

QUEEN ELIZABETH 11 DIES





Simon moved from Melbourne and came to Yack in 1982, wanting to practice in general practice in a small friendly rural township. He first worked with Dr. Gequilana, and then out of the old chemist shop and doctor's surgery which is now Vintage Alley. As his patient numbers increased, Simon bought the current practice building in Wellsford Street and has been operating from there for the past 30 years. He invited doctors Meg Warren and Steven Cavini to join the practice, and at its peak, there were three doctors, with a clinic at Tangambalanga for some twenty five years. With a plan towards retirement this was wound back eight years ago, and Simon has worked in his Yack practice three days a week.


Running a general practice hasn't been all beer and skittles and comes with inherent issues. The Federal Government hasn't increased medical fees for some seven years, and that has meant there are very few surgeries that can afford to bulk bill anymore. The overall costs of running a practice over those seven years have risen exponentially - wages, general running costs, medical supplies, rent and the like, so it makes it almost impossible to bulk bill.

Small one or two GP practices struggle with finding cover for holidays - locums are very expensive to hire in and often very difficult to get hold of.

There have been many changes in the medical world since Simon came to Yackandandah. In the 1980s, many medics were happy to work as GPs in smaller country towns and regional areas, but with targeted immigration, many foreign trained doctors now prefer to settle in the cities and become specialists. To become a specialist requires a further five years of generally hospital training,

which can be a gruelling thing to undertake. Currently, only 18% of qualifying doctors aim to be GPs with a consequential general shortage of GPs

nationwide.

The Federal Government has a responsibility for planning the medical workforce, and there has been very little planning over the past 20 years. There

could be a real renaissance in the industry with Government assistance. In this region of NE Victoria and Southern NSW, there are too many cardiologists, hardly any psychiatrists, not enough ear, nose and throat

specialists and the only neurologist is just about to retire. Attracting young specialists to the area is vitally important. Immigration was hoped to be the answer to this, but it is currently directionless.

Sadly, skilled migration often works as reverse foreign aid – Simon feels very strongly that is completely unethical for Australia to import doctors trained elsewhere and take many educated people out of a developing country. Currently a number of doctors have come from Eastern Europe, China and India – places that can ill afford to lose them

Simon leaves his current practice rewarded by the fact that he's helped so many people. GP work is a really rewarding job and can improve people's lives. Helping people has been a very satisfying thing for Simon and he feels privileged to have practiced in Yack where there is such a great community that is inspiring other communities.

Simon has moved up to work with Yackandandah Health for 2 days a week. He didn't wish to close down his practice and abandon his clients, and this will help a further transition towards retirement. He's very happy to be working with Yack Health which won't involve so much paperwork although he will have to come to terms with a new computer system.

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YACKANDANDAH MEDICAL CENTRE'S MIDWIFE CARE PROGRAM



The lucky mums-to-be of Yack have a lot to be thankful for. Yack's great Medical Centre have been offering a Midwife Care Program which has been in existence since late 2018. Resident Dr. Tess Goodwin is a GP Obstetrician and has provided antenatal care in Yackandandah since 2008. Louise Thornton, the Centre's Midwife, has enhanced

antenatal care options since 2018 when they established the YH Midwife Care Program.

The MWC program has been designed so that all women see Louise for majority of their antenatal visits, supported by Dr. Tess as the GP Obstetrician. Evidence shows that if women are well supported during pregnancy with continuity of care by the same midwife and doctor, the outcomes are improved.

The world is changing, and with that is a cohort of women now who are older when starting a family so the YHMC Midwife Care Program aims to 'individualise' care to meet the needs to women.

Of course, everyone's pregnancy and birth journey is different. Yack Medical Centre want to provide that continuity of care with the patient seeing Louise at each appointment. The Midwife Care Program offers gold standard care.

