following the advice on seed packets is advisable,

- 1. Moisture: All seeds need moisture to start the germination process. The art of seed sowing is to water regularly (even up to 1-2 times per day, depending on the weather.) The seed should never be allowed to dry out or become waterlogged, so do not sit the container in water. If the soil beneath the surface is cool and damp to touch, you do not need to water. Make sure the water penetrates to the bottom of the container to encourage the roots downward. Misting is not a good option.
- 2. Sowing depth: The sowing depth is essential for seeds to germinate. Use the width of the seed as a rule of thumb. Sow the seed as deep as the length of seed. Tiny seeds such as poppies can be sown on top of the soil and will settle in after watering.
 - 3. Soil temperature: Seeds germinate at particular soil temperatures. It is less which flower and fruit in cooler months. However, flowering plants need warm soil to germinate successfully, about 20-21 degrees Celsius is ideal. This can be created artificially by using a heat mat or by finding other warm locations such as a greenhouse or a warm room.

is a major sporting complex within the Indigo Shire that provides a range of local, district and regional sporting opportunities for the Indigo community

A range of sporting clubs use the Sports Park for regular local, district and regional training, competition and events. Long-standing user clubs include: the Yackandandah Cricket Club, the Yackandandah Tennis Club and the Yackandandah Adult Riding Club. These clubs consist of senior and junior members, who generally play, spectate, coach and / or socialise at the Sports Park. Together, existing sporting clubs have more than 300 members. The Riding Club also attracts many additional users and visitors to the site for their major regional events and competitions. The Cricket Club facilities are considered to be some of the best in the district, with the Wodonga and District Cricket Association favouring it as a regular finals venue.

Private social functions are often held at the Sports Park in the first storey clubroom area (function room). These activities – mainly birthday parties and club functions – require access to general amenities including toilets, kitchen or catering area, rubbish bins and parking. The Sports Park is also frequented by casual recreational users and 'out and about locals'. Dog on and off lead areas have also been established at the Sports Park.