There is a unique model at Wodonga Hospital where most of

the local babies are born, which is run by a great team of health professionals. The Wangaratta (North East Health) is another excellent local birth unit. The Wodonga birth unit is run by the midwives and has a specialist and GP Obstetrician in attendance daily, plus Obstetric and GP registrars. This is a unique model with the degree of continuity that GP Obstetricians have with their patients through to the birth suite. There is also the advantage that if



someone comes in with something medically complicated in pregnancy then the family history is often well known to the care team. A Midwife Care Program also operates in Wodonga Hospital and a number of general practices are adopting it as well. Dr. Tess can sometimes be present if rostered on that day. There are 11 Obstetric GPs, so a roster is shared. Louise does follow up with a domiciliary home visit once the family are discharged home. Louise is a Breastfeeding Counsellor with The Australian Breastfeeding Association which is an added level of support for women choosing to breastfeed. Again, this is another layer of continuity, so they don't have to meet a new face coming into their home. Louise knows the new mother's history, the pregnancy and they can talk about the birth and breastfeeding.

It is recommended that pregnant women in the Wodonga birth suite catchment area are seen by a GP provider that offers an obstetric program. Women who are newly pregnant can arrange an appointment with Louise and Tess to discuss our model and consider if it's the right care for them and their pregnancy. Women do not need a referral to attend our clinic, they can purely ring up. Just phone and make an appointment with the Centre – 02 6028 0130.

The program is currently operating on a Thursday morning. There are some costs involved with this program, and a brochure is available from the Clinic on this.

The four ratings are: Moderate: plan and prepare (green) High: prepare to act (yellow)

> Extreme: take action now to protect your life and property (extreme)

Catastrophic: for your survival, leave bushfire risk areas (red)

The system also includes a 'no rating' level where no proactive action is required by the community. The 'no rating' level does not mean fires won't start, but they are not likely to move or act in a way that threatens

the safety of the

community

The system is based on enhanced technology and research that greatly improves predicting fire behaviour and potential threat to the community. Under the new system, emergency services can provide more specific advice to the community so that they also can make more informed decisions about their own safety.

As part of the changeover to the new system, all Fire Danger Rating signs across by COVID 19 we can hold an Open Day for the public and the community. This year's Brigade Open Day will be held at the Fire Station on Sunday, November 20 to coincide with the Yackandandah Lions Market from 9am to 1pm.

Come along to find out all about the new Australian Fire Danger Rating System, ask questions about the coming fire season and what you can do to prepare, let the kids (big and small) have a go at using a fire hose, meet our members, and see what's involved if you are considering becoming a volunteer with the Brigade.

Also on hand will be volunteers from Yackandandah's Ambulance Victoria Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) with their vehicle if you are interested in finding out more about the important role CERT plays in our community.

Even though the predictions are for a wet summer, you should still prepare your property for the coming fire season. The CFA has recently updated its web pages to provide excellent and up-todate information on how to prepare your property with valuable information on clearing trees and vegetation, landscaping, home improvements and burning off. 

Yackandandah Letter a 'Transparent Hoax'.

International tournament cancelled

In a double blow to the small northeast Victorian town of Yackandandah, The Royal Finska Society has cancelled its upcoming Ned Kelly Memorial Word Finska Championships, to be held in the historic town in October, over the Kellygate scandal which has erupted following the publication by the State Library of its analysis of the so-called Yackandandah Letter.

Speaking before a packed media conference, Sigmund Clutterbuck, in charge of the six-month long, intensive investigation into the veracity of the document, allegedly uncovered in a disused Yackandandah cellar, declared: "It appears to be a word-document dipped in cold tea". References to a 'pie/quiche hybrid' sold in the town as 'having been brought to Australia by Grace Kelly' have been described as 'patently ludicrous'.

A Kelly aficionado who has been coming regularly to Yackandandah from Melbourne since Yackity Yak broke the initial story in April, and who declined to be named in the article, claims she is devastated by the news. "I just can't believe it, I don't want to, to think I've eaten all those Ned Kelly pies under false pretences. I'm even starting to question whether all those Ned Kelly Suits of Armour I bought from The Golden Tricycle are genuine".

Speaking out about the scandal, Susan Reynolds, of the Yackandandah Museum, said: "It's a complete disgrace and a real smear on out town's reputation. I've even heard we've been dropped as a

destination on the Contiki under-35s Ned Kelly Experience Tour. Someone needs to be held accountable for this". "Shameful", added Historical Society President, Sue Bell. Plans to film an upcoming episode of "The Real Love Boat' in the Yackandandah Letter Cellar have also reputedly been abandoned.

Local caravan park owner, Gavin Doyle said "Nail him up, I've lost so many bookings. Nail him up!"

Standing beside Ms Reynolds, Ms Bell and Mr Doyle, David Lacey, the local newsagent said "I really don't think anyone needs to be lynched for this, let's keep some perspective here. I mean, sure, I've spent a lot stocking up on Finska games and product with the tournament in mind, but nailing people to trees is a bit scary. Just a bit of fun, really. Let's stay calm everyone."

Speculation has now turned to the identity of the nefarious prankster who has caused so much damage to our town. A visibly shaken David Lacey called for calm saying "They'll never be found, never. Let's all just move on and forget about it everyone."

Bjorn Aarrnnsbuggle, President of the Royal Finska Society, questioned about abandoning the October tournament, revealed that "We just can't afford another scandal, not after that thing with our royal patron, Camilla and our annual naturist calendar".

Yackity Yak will be watching developments closely and we'll keep our readers well informed as events unfold.








Totally Renewable Yackandandah would love you to join the TRY and Mondo teams for a 'deep dive' into a neat power innovation – Project EDGE.

Casual observers of local and distant conversations on energy will have noticed some excitement as Yack nudges toward 100% renewable power – only 40% left to go! This 40% is the equivalent of 400 extra homes with solar (and ideally batteries) and we anticipate getting to that point in 2024.

Project EDGE perfectly aligns with Yack's aspiration to achieve a 100% renewable energy supply – the continued adoption of solar installations and batteries on private properties. In partnership with the 'Virtual Power Plant' subsidy from Solar Victoria, EDGE will provide extra funding support for residents and business to help offset the purchase cost of batteries.

Project EDGE is a federally funded undertaking with the Australian Renewable Energy Agency and is a partnership between community, AusNet, Mondo and the Australian Energy Market Operator. Looking on the bright side: TRY gets an Infrared Camera!

If you're not sure what an infrared camera was before reading this – neither did some of us! However, it is definitely fun to use. An infrared camera is a bit like a police speed gun, but it is used to measure the temperature of a physical object, which it displays via colours on a screen.

But why would TRY be interested in this?

Thermal comfort! We know we're coming out of winter, but many of our feet are still chilly. TRY's focus has always been on renewable energy infrastructure since we began in 2014, but the truth is that the simplest and cheapest way to achieve net zero is maximum efficiency!

If we are able to use existing energy more efficiently, this reduces the need for infrastructure, which can bring costs down significantly. This is really important considering how much Yack's population is estimated to grow over the coming decades. It also reduces household bills – vital in this current energy market!

Which brings us to our new Infrared camera. It is available for borrowing by Yack residents to assess the quality of the insulation of their home and to find gaps that will let heat in or out. Information is power – and if you know where your weak points are, you may be able to do something about it. For most houses, this tends to be windows and doors. For older houses, it might be gaps in the walls where there is a lot of airflow and therefore heat transference.

Houses on stumps tend to lose a lot of heat through gaps in the floor.

We gave it a whirl in our home and immediately learned quite a lot about our thermal envelope, and also the structure of our house. For example, if your house has a stud wall, more heat transfer occurs in the spaces between the studs which is why wall insulation is so important.

There was quite a lot of heat loss not only from the windows but around them, often hidden by the framing. We identified large gaps around our windows that need patching up. There is also a lot of discussion around double versus single-glazed windows (and even triple glazing!) After discussions with a draftsman, we concluded the most effective

and affordable course of action for us was thick double-backed curtains.

It's a little known fact that properly installed, insulated curtains are almost as effective as double-glazed windows for keeping rooms warmer or cooler. Full length, insulated, lined curtains with some form of pelmet limit the significant air movement across the window glass that transfers heat, and also limit direct heat entry from the sun in summer. Closing the curtains as soon as the afternoon cools off in winter, and during hot summer days, provides

effective measure is properly installed honeycomb blinds. Giving the camera a go will help you to identify your own problem areas, and hopefully come up with solutions



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Community the focus, as Hawkins announces second Independent tilt at Benambra

After swinging the formerly safe Liberal seat of Benambra closer to independent representation in the 2018 Victorian election, Baranduda local Jacqui Hawkins has announced her intention to run as an Independent once again in this year's state election.

Ms Hawkins officially announced her plans to run on August 3, has since established a campaign hub called The Hive - in Wodonga, and has spent the past few weeks visiting towns throughout the electorate, including Yackandandah, to learn more about what matters to locals.

She said she was keen to build on the momentum generated by her 2018 campaign, and to reiterate her commitment to representing the community as an Independent in state parliament.

"I'm committed to ensuring people in our community have their voices heard, and their needs and priorities represented without party politics getting in the way," she said. "During the past few years, we've seen independent representatives across the country facilitate true participatory politics in their electorates, including right here in the federal seat of

Ms Hawkins is a fifth generation local who grew up on a family farm in Staghorn Flat, and now calls Baranduda home.

"In particular, I'm committed to fighting hard for a cross-border, cross-partisan commitment to a new hospital for Albury Wodonga, as well as state government support for our local GPs and community-led healthcare, to ensure that we're seeing that investment in the preventative side of health."

BEHIND THE DOOR of CC's Butcher Shop This site was once home to bootmaker, Alexander Priestley who won fame for his

hand-sewn sluicing boots. Made to order, they were sent as far away as Queensland. The boots were designed for the leather to unfold at the top and to be pulled up as high as the waist for wading. The sole was held in place using box-wood pegs. Alexander took great care in the making of his boots allowing for bunions and other foot problems. Fire burnt down his shop in 1932 and his cobbler's bench is now exhibited at the Museum. His daughter, Sister Adelaide Jane, served as a nurse in WW1 and her name is included on the plaque in the Soldiers Memorial Park.

WHAT'S COMING UP

The world is full of ordinary people in ordinary towns. But ordinary people, with courage, can do extraordinary things.

All the Shining Lights is a story about courage and wisdom. A story about Charli and John and an aeroplane – one young, one old, all lost. Charli is bold, headstrong and desperate to soar over the hurdles life throws in her way. John is old, bitter and afraid of what comes next. The Uiver is an aeroplane caught up in a storm with no map, no guide, and nowhere to land.

At a time when so much of the world feels lost and adrift, Charli flies into John's room at Sunset Oaks and into his heart. Together they unlock the dramatic rescue of the Uiver plane and the little pearls of wisdom we all need, to face life and to face death. This is a story of then and now and what is yet to come.

All the Shining Lights was created written by Yackandandah teacher Brendan Hogan. Recently we caught up with Brendan to learn more about the play's development.

"My first introduction to the Uiver story was many years ago. I had been involved with Albury Wodonga Theatre Company and had a very small role in the play held in a hangar at the Albury airport. At the time I didn't think any more of it, however my wife Carm was passionate about the idea - that it could be a great story for children.

During the day I teach year five and six students at Yackandandah Primary. The original play was more of an adult version, our goal was to retell it for a younger audience. In the big cities it's at times common place, but in regional areas high quality theatre for families and young people is often not catered for.

Back in 2016, Carm and I began the idea of reimagining the story. At the time some people had no idea or had forgotten about the Uiver story. So, it was time to commence the development on how we might retell it for this new audience.

Once the play became involved in the HotHouse Program *Celsius*, it quickly evolved and took on different ideas and different themes and a really enriched and built out beyond what we had initially come up with.

When HotHouse commissioned the work last year it really supercharged the development. As a writer, you write stuff because you want it to be performed. So, once it was commissioned, it then becomes your priority. Starting out on other projects I would usually need to write, direct, produce and do every other aspect of it. Now with the support of HotHouse I was able to focus fully on the writing and, in collaboration, draw on the professional skills of others who could bring their own creativity.

The title All the Shining Lights came quite late. The story centres quite heavily on the Uiver story, but

in naming it *The Uiver Story* or something like that, the word is hard to pronounce and only going to confuse people.

The title was developed from different themes or concepts within the play. When the Uiver landed in Albury it was a row of car headlights on the racetrack that lit up and guided it down. In the play we also talk about the stars in the night sky and the idea that although the stars that we see may be burnt up, we can still be guided by their legacy.

The most thrilling part for me now is that I can't wait for November when everyone can come along and enjoy it."

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



QUEEN ELIZABETH II DIES AT THE AGE OF 96


Pretty much everything about the death of the Queen has been said over the past few weeks, but there was one small event that will live on in the memories of two locals who were invited to meet the Queen and Prince Philip in October 2011

Wednesday 26th October 2011, at 1pm I was privileged to be invited to Government House in Melbourne representing The Victorian State Emergency Service. This visit was part of the Emergency Services participation in the 2011 floods and fires which our Yackandandah SES unit was part of. I was extremely happy to be invited to such an event. The thought of meeting the Queen was something that I never thought possible.

Entering Government House, the guests were advised not to carry anything, this included handbags or mobile phones. We were then checked before entering the building. I wish that I had been able to take photos, but this was not allowed. Once we were inside the building, we were given a run down on what we could and couldn't do. There were many rules when addressing the Queen and I certainly didn't want to get this wrong. The chances of her actually speaking to me was low as we were all grouped into groups of different Emergency Service agency representatives.

Once we were grouped, we were told of the Queen and her husband, The Duke of Edinburgh's arrival and we all went silent. Watching the Queen walk into the building with her husband walking behind was surreal. She looked amazing and once the introductions were over the Queen moved around the groups to chat. I was lucky enough that she spoke to me.

The scariest moment for me was getting the curtsy correct. I'd practised a few days prior not thinking that I would need to do it but then, here I was curtsying before the Queen. I held her hand and did my best curtsy and as for protocol I must have done alright as we then had a chat about which Emergency Service I was from and what we did



during the fires. I answered everything but thinking back, the Queen was probably thinking where on earth is Yackandandah!

She reminded me of my late grandmother who was born and lived in England. Regal and very approachable. My grandmother's hair style was similar, so I was taken back a little when I first saw the Queen. She wore a lovely brooch which my grandmother always wore when she went out. And of course, the Queen wore white gloves which matched her floral dress.

The memories I have of this extraordinary invite are wonderful and I was saddened to hear of her passing. The Queen must have had many handshakes and curtseys over her seventy years service and she would not have remembered mine, but I certainly remember my encounter with Her Majesty The Queen.

The Royal party were very adept at working the room. They parted company and the Queen went to one part of the room and the Duke of Edinburgh to the other. I wasn't spoken to directly by the Duke but was very close, and to watch him was a lesson in how to make small talk and close a conversation with consumate ease.

It was a great shame that their visit was rushed,

but probably more disappointing for the younger members of the audience; there were many children there of school age who had been clearly very excited to be invited to the event.

Jackie was delighted to speak with the Queen and was nearly speechless with delight afterwards!

I recall noting how much smaller the Queen and Prince Philip were than I had imagined, and that the Queen was wearing a white suit with a pale pink floral pattern with an eye catching cyclamen coloured straw boater.

I was in Melbourne also attending a Rural Councils of Victoria meeting and a Municipal Association of Victoria forum with two dinners and a stay at the Hotel Windsor. Quite an action packed couple of days in the life of a rural Mayor...

The Lady in the Van

"The Lady in the Van" was performed in the Public Hall on August 6, by the Highway 1 Theatre Company. The following is a review of the performance by Alison Higgins.

A visit to the theatre is something to look forward to and the recent production of Alan Bennett's "The Lady in the Van" by Highway 1 Theatre Company didn't disappoint.

Many will be familiar with the story of Miss Shepherd and her van (there were three, all painted yellow) which was parked in Alan Bennett's front garden from 1974 until her death in 1989. The story originally appeared in The London Review

of Books, became a play and then a film - both starring Dame Maggie Smith. This production, directed by Tracey Shields, featured two Alans with matching fair isle jumpers- one the writer, talking to us and to the other Alan who interacted with Miss Shepherd - listening to her requests, ideas and complaints.

Among other activities, she sold pencils from the pavement. We meet a couple of




neighbours and other characters, notably the social workers. Miss Shepherd was a prickly character, seemingly ungrateful for the help she received. Over the play we learn of her previous life - trying to become a nun, and her musical prowess on the piano. After her death we meet her brother briefly who tells us he had to have her admitted to a mental hospital. The van was effectively suggested as a kind of cupboard with the doors opening to the front of the stage. The cast, many of whom played more than one character, were most engaging. Rosey Cullinan's



portrayal of Miss Shepherd was a tour de force - a wonderful assortment of odd headgear marking the passage of time.

Highway 1 certainly provides a grand live theatre experience for the smaller regional towns.

Salt Glazed porcelain and Terra Sigillata

This year's exhibition is a celebration of two personal milestones. It marks a dedication of 55 years as an Australian potter and also my 45th Annual November Exhibition here in Yackandandah (after relocating from Melbourne in 1974).

The passion to create good pots is still strong even though the body is not quite as resilient as it once was. The challenges presented by the demanding processes of salt glazing and Terra Sigillata have not lessened over the years. Indeed, the difficulties associated with obtaining a reliable source for many of my raw materials has made things even more challenging and the outcomes even less predictable. Nevertheless, while my body is still able and my determination not to be beaten is still strong, I will strive to push the boundaries and weather and overcome the constant challenges. My perception of what makes a "good pot" has not changed markedly over the years. The timelessness of good pots is testament to their longevity. I continue to create forms that fulfil my ideals and embellish them with techniques that give me pleasure and satisfaction.

The exhibition will again spread over the extended period of two weekends and the working week between them. This will alleviate problems caused by the Victorian State elections and continued Covid concerns, allowing more flexible planning. It would give me great pleasure to share this year's endeavours with you.

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THE ARTS IN YACKANDANDAH

Spring Writers' Group

Early next month our writers' group will be meeting in a town half an hour's drive away, a step outside our normal routine of gathering inside the red brick structure that was once the Yackandandah Courthouse, across the road from the public pool and community garden.

Monthly we gather. Push rectangular tables together to form a larger rectangle, plug the heater in and turn it up to warm winter air. Monthly we sit together and chew over one another's work, taking turns to offer ideas and suggestions. One piece at a time. Masticating together on the meat and gristle of our words, respectfully spitting out bits we can't digest, nodding and noticing elements to our liking, making notes on desirable flavour and texture.

The cast of characters: the bearded one, our Gandalf; the jam maker with mischievous eyes; the ever-empathic wise woman; the muso who teaches Japanese; the diminutive one with an immaculate garden; an ex-librarian with an infectious smile; a softly spoken woman with a penchant for punctuation, peering over spectacles; the editor of the free local rag; our wordsmith leader, effortlessly commanding us, pulling us all together and impressing with her words. And me, a relative newbie, taking it all in, trying to master the telling of a thing, trying to make words sing.

When my piece is dished up to the table I scribble down notes, do my best to ensure I take meaning as intended. Hungry mind feeding on tasty morsels. Head spinning with ways to make words work better, polish and preen. We take turns to bring afternoon tea, a home-baked cake is often warm, fresh from the tin. We sip steaming coffee and tea from clinking cups and saucers retrieved from the kitchen out the back. When our time is up, we band together, wash up, return tables and chairs to their stacked positions. Chatting and chittering, chuckling. Lingering over meaty conversations.

What does a writer need? A room of her own. Ideas. A way with words. A good pen. Reams of paper. A reliable hard drive. A deadline. Persistence.

Perseverance. Patience. A trusted community of others to share story, consider structure, mull over the shape of things.

Each meeting marks the turning of a calendar page, another piece submitted, workshopped and re-worked. Desire for writing re-kindled each time we meet.

Being a regional writer can be akin to being a lone rider in a vast landscape, on an unpredictable steed. But here, in our safe space nested within another safe space; a little community of writers within a community of creativity-minded residents. Judge and jury of one another's work in the courthouse. Month after month.

A routine, a ritual, a ripe thing.

Through the window wrens hop - females in unremarkable feather, barely discernible in dun-coloured lawn leached of green by too many frosts, pop from the field to greet the engaged observer, rewarding the attuned eye. Leaden with purple flower, the hardenbergia threatens to devour the substantial structure created to support it, making it look puny. There, on the ovens wattle that self-seeded with gusto in the garden bed, the first bright fluffy balls have shot overnight - one of three indigenous wattles, doing its thing, where it belongs, its rightful place.

Spring will come and summer will follow. And together, we will write.

RECIPE OF THE SEASON

It's Asparagus Season, and we can't get enough of it. Roasting asparagus brings out its best. The tips get a little crispy in the oven, and the flavour is more concentrated than it would be if you steamed or sautéed it. Roasted asparagus is the perfect springtime side dish, whether for lunch or dinner. As a bonus, it's simple to throw together while your main dish cooks on the stove.

How to Store

Asparagus - Place your

asparagus in a heavy-bottomed jar or drinking glass when you get home and add a couple inches of water. You can place a plastic bag over the top to retain maximum freshness. Then, store the asparagus like this in your

refrigerator. It will stay fresh for several days longer this way!

How to Prep

Asparagus - The ends of asparagus can be unpleasantly tough and woody. To remove those parts, sharply bend the asparagus near the base. The asparagus will snap in the right place. You can use the discarded ends for a veggie stock.

How to Roast Asparagus - Roasting asparagus is easy

and quick! Simply toss your prepared asparagus with a light drizzle of olive oil, and a sprinkle of salt and pepper. I like to do this on a large, rimmed baking sheet lined with parchment paper for easy clean-up.

> Bake until the asparagus is easily pierced through by a fork, which will vary depending on the thickness of your asparagus. Pencilthin asparagus will be done in as little as 10 minutes. Thicker asparagus will need between 15 to 20 minutes.

How to Season

Asparagus - Here are some ideas for flavours that will complement your roasted asparagus. Keep it simple and choose just one or two. Or go all-out use all four of the first ideas.

- Lemon zest and/or lemon wedges
- · Sprinkle of finely grated Parmesan cheese
- Small handful of fresh mint or parsley, finely chopped
- Light sprinkle of red pepper flakes
- Pat or two of butter
- Light drizzle of balsamic reduction or thick balsamic vinegar
- Toasted sliced almonds

'THE WATER DELUSION'

(To the Editor of Yackandandah Times)

Sir, — In your last issue I noticed that Mr John Yale delivered a lecture recently on 'The Wine Delusion.' Having a little spare time at my command on Christmas Day I was cogitating over the question as I occasionally sipped at a glass of the deluding stuff. I had procured a glass of water, but I could not summon the courage to drink it after I had made up a list or the evil effects of water. I shaped my thoughts into the form of an essay as follows: -

Water is a terrible fluid that drowns people. It is composed of two gases on neither of which could life be sustained. Every year thousands upon thousands of people are killed by this dreadful fluid, leaving sorrowing widows and orphans behind them; and yet our wicked Parliament refuses to prohibit it. Water sometimes gets into houses and ruins the walls and ceilings, and spoils the carpets. Many horrible diseases are brought about by this water, such as rheumatism and pleurisy. It is very dangerous to drink water if your stomach is heated, as colic and inflammation often result from taking a copious draught. A stiff nobbler of spirits is far safer. Water is the home of disease germs. Typhoid fever, cholera, and hydatids are all brought about by drinking water. 

A GARDENING TIP – LAWN CARE

The beauty bought to a garden by the change in seasons cannot be underrated, especially when spring is upon us and our gardens are bursting with colour and fragrance. It is also the perfect time to renovate your lawn while your soil is soft from winter rain.

During winter the lawns are reasonably dormant but now the soil temperatures are perfect for root establishment and spreading. Lawns will naturally start to do this but without a little help from adding nutrition, it is limited to what remains in the soil. Spring is the ideal time to fertilise all varieties of lawns, check your local store for the product best suited to your lawn variety.

TWO JOBS YOU CAN DO TO HELP RESURRECT YOUR LAWN

Coring: Soil compaction is a killer and over a period of time from walking, mowing and general use, the soil can go hard and the lawn thin out, a perfect time for weeds to take over. Coring to a depth of approximately 10cm in length and twig sized, you are allowing the soil to breathe again. This can be done using an inexpensive hand corer from your local garden centre. After coring, lightly top dress your lawn with about 1 cm of coarse sand and spread gypsum over the area. The sand and gypsum will work their way down the core holes, improving drainage and turf quality.

Scalping: Another helpful hint to get rid of hardened old growth that has developed over winter is to scalp your lawn. The easiest method to encourage new growth is to turn the mower blades right down and "scalp" away all the old growth. This removes old leaves and the lawn will recover with nice soft new growth. The best time to carry out this procedure is from October to December on warm season grasses and from September to October on cool season grasses.

WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

One of the outings our members enjoy is to visit a local garden. We do not expect them to be picture perfect, in fact we love them to be working gardens that may offer inspiration, a place to delight our senses, enjoy a pleasant stroll and of course the opportunity to have morning tea with friends.

We have visited two such gardens recently, the first being member Trish McGowan's garden at Baranduda. Growing trees was a priority for Trish while she was working full time. Many gum trees were planted in 1984, and are now well

established. A variety of deciduous trees, planted over the last ten years, are now interspersed with the gums giving her wide expanse of lawn wonderful structure. Since joining the Garden Club and having more time on her hands, Trish is delighted with how her garden beds have flourished and so too were the members who visited her garden. It is interesting to note that the vegetable garden is all contained in raised wicking beds, a wonderful way to conserve energy and water in Trish's mind.

Gandy's Forest, the home of Gary Haywood, was the second garden members visited. Gandy's Forest is a beautiful oasis for native animals, birds, insects and water creatures. Gary and his late

partner, Andy bought the 8-acre property about 5 years ago. They cleared a lot of blackberries and planted hundreds of native trees and shrubs as well as building their home.

Their aim was to regenerate the land and to share this space with the native wildlife. Gary has continued to maintain this beautiful garden, as well as an extensive vegetable and herb garden. He uses a hot-house to grow plants from seeds and tube stock. Gary has host bee hives and these bees are able to enjoy 3 acres of tea tree plants, producing delicious Manuka honey. He is also passionate about growing native Sandalwood trees and has successfully grown quite a few from seeds using wattle trees as host plants. It was such a pleasure to wander around Gandy's Forest while listening to the birds and frogs and seeing the hard work and passion that has gone into making this wonderful garden.


